A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 **CONCERNING MODIFICATIONS TO THE COLORADO HEALTH SERVICE**
102 **CORPS PROGRAM ADMINISTERED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF**
103 **PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT TO EXPAND THE**
104 **AVAILABILITY OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS IN**
105 **SHORTAGE AREAS IN THE STATE, AND, IN CONNECTION**
106 **THEREWITH, MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.**

Committee. The bill modifies the Colorado health service corps program administered by the primary care office in the department of public health and environment as follows:

- ! For purposes of determining areas in the state in which there is a shortage of health care professionals and behavioral health care providers to meet the needs of the community, allows the primary care office, under guidance adopted by the state board of health, to develop and administer state health professional shortage areas using state-specific methodologies;
- ! Allows behavioral health care providers, which include licensed and certified addiction counselors, licensed professional counselors, licensed clinical social workers, licensed marriage and family therapists, clinical psychologists, advanced practice nurses, and physicians certified or trained in addiction medicine, pain management, or psychiatry, and candidates for licensure as an addiction counselor, professional counselor, clinical social worker, marriage and family therapist, or psychologist, to participate in the loan repayment program on the condition of committing to provide behavioral health care services in health professional shortage areas for a specified period;
- ! Directs the advisory council to prioritize loan repayment and scholarships for those behavioral health care providers, candidates for licensure, or addiction counselors who provide behavioral health care services in nonprofit or public employer settings but permits consideration of applicants practicing in a private setting that serves underserved populations;
- ! Establishes a scholarship program to help defray the education and training costs associated with obtaining certification as an addiction counselor or with progressing to a higher level of certification;
- ! Adds 2 members to the advisory council that reviews program applications, which members include a representative of an organization representing substance use disorder treatment providers and a licensed or certified addiction counselor who has experience in rural health, safety net clinics, or health equity;
- ! Modifies program reporting requirements and requires annual reporting that coincides with required SMART Act reporting by the department; and
- ! Requires the general assembly to annually appropriate \$2.5 million from the marijuana tax cash fund to the primary

care office to provide loan repayment for behavioral health care providers and candidates for licensure participating in the Colorado health service corps and to award scholarships to addiction counselors participating in the scholarship program.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly
3 finds and determines that:

4 (a) Colorado faces a health care workforce shortage in many
5 health care areas, including a shortage in behavioral health care providers
6 who work with patients with mental health and substance use disorders;

7 (b) With an opioid epidemic and increasing overdose rates
8 affecting all corners of the state, the need for health professionals who
9 can treat patients with substance use disorders is particularly acute;

10 (c) Additionally, providers who seek to hire mental health and
11 substance use disorder professionals report difficulty in filling positions,
12 leading to reduced services despite having the physical space for beds or
13 outpatient treatment rooms;

14 (d) The state currently operates a loan repayment program, known
15 as the Colorado health service corps, that targets the need for primary care
16 services in health professional shortage areas throughout the state by
17 providing loan repayment to a health care professional who commits to
18 practicing and providing primary care in a shortage area for a minimum
19 period;

20 (e) The Colorado health service corps program, in its current
21 form, is limited to specific providers providing primary or psychiatric
22 care in areas of the state designated as health professional shortage areas
23 under federal guidelines;

1 shortage areas;

2 (II) Establish a scholarship program to provide financial
3 assistance to addiction counselors seeking initial or a higher level of
4 certification to defray education and training costs in exchange for a
5 commitment to provide behavioral health care services in health
6 professional shortage areas;

7 (III) Allow the primary care office, under guidelines adopted by
8 the state board of health, to designate health professional shortage areas
9 in the state using state-specific guidelines rather than federal guidelines;

10 (IV) Add representatives of substance use disorder service
11 providers to the advisory council that reviews and makes
12 recommendations on loan repayment applications; and

13 (V) Dedicate an amount of money from the marijuana tax cash
14 fund to provide loan repayment to behavioral health care providers and
15 candidates for licensure and scholarships to addiction counselors in order
16 to expand access to behavioral health care services to individuals
17 suffering from a mental health or substance use disorder.

