Summary of Legislation

This bill requires the Department of Revenue (DOR) to ensure that initial applicants for a commercial driver license successfully pass a training on the recognition, prevention, and reporting of human trafficking.

Background

The Driver Testing and Education Unit in the Driver License Section of the Division of Motor Vehicles in DOR is responsible for the oversight of the testing performed by third-party testing organizations. The training and education performed by these third-party organizations is overseen by the Division of Private Occupational Schools in the Department of Higher Education. The organization Truckers Against Trafficking currently includes a notice regarding human trafficking in the state's Commercial Driver License Manual, published by DOR.

State Expenditures

In FY 2018-19 only, the Department of Revenue and the Department of Higher Education will have a minimal increase in workload to implement the requirements of the bill. This workload can be accomplished within existing appropriations for each department.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on April 12, 2018, and it took effect August 8, 2018.
