LOCAL GOVERNMENT ALTER SPEED LIMITS **Bill Topic:**

> This bill allows counties and municipalities to look at various factors when considering changing a speed limit. It is expected to increase workload for local

governments on an ongoing basis.

Appropriation Summary:

No appropriation is required.

Fiscal Note Status:

The fiscal note reflects the enacted bill.

Summary of Legislation

Under current law, counties and municipalities may change a speed limit on a local road if a traffic investigation or survey indicates a change is justified. This bill allows counties. municipalities, and residential neighborhoods to also consider the following criteria when adjusting speed limits on local roads:

- road characteristics:
- current and future development;
- environmental factors;
- parking practices;
- pedestrian and bicycle activity; and
- crash statistics.

Local Government

Beginning in FY 2018-19, this bill will increase workload in counties and municipalities to the extent that they incorporate the bill's criteria in a traffic investigation or survey. As these traffic investigations and surveys already occur before changing a speed limit, it is expected that this workload increase will be incorporated into an existing process.

HB 18-1191

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on April 23, 2018, and takes effect August 8, 2018, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
