 - A. To Encourage and Edify the churches

 - ("Apokalypsis") Gk = a disclosure of truth.
- 2. The Author / Date of Revelation:
 - A. The Apostle John Rev. 1:1,4&9, 22:8
 - i. Attested to by several early church

fathers; Justin Martyr, Irenaeus,

Clement of Alexandria, Origen.

B. At the end of Emperor Domitian's reign, c. 95 – 96 AD

Revelation Is a Spiritual Book about Spiritual things;

- A. Revelation is about Jesus;
- **B.** Revelation comes to Jesus
- C. Revelation is Given through Jesus

It is Given to us to Encourage and Comfort us in the Present:

Six Reasons for Encouragement:

- 1. God sees their tears; (7:17, 21:4)
- 2. Their prayers rule the world; (8:3-4)
- 3. Death ushers them into a glorious heaven; (14:13, 20:4)
- 4. Their final victory is assured; (15:2)
- 5. Christ lives and reigns forever; (5:7-8)
- 6. He will return for His Church; (ch. 21-22)

Three Basic Truths to Encourage us:

- 1. Jesus Christ is on the Throne
 - a. He is in control of history,
 - b. We can trust Him with final outcome
- 2. He is coming back
 - a. Coming as a conquering King
 - **b.** His justice will prevail
- 3. He will take me home
 - a. We can see our circumstances as temporary.
 - **b.** This world is not my final destination

We also have Revelation to prepare us for future events.

- A. We are challenged to godly living,
- **B.** We are encouraged to share the words of this book.

Four views of Interpretation:

1. Preterist:

From Latin, *praeter*, = *Past*. Teaches end time prophecies are fulfilled in 70 AD

Four views of Interpretation:

2. Historicist:

Views Revelation as a symbolic or allegorical prophetic survey of church history from John's time to 2nd coming of Christ.

3. Idealist/Spiritualist:

They view the symbols in Revelation do not relate to historical events, but to timeless spiritual truths, ie: the battle between God and evil.

Four views of Interpretation:

4. Futurist:

They take a literal understanding of the fulfillment of prophecy in the future exactly as depicted in the book.

Four Themes in Revelation:

- 1. The final victory of Christ and His church over the forces of darkness. Rev. 17
- 2. The revelation that Jesus is God. Rev. 19:10, 22:9.

Four Themes in Revelation:

- 3. It reveals the true nature of evil. Rev. 22:10-15
- 4. Revelation shows the present offer of God's Grace. Rev. 22:16-21
