WHEREAS, The State of Colorado is committed to providing support for those facing behavioral health issues in our community; and
WHEREAS, Behavioral health describes the emotions and
behaviors that affect an individual's overall well-being, including mental health disorders and substance use; and
WHEREAS, The National Institute of Mental Health estimates that more than one in five U.S. adults live with a mental illness; and
WHEREAS, Widespread opioid use continues to grow across the

3 4 5	WHEREAS, Behavioral health conditions may lead to homelessness, criminal charges, and arrests and have a serious impact on our communities; and
6 7	WHEREAS, The many issues created by mental illness, substance use, and addiction are community problems, but the burden of their
8 9	solution must not be shouldered solely by law enforcement, fire services, and emergency medical services staff; and
10 11	WHEREAS, Many communities have turned to the evidence-based and proven-effective programs called Co-Responder programs; and
12	WHEREAS, The Co-Responder model pairs law enforcement, fire
13	services, and emergency medical services with behavioral health crisis
14	professionals to intervene and respond to behavioral health-related
15	emergencies; and
16	WHEREAS, These units utilize the combined expertise of law
17	enforcement and first responders with behavioral health crisis
18	professionals to de-escalate situations and help link individuals
19	experiencing behavioral health issues to appropriate resources in their
20	communities, including counseling; access to medication;
21	medical-assisted treatment for alcohol and drug dependency; and access
22	to housing, food, basic necessities, and other similar resources; and
23	WHEREAS, Co-Responder programs have expanded across many
24	communities within Colorado, offering both statewide and local support.
25	Co-Responder Units in Colorado have embraced the philosophy of
26	meeting those in need where they are to offer emergency access to
27	treatment, connection to community resources, and ongoing care; and
28	WHEREAS, Colorado Co-Responder Units have responded to
29	thousands of emergency and non-emergency calls for service, provided
30	crisis intervention, conducted important follow-up conversations,
31	developed safety plans, and assisted people in getting connected with the
32	resources they need for healthier living; and
33	WHEREAS, These first responders and behavioral health crisis
34	professionals have shown exceptional commitment, dedication,
