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"The Power Behind the Armor"

Ephesians 6:17-20

Intro:

Prayer assists us in utilizing the Armor of God effectively. It has not been given to us to increase our comfort level, but to assist us in warfare and to help accomplish our mission.

Using Habakkuk we see how prayer adjusts our attitude so we see the issues we face through God's perspective. Through prayer God changes our heart so He can work on the issue to bring Him glory and victory to us. While prayer may not change our circumstances, it will change our perspective.

The reason for ineffective prayer may be we're not engaged in the battle and prayer becomes a means to get stuff.

James 4:2-3.

Intro:

The power of prayer was not given to the church to win comforts, but to wield a weapon.

Prayer is an adjustment of the attitude of our heart to reality. Facing life that way;

- 1. We are able to live more effective, joyful, productive lives,
- 2. We will understand what's going on in the world and why,
- 3. We are able to arm ourselves for the battle that rages around us and within.

I. Our Armor is empowered with all prayer.

Prayer and petition are often linked together by Paul. Supplication and petition come from same Greek word. Phil. 4:6 and 1 Tim. 2:1.

While hard to see a distinction, Prayer seems to be a general term while petition may refer to a specific prayer for a specific outcome.

The point is, our armor is empowered by all types of prayer depending on the battle.

"The Power behind the Armor" II. We're to Pray at All Times

For us to be geared up we need to be prayed up. The term, "at all times" or, "without ceasing" is actually "at every opportunity".

Prayer should be a perpetual communing with our Heavenly Father.

Prayer is not our last resort. John Bunyan: "You can do more than pray, after you have prayed. But you can't do more than pray until you have prayed.

"The Power behind the Armor" III. We are to Pray in the Spirit

This is a common NT principal. Jude 20. It does not mean praying in tongues. That's not a biblical definition. What it means is praying in harmony with the Spirit, praying consistently with the mind of the Spirit and the will of God. Rom. 8:26-27. It is praying,

- 1. In accordance with God's word
- 2. In dependence on the Spirit,
- 3. In the direction and power of the Spirit.

IV. We are to Pray Alertly with all Perseverance

Alertly means awake and vigilant, like a sentry on duty in wartime. Jesus in the garden tells His disciples to remain watchful lest they fall into temptation. Matt. 26:41.

Persevering in prayer means to pray and not lose heart when we don't get immediate results. Perseverance is often connected with prayer;

Acts 1:14,2:42, 6:4; Rom. 12:12 and Col. 4:2.

It is to devote yourself constantly to prayer and trust God. Ps. 27:14.

V. We need to Pray for All the Saints

We are connected as a family. We do not live in isolation to one another. What affects one member affects all the rest. We need to be watching each other's back through prayer.

We need to especially keep our leaders in prayer. Spurgeon attributes his evangelistic success to his peoples' prayers for him. As Paul asked for prayer to boldly and clearly proclaim the gospel, we should ask the same prayer for ourselves and for our brothers and sisters. To be victorious against evil in our battle, we must be people of prayer.
