Summary Information

Overview. The bill aligns the definition of qualified medication administration personnel in current law with existing CDPHE rules.

Summary of Legislation

The bill updates the definition of “qualified medication administration personnel” to include an individual who has passed a competency evaluation administered by the Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) before July 1, 2017.

Background

[Senate Bill 24-167](#), in part, allowed direct care workers and qualified medication administration personnel to transfer portable training certificates from one assisted living residence to another when changing employment. In defining qualified medication administration personnel, the bill inadvertently omitted those who passed a competency evaluation administered by CDPHE, as established by rule (6 CCR 1011-1 (7.2)).

Assessment of No Fiscal Impact

The bill updates CDPHE’s statutes to align current law with existing agency rules and practice. This results in no change to state or local government revenue or expenditures. For this reason, the bill is assessed as having no fiscal impact.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