18 (2) The general assembly further finds that expanding access to
19 the health care professional loan repayment program to behavioral health
20 care providers will expand access to behavioral health care services and
21 treatment for people with mental health or substance use disorders, and
22 therefore, the use of retail marijuana tax revenues to fund loan
23 repayments for behavioral health care providers under the Colorado
24 health service corps program is authorized under section 39-28.8-501
25 (2)(b)(IV)(C).

26 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-402, **add (11)**
27 as follows:

1 **25-1.5-402. Definitions.** As used in this part 4, unless the context
2 otherwise requires:

3 (11) "STATE-DESIGNATED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
4 AREA" MEANS AN AREA OF THE STATE DESIGNATED BY THE PRIMARY CARE
5 OFFICE, IN ACCORDANCE WITH STATE-SPECIFIC METHODOLOGIES
6 ESTABLISHED BY THE STATE BOARD BY RULE PURSUANT TO SECTION
7 25-1.5-404 (1)(a), AS EXPERIENCING A SHORTAGE OF HEALTH CARE
8 PROFESSIONALS OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS.

9 **SECTION 3.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-404, **amend**
10 (1)(a) as follows:

11 **25-1.5-404. Primary care office - powers and duties - rules.**

12 (1) The primary care office has, at a minimum, the following powers and
13 duties:

14 (a) To assess the health care AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
15 professional needs of areas throughout the state AND CREATE AND
16 ADMINISTER STATE-DESIGNATED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREAS
17 IN ACCORDANCE WITH STATE BOARD RULES ADOPTED UNDER THIS
18 SUBSECTION (1)(a) ESTABLISHING STATE-SPECIFIC METHODOLOGIES FOR
19 DESIGNATING AREAS EXPERIENCING A SHORTAGE OF HEALTH CARE
20 PROFESSIONALS OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS. THE PRIMARY
21 CARE OFFICE SHALL COORDINATE WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CARE
22 POLICY AND FINANCING IN DEVELOPING THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL
23 SHORTAGE AREA DESIGNATION METHODOLOGIES AND IN DRAFTING RULES
24 UNDER THIS SUBSECTION (1)(a).

25 **SECTION 4.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **amend** 25-1.5-501
26 as follows:

27 **25-1.5-501. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly

1 hereby finds that there are areas of Colorado that suffer from a lack of
2 health care professionals OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS to
3 serve, and a lack of nursing or other health care professional faculty to
4 train health care professionals to meet, the medical AND BEHAVIORAL
5 HEALTH CARE needs of communities. The general assembly further finds
6 that the state needs to implement incentives to encourage health care
7 professionals AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS to practice in
8 these underserved areas and to encourage nursing faculty and other health
9 care professional faculty to teach ~~these~~ health care professionals.

10 (2) It is therefore the intent of the general assembly in enacting
11 this part 5 to create a state health service corps program that uses state
12 ~~money~~ MONEY, federal ~~money~~ MONEY, when permissible, and
13 contributions from communities and private sources to help repay the
14 outstanding education loans that many health care professionals,
15 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS, CANDIDATES FOR LICENSURE,
16 nursing faculty, and health care professional faculty hold. In exchange for
17 repayment of loans incurred for the purpose of obtaining education in
18 their chosen health care AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE professions, the
19 health care professionals, BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS, AND
20 CANDIDATES FOR LICENSURE will commit to provide health care OR
21 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE services, AS APPLICABLE, in communities with
22 underserved health care OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE needs throughout
23 the state, and the nursing and health care professional faculty will commit
24 to providing a specified period of service in a qualified faculty position.

25 (3) IN ADDITION, FOR PURPOSES OF INCREASING THE AVAILABILITY
26 OF CERTIFIED ADDICTION COUNSELORS, IT IS THE INTENT OF THE GENERAL
27 ASSEMBLY TO CREATE A SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM TO PROVIDE

1 SCHOLARSHIPS TO ADDICTION COUNSELORS WHO, IN EXCHANGE FOR
2 RECEIVING SCHOLARSHIPS TO ASSIST THEM IN OBTAINING THE REQUIRED
3 EDUCATION AND TRAINING TO BE CERTIFIED AS AN ADDICTION
4 COUNSELOR, COMMIT TO PRACTICE IN A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
5 AREA FOR A SPECIFIED PERIOD.

