Summary Information

Overview. The bill codifies and clarifies mental health parity requirements in state law.

Summary of Legislation

The bill codifies and clarifies mental health parity requirements in state law. Specifically, the bill:

- codifies the federal Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAEA) into state law;
- clarifies existing state law around mental health parity; and
- requires the use of clinical standards from select national organizations to ensure parity.

Background

The Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAEA) requires there to be no material difference in insurance coverage for physical health services and mental health services. This means that cost sharing requirements, prior authorization requirements, medical necessity and level of care assessments, and treatment coverage cannot make it harder to access mental health services than physical health services. The American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) creates clinical criteria for substance use disorder level of care assessments that are used to ensure parity. The Department of Health Care and Financing (HCPF) and the Department of Regulatory Agencies (DORA) are responsible for ensuring mental health parity in Colorado for Medicaid and private health insurers, respectively.

State Expenditures

Workload will minimally increase in HCPF and DORA to update rules and regulations. Since these departments already enforce federal mental health parity requirements, additional work required to enforce requirements codified into state law is expected to be minimal.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on March 20, 2025, and takes effect on January 1, 2026, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
