- 1. Read Romans 5:12. What are the four simple truths given in this verse? Which one of these truths is the easiest for you to grasp? Which one is the hardest? (Rom. 3:23; Eph. 2:3; Isa. 53:6; 1 Cor. 15:22)
- 2. Which one of the three honest questions have you struggled with the most? What other questions would you add? (Psa. 51:5; Jn. 3:18; Rom. 8:5-8; 1 Jn. 1:8; Gen. 2:17; Jms. 1:14-15)
- 3. Which one of the five possible positions do you think made the most sense? Why? What others issues are at stake?
- 4. Compare and contrast view 4 and 5. What are the particulars of each? Why did I say that I believe Representative Headship is the best view?

- 5. Read Romans 5:13. What is the important thing to remember in this verse? What is the relationship between sin and the law? How does this relate to us today? (Rom. 1:18-20; 3:20; 5:14; Rom. 2:12; 3:23; 4:15)
- 6. Read Romans 5:14. What is the significance of death reigning from Adam to Moses? What does that teach us about the difference between sin and transgression? In what way was Adam a type of Christ? (Rom. 5:17, 21; 1 Cor. 15:55-57; 1 Cor. 15:45-49)
- 7. Read the take home questions. Which one encouraged you or challenged you the most? Why? How will you live differently this week based on what you have learned from this passage?
