

Luke 1:1-4

Intro: The NT is comprised of 4 different writing *genre*.

- 1. A *gospel*, of which there is four;
- **2.** A book of *history*,
- 3. An apocalyptic book, and,
- 4. An epistle, of which there are 21.

There are two main reasons we have 4 gospels:

- 1. To get a complete picture of Christ,
- 2. To verify the *truthfulness* of their accounts, Deut. 19:15.

Luke was the writer of both his Gospel account as well as *Acts*.

Intro:

While his main audience was *Gentile*, his message was to *sinners* of every kind.

Luke was a *Gentile* who never *met* the Lord personally, and the only *Gentile* to have written a NT *book*.

Two themes given to Luke:

- **1.** The Gospel of *prayer*; 9 times we are referred to the *prayers* of Christ,
- 2. The Gospel of the *Holy Spirit*.

Luke wants us to have *certainty* that the facts he presents in his *Gospel* are *historically* true and thereby, *believable*.

A. Luke's Declaration

- 1. By his *prologue* we see that Luke wasn't the *first* to write a Gospel account.
- 2. Luke used several *sources*; about half of *Mark's* verses are in Luke's account.
- **3.** He used *eyewitnesses* and ministers of the *Gospel*, men who *lived* their faith daily.

B. Luke's Determination

- **1.** Luke was an *historian* and was careful to research all his information.
- **2.** Luke was *guided* by the Holy Spirit, not forced or *manipulated*.
- **3.** His Gospel account is *rooted* in the facts of *verifiable* history.

C. Luke's Dedication

- 1. His Gospel was very *personal*, therefore it was a *universal* gospel.
- 2. While Luke intended his writing to be personal, God intended it for a much wider audience.
- **3.** Luke wrote to show us that Jesus is the *eternal* God who came in *human* flesh, in order to *seek* and *save* the lost, Lk. 19:10.