6 **SECTION 5.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-502, **add**
7 (1.3), (1.5), (1.7), (6.5), (12), (13), and (14) as follows:

8 **25-1.5-502. Definitions.** As used in this part 5, unless the context
9 otherwise requires:

10 (1.3) "BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDER" MEANS THE
11 FOLLOWING PROVIDERS WHO PROVIDE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
12 SERVICES WITHIN THEIR SCOPE OF PRACTICE:

13 (a) A LICENSED ADDICTION COUNSELOR;

14 (b) A CERTIFIED ADDICTION COUNSELOR;

15 (c) A LICENSED PROFESSIONAL COUNSELOR;

16 (d) A LICENSED CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKER;

17 (e) A LICENSED MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPIST;

18 (f) A LICENSED PSYCHOLOGIST;

19 (g) A LICENSED PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT WITH SPECIFIC TRAINING IN

20 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS;

21 (h) AN ADVANCED PRACTICE NURSE WITH SPECIFIC TRAINING IN
22 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS, PAIN MANAGEMENT, OR PSYCHIATRIC
23 NURSING; OR

24 (i) A PHYSICIAN WITH SPECIFIC BOARD CERTIFICATION OR
25 TRAINING IN ADDICTION MEDICINE, PAIN MANAGEMENT, OR PSYCHIATRY.

26 (1.5) "BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE SERVICES" MEANS SERVICES FOR
27 THE PREVENTION, DIAGNOSIS, AND TREATMENT OF, AND THE RECOVERY

1 FROM, MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS.

2 (1.7) "CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE" MEANS A PERSON WHO:

3 (a) IS A CANDIDATE FOR A LICENSE AS A LICENSED PSYCHOLOGIST,
4 CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKER, MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPIST, LICENSED
5 PROFESSIONAL COUNSELOR, OR ADDICTION COUNSELOR;

6 (b) HAS COMPLETED A MASTER'S DEGREE OR, FOR A PSYCHOLOGIST
7 LICENSURE CANDIDATE, HAS COMPLETED A DOCTORAL DEGREE;

8 (c) HAS NOT YET COMPLETED THE SUPERVISED EXPERIENCE HOURS
9 REQUIRED FOR LICENSURE PURSUANT TO SECTION 12-43-304 (1)(d),
10 12-43-404 (2)(c), 12-43-504 (1)(d), 12-43-603 (1)(d), OR 12-43-804
11 (1)(g), AS APPLICABLE; AND

12 (d) Is OR WILL BE PROVIDING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
13 SERVICES.

14 (6.5) "HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA" MEANS A
15 FEDERALLY DESIGNATED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA OR A
16 STATE-DESIGNATED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA.

17 (12) "SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM" MEANS THE SCHOLARSHIP
18 PROGRAM FOR ADDICTION COUNSELORS CREATED IN SECTION
19 25-1.5-503.5.

20 (13) "STATE-DESIGNATED HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
21 AREA" MEANS AN AREA OF THE STATE DESIGNATED BY THE PRIMARY CARE
22 OFFICE, IN ACCORDANCE WITH STATE-SPECIFIC METHODOLOGIES
23 ESTABLISHED BY THE STATE BOARD BY RULE PURSUANT TO SECTION
24 25-1.5-404 (1)(a), AS EXPERIENCING A SHORTAGE OF HEALTH CARE
25 PROFESSIONALS OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS.

26 (14) "UNDERSERVED POPULATION" MEANS ANY OF THE
27 FOLLOWING:

3 (b) INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE PROVIDED SERVICES BY A BEHAVIORAL
4 HEALTH CARE PROVIDER AND ARE EITHER CHARGED FEES ON A SLIDING
5 SCALE BASED UPON INCOME OR ARE SERVED WITHOUT CHARGE.

6 **SECTION 6.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-503, amend
7 (1), (2), (5), and (6) as follows:

25-1.5-503. Colorado health service corps - program - creation

9 - **conditions - rules.** (1) (a) (I) Beginning July 1, 2009, The primary care
10 office shall maintain and administer, subject to available appropriations,
11 the Colorado health service corps. Subject to available appropriations, the
12 Colorado health service corps shall provide loan repayment for certain
13 eligible:

14 (A) Health care professionals who provide primary health
15 services; Beginning July 1, 2011, the Colorado health service corps shall
16 also provide loan repayment for certain eligible

17 (B) Nursing faculty or health care professional faculty members
18 in qualified faculty positions; AND

19 (C) BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS AND CANDIDATES FOR
20 LICENSURE WHO PROVIDE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE SERVICES.

