HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 22-1005
CONCERNING RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 1, 2022, AS "BARNEY FORD
DAY".
WHEREAS, The State of Colorado celebrates Black leaders and
their accomplishments during Black History Month; and
WHEREAS, Barney Ford was born enslaved 200 years ago in
1822, escaped at age 26, and wrote to his enslaver, "If I can do better by
myself than I can with you, I feel that I am at liberty to do so; for this is
common to all free men."; and
WHEREAS, Barney Ford was one of the first 50 African
Americans to arrive in Denver in 1860 and was soon called the "King of
Restaurateurs"; and

1	WHEREAS, Barney Ford suffered several significant business
2	losses due to the Great Denver Fire, bankruptcy, and financial ruin, yet
3	remained undeterred in his pursuits; and
4	WHEREAS, Barney Ford was the first African American
5	Coloradan to serve on a grand jury, and he was nominated to the
6	territorial legislature in 1873; and
7	WHEREAS, Barney Ford was one of the territory's Black leaders
8	who petitioned for universal suffrage in the state constitution; and
9	WHEREAS, Barney Ford impacted not just Colorado but the
10	nation with his far-reaching influence and pioneering efforts for Black
11	civil rights; and
12	WHEREAS, A stained glass portrait of Barney Ford hangs in the
13	Colorado House of Representatives chambers in honor of his impact; and
14	WHEREAS, Barney Ford's legacy remains important today as
15	Colorado citizens take stock of where racism persists, and his legacy
16	gives visibility to the people and organizations creating change; now,
17	therefore,
18	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-third
19	General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
20	That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly,
21	recognize and applaud the contributions of Barney Ford to the great state
22	of Colorado and recognize February 1, 2022, as "Barney Ford Day".
