HOUSE MEMORIAL 23-1001

MEMORIALIZING REPRESENTATIVE HUGH MCKEAN.
WHEREAS, Our beloved colleague, Hugh Monroe McKean,
leader of the Republican caucus and representative of Loveland, departed
this life on October 30, 2022, at the age of 55; and
WHEREAS, Born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on October 27,
1967, he spent his boyhood on a small farm in northern Missouri, where,
he said, he first learned "how to fix things"; and
WHEREAS, Eventually, Leader McKean made his way to
Colorado, where he graduated from Colorado State University in 1996;
and
WHEREAS, A passionate patriot, in the aftermath of the
September 11 attacks, he joined the Coast Guard Auxiliary as a reservist;
and
WHEREAS, Self-described as a "farm boy with a servant's heart",
Leader McKean worked as an independent residential contractor across
Northern Colorado and was active in local government; he built homes

1 2	and bridges between people, forged authentic and genuine connections, and always listened and learned; and
3	WHEREAS, Leader McKean served his friends, his neighbors, and
4	his community on a charter school board and a school district master
5	planning board and then, beginning in 2009, on the Loveland City
6	Council for two terms, a role that showed his commitment to finding
7	durable solutions to local and regional problems; and
8	WHEREAS, Elected to the Colorado House of Representatives in
9	2016 to represent House District 51, Leader McKean wrote in his
10	newsletter, "Love Where I Live", that he was "blessed to help shepherd
11	our wonderful state toward greener pastures and happier days"; and
12	WHEREAS, Elected leader of the Colorado House Republican
13	Caucus in 2020, Leader McKean was known not only for his dedication
14	to the people he served, but also for his rowdy sense of humor, boundless
15	energy, and infectious laughter, which he used to break down barriers and
16	solve problems; and
17	WHEREAS, Leader McKean could argue in the well against a
18	member's bill for hours, then offer them the warmest of hugs and link
19	arms on the way to a committee meeting; he could be found debating
20	policy with colleagues or chatting with children on the floor, giving them
21	spirited tours of the Capitol and toys to play with in his office; and
22	WHEREAS, Raised as a Quaker, Leader McKean's personal
23	society of friends was always expanding; whether you were on the
24	custodial staff in the Capitol building or a member of Congress, Leader
25	McKean saw you and he heard you, as a potential collaborator and as a
26	friend; and
27	WHEREAS, More than 50 of the bills Leader McKean sponsored
28	were signed by the Governor, including bills to support community-based
29	public safety partnerships, promote behavioral health crisis services to
30	school-age students, assist land developers in providing affordable
31	housing, utilize pumped hydroelectricity generation to meet Colorado's
32	renewable energy standard, and offer hunter education courses to seventh
33	grade students; and
34	WHEREAS, Honored by a wide variety of organizations for his
35	achievements, Leader McKean received the Faith, Family, and Freedom

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1 2 3	Award from the Centennial Institute; he was named 2021's Legislator of the Year by the Colorado BioScience Association and one of 2023's Legislators of the Year by the Colorado Chamber of Commerce; he was
4	given the "Champion of Main Street Award" by the Independent
5	Community Bankers of Colorado; and he won the Colorado House of
6	Representatives' chili contest two years in a row; and
7	WHEREAS, Leader McKean spoke about Coloradans not in the
8	abstract, but as real, living people with jobs, loves, and real-life successes
9	and problems. As he said in a speech to the chamber in January 2021,
10	"[I]n the end, the letters by our names are less important than the ideas we
11	have. The people of Colorado just want to know that we care about them,
12	that their voices are heard, and that we are trying our best to make their
13	lives better and give them opportunities to thrive"; and
14	WHEREAS, As Leader McKean laid in state at the Colorado State
15	Capitol, surrounded by his family and fellow lawmakers, by the staff and
16	stakeholders who worked with him and for him, and by all others who
17	mourned him, Weld County Commissioner Scott James reminded us to
18	"Live like Hugh; Laugh like Hugh; Serve like Hugh; [and] Love like
19	Hugh"; now, therefore,
20	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the
21	Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
22	(1) That, in the death of Hugh Monroe McKean, the people of the
23	State of Colorado have lost a devoted public servant, outstanding citizen,
24	and invaluable friend and colleague who will be remembered for his
25	legacy of kindness and leadership;
26	(2) That we, the members of the Colorado House of
27	Representatives, do hereby extend our deep and heartfelt sympathy to the
28	members of his family; and
29	(3) That we pay tribute to a man who served his state well and
30	faithfully; may the memory of his laughter in the chamber and throughout
31	the hallways, committee rooms, and even as far as the cafeteria continue
32	to bless this building that he loved.
