A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE CLASSIFICATION OF BISON AS WILDLIFE UNLESS 102 CLASSIFIED AS LIVESTOCK.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. American Indian Affairs Interim Study Committee. The bill classifies bison as big game wildlife unless the bison are livestock. Classifying bison as wildlife means that hunting or taking one is illegal unless authorized by rule of the parks and wildlife commission.

I	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
2	SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly
3	finds and declares that:
4	(a) The history of the American bison is deeply intertwined with
5	the history of indigenous peoples in North America. Once roaming the
6	continent in vast herds numbering in the tens of millions, bison are a
7	cornerstone of life for many American Indians and are revered as sacred
8	relatives. Many American Indians and Tribal Nations continue to rely
9	upon bison for survival, including for food, shelter, and clothing.
10	(b) Recognizing the bison's critical role in the livelihood of
11	indigenous peoples and in the campaign to continue European claim and
12	control over lands inhabited by indigenous peoples, the United States
13	government implemented a scorched-earth policy, granting military
14	commanders the authority to decimate bison populations;
15	(c) Over a span of 40 years, more than 30 million bison were
16	killed. This mass extermination was not only wasteful and inhumane but
17	also a calculated effort to undermine the cultural and physical survival of
18	indigenous peoples.
19	(d) Colonel Richard Irving Dodge infamously declared, "Kill
20	every buffalo you can! Every buffalo dead is an Indian gone." The policy
21	of killing bison had devastating impacts on American Indians and Tribal
22	Nations and played a significant role in the federal government's efforts
23	to destroy tribal sovereignty. The resulting food and cultural scarcity
24	played a significant role in the forced relocation of the plains peoples
25	from Colorado in the late 1860s. It also contributed to the pressures
26	restricting the Ute people to western Colorado.
27	(e) By the time Colorado achieved statehood in 1876, hunting and

1	habitat destruction caused by the development of farms, cities, and
2	railroads had reduced the bison population to only a few hundred south
3	of the Platte river;
4	(f) Colorado seeks to protect, serve, and honor the enduring bond
5	between bison and American Indians and Tribal Nations by classifying
6	certain bison as wildlife; and
7	(g) This action represents a step toward making amends for the
8	attempted genocide of American Indians through the eradication of their
9	food source, the bison.
10	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 33-1-102, amend (2)
11	and (51); and add (2.6) as follows:
12	33-1-102. Definitions - rules. As used in this title 33, unless the
13	context otherwise requires:
14	(2) "Big game" means elk, white-tailed deer, mule deer, moose,
15	rocky mountain bighorn sheep, desert bighorn sheep, rocky mountain
16	goat, pronghorn antelope, black bear, mountain lion, BISON THAT ARE
17	WILDLIFE, and all species of large mammals that may be introduced or
18	transplanted into this state for hunting or are classified as big game by the
19	commission.
20	(2.6) "BISON" MEANS THE UNGULATE CLASSIFIED AS THE SPECIES
21	Bos bison or Bison bison, known as the American bison.
22	
23	(51) (a) "Wildlife" means wild vertebrates, mollusks, and
24	crustaceans, whether THE ANIMAL IS alive or dead, including IF THE
25	ANIMAL PRESENTLY OR HISTORICALLY EXISTS AS A SPECIES IN A NATURAL
26	WILD STATE IN ITS PLACE OF ORIGIN.
2.7	(b) "WILDLIFE" INCLUDES:

1	(1) BISON; OR
2	(II) Any part, product, egg, or offspring thereof, that exist as a
3	species in a natural wild state in their place of origin, presently or
4	historically, except OF WILDLIFE.
5	(c) "WILDLIFE" DOES NOT INCLUDE:
6	(I) PRIVATELY OWNED CATTLE, INCLUDING PRIVATELY OWNED
7	BISON, BISON LEGALLY REDUCED TO CAPTIVITY, OR BISON THAT HAVE
8	ESCAPED LAWFUL CAPTIVITY;
9	(II) BISON OWNED BY OR LAWFULLY REDUCED TO CAPTIVITY BY AN
10	<u>Indian tribe; or</u>
11	(III) Those species determined to be CLASSIFIED AS domestic
12	animals by rule or regulation by OF the commission and the state
13	agricultural commission, BY STATUTE, OR BY COURT DECISION.
14	(d) Such determination within this statute shall A CLASSIFICATION
15	$\underline{\text{MADE UNDER}}$ SUBSECTION $\underline{(51)(c)(III)}$ OF THIS SECTION DOES not affect
16	other statutes, RULES, or court decisions determining injury to persons or
17	damage to property which THAT depend on the classification of animals
18	by such THE OTHER statute, RULE, or court decision as LIVESTOCK OR wild
19	or domestic animals.
20	SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act
21	takes effect January 1, 2026; except that, if a referendum petition is filed
22	pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this
23	act or an item, section, or part of this act within the ninety-day period
24	after final adjournment of the general assembly, then the act, item,
25	section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the
26	general election to be held in November 2026 and, in such case, will take
