

# "A Royal Train Wreck" 2 Samuel 13:1-22

2 Samuel 13:1-22

**Intro:** God promised David the *sword* will never depart from his *life*. 2 Sam. 12:10. *Death* and chaos and *domestic* pain would be his lot from here on out.

The *death* of his firstborn and the subsequent *personal* and domestic turmoil is to be seen as God's *discipline* of David and not *punishment*, 2 Sam. 12:13.

The Lord visits the *iniquity* of the father upon his children, only if they do not receive the *Lord*. Ez. 18:1-4.

#### Intro:

The "sow" and "reap" principal of Gal. 6:8 applies.

David had two *character* flaws that contributed to his dilemma;

- 1. He indulged his sons without discipline,
- 2. He was a *polygamist* which violated God's *Law*, Deut. 17:17.

2 Samuel 13:1-22

#### I. Bad Thoughts

(Vs. 1-2)

Amnon had an *incestuous* attraction to his half sister.

He was the firstborn from David's second wife,

Ahinoam, and the heir apparent to the throne. 2 Sam. 3:2-3.

His *love* for Tamar was actually *lust*, e-pē-thü-me'- ō (Gk)

#### II. Bad Counsel

(Vs. 3-7)

Jonadab was Amnon's *cousin*, the son of David's *brother*.

Instead of showing Amnon the *consequences* of his *desires*, he helped with their *achievement*.

Amnon's *lust* twisted the reality of his *desires*.

#### III. The Tragedy

(Vs. 8-17)

Tamar was a virgin, the full sister to Absalom,

Once alone with Tamar, Amnon *raped* her, proving his thoughts of *love* were actually those of *lust*.

As Amnon violated a *virgin*, by law he could be killed, Lev. 18:9-11, 20:17; Deut. 27:22.

Once his desires were *fulfilled*, he treated Tamar with *disdain*.

#### IV. The Humiliation

(Vs. 18-22)

Amnon *destroyed* Tamar's life. With her *virginity* lost she could no longer:

- 1. Live with the other *virgins*,
- 2. Become married as a princes,
- **3.** Have a family, *raise* children.
- 4. She lived *desolate* in her brother's house, Vs. 20.
