## The Prophet's Unhappy Mission

Jeremiah 13-15 October 1, 2023 Pastor Gary Hollinger

Jeremiah continued to struggle with the <u>mission</u> and <u>message</u> God had called him to proclaim.

I. God uses a physical object lesson (a ruined linen belt) to demonstrate His people's spiritual condition. (v. 13:1-11)

And the LORD has declared this day that you are his people, his treasured possession as he promised, and that you are to keep all his commands. He has declared that he will set you in praise, fame and honor high above all the nations he has made and that you will be a people holy to the LORD your God, as he promised. (Deuteronomy 26:18-19)

And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God. (Philippians 1:9-11)

In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory. (Ephesians 1:11-14)

- II. God declares His people are so accustomed to doing evil that they are <u>unable</u> to <u>stop</u>, therefore they will be taken captive. (v. 13:12-25)
- III. Jeremiah cries out in <u>confession</u> and <u>supplication</u> over the drought and resulting famine God has sent. (v. 14:7-9)
- IV. Jeremiah is told <u>not</u> to <u>pray</u> for the people because the other "prophets" are declaring <u>false hope</u> that God's judgments will not fall. (v. 14:10-22)
- V. God's heart had been hardened against Judah because of the <u>evil king Manasseh</u>. (v. 15:1-4)

Manasseh was twelve years old when he became king, and he reigned in Jerusalem fifty-five years. His mother's name was Hephzibah. <sup>2</sup> He did evil in the eyes of the LORD, following the detestable practices of the nations the LORD had driven out before the Israelites. <sup>3</sup> He rebuilt the high places his father Hezekiah had destroyed; he also erected altars to Baal and made an Asherah pole, as Ahab king of Israel had done. He bowed down to all the starry hosts and worshiped them. <sup>4</sup> He built altars in the temple of the LORD, of which the LORD had said, "In Jerusalem I will put my Name." <sup>5</sup> In the two courts of the temple of the LORD, he built altars to all the starry hosts. <sup>6</sup> He sacrificed his own son in the fire, practiced divination, sought omens, and consulted mediums and spiritists. He did much evil in the eyes of the LORD, arousing his anger.

<sup>7</sup>He took the carved Asherah pole he had made and put it in the temple, of which the LORD had said to David and to his son Solomon, "In this temple and in Jerusalem, which I have chosen out of all the tribes of Israel, I will put my Name forever. <sup>8</sup>I will not again make the feet of the Israelites wander from the land I gave their ancestors, if only they will be careful to do everything I commanded them and will keep the whole Law that my servant Moses gave them." <sup>9</sup>But the people did not listen. Manasseh led them astray, so that they did more evil than the nations the LORD had destroyed before the Israelites.

<sup>10</sup> The LORD said through his servants the prophets: <sup>11</sup> "Manasseh king of Judah has committed these detestable sins. He has done more evil than the Amorites who preceded him and has led Judah into sin with his idols. <sup>12</sup> Therefore this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: I am going to bring such disaster on Jerusalem and Judah that the ears of everyone who hears of it will tingle. <sup>13</sup> I will stretch out over Jerusalem the measuring line used against Samaria and the plumb line used against the house of Ahab. I will wipe out Jerusalem as one wipes a dish, wiping it and turning it upside down. <sup>14</sup> I will forsake the remnant of my inheritance and give them into the hands of enemies. They will be looted and plundered by all their enemies; <sup>15</sup> they have done evil in my eyes and have aroused my anger from the day their ancestors came out of Egypt until this day."

<sup>16</sup> Moreover, Manasseh also shed so much innocent blood that he filled Jerusalem from end to end—besides the sin that he had caused Judah to commit, so that they did evil in the eyes of the LORD. (2 Kings 21:1-16)

## VI. God declares His firm intent to bring <u>destruction</u> upon His people . (v. 15:5-9)

## VII. Jeremiah bemoans his <u>assigned role</u> as God's <u>herald</u> wishing he had never been born.

(v. 15:10)

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations." (Jeremiah 1:5)

## VIII. God responds that Jeremiah's mission will be successful. (v. 15:11-14)

- IX. Jeremiah dares to reproach God for the misery he has suffered. (v. 15:15-18)
- X. God responds by reproaching His prophet for his words but still promises him <u>divine</u> <u>protection</u>. (v. 15:19-21)