11 (B) IN CONSIDERATION FOR RECEIVING REPAYMENT OF ALL OR
12 PART OF HIS OR HER EDUCATION LOAN, THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
13 PROVIDER OR CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE SHALL AGREE TO PROVIDE
14 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE SERVICES IN HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
15 AREAS IN COLORADO.

16 (IV) In consideration for receiving repayment of all or part of his
17 or her education loan, the nursing or other health care professional faculty
18 member must agree to serve two or more consecutive academic years in
19 a qualified faculty position.

12 health services; ~~are not eligible for loan repayments through the Colorado~~
13 ~~health service corps~~ AND

14 (II) BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS AND CANDIDATES FOR
15 LICENSURE WHO ARE NOT PROVIDING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
16 SERVICES.

17 (d) (I) As a condition of receiving a loan repayment through the
18 Colorado health service corps, a health care professional OR BEHAVIORAL
19 HEALTH CARE PROVIDER must enter into a contract pursuant to which the
20 health care professional OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDER agrees
21 to practice for at least two years in a community that is located in a
22 ~~federally designated~~ health professional shortage area. The health care
23 professional OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, AS APPLICABLE, the
24 primary care office, and the community employer with which the health
25 care professional OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE PROVIDER is practicing
26 must be parties to the contract.

27 (II) As a condition of receiving a loan repayment through the

1 Colorado health service corps, a nursing faculty or health care
2 professional faculty member must enter into a contract pursuant to which
3 he or she agrees to serve at least two consecutive academic years or their
4 equivalent in a qualified faculty position. The nursing faculty or health
5 care professional faculty member, the primary care office, and the
6 educational institution where the qualified faculty position is located must
7 be parties to the contract.

8 (III) AS A CONDITION OF RECEIVING A LOAN REPAYMENT THROUGH
9 THE COLORADO HEALTH SERVICE CORPS, A CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE
10 MUST ENTER INTO A CONTRACT PURSUANT TO WHICH THE CANDIDATE FOR
11 LICENSURE AGREES TO PRACTICE FOR AT LEAST TWO YEARS AFTER
12 OBTAINING THE LICENSE, PLUS AN ADDITIONAL AMOUNT OF TIME
13 EQUIVALENT TO THE TIME SPENT OBTAINING THE SUPERVISED EXPERIENCE
14 HOURS REQUIRED FOR LICENSURE WHILE PARTICIPATING IN THE PROGRAM,
15 IN A COMMUNITY THAT IS LOCATED IN A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
16 AREA. THE CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE, THE PRIMARY CARE OFFICE, AND
17 THE COMMUNITY EMPLOYER WITH WHICH THE CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE
18 IS PRACTICING MUST BE PARTIES TO THE CONTRACT.

19 (2) Subject to available appropriations, the primary care office
20 shall annually select health care professionals, BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE
21 PROVIDERS, CANDIDATES FOR LICENSURE, nursing faculty members, and
22 health care professional members from the list provided by the advisory
23 council pursuant to ~~section 25-1.5-504 (6)~~ SECTION 25-1.5-504 (5)(a) to
24 participate in the Colorado health service corps.

25 (5) (a) A health care professional participating in the Colorado
26 health service corps shall not practice with a for-profit private group or
27 solo practice or at a proprietary hospital or clinic.

23 **SECTION 7.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** 25-1.5-503.5 as
24 follows:

25 **25-1.5-503.5. Scholarship program for addiction counselors -**
26 **creation - eligibility - conditions - rules.** (1) BEGINNING IN THE 2018-19
27 STATE FISCAL YEAR, THE PRIMARY CARE OFFICE SHALL MAINTAIN AND

1 ADMINISTER A SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM TO ASSIST IN INCREASING THE
2 POPULATION OF CERTIFIED ADDICTION COUNSELORS PROVIDING
3 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE SERVICES IN HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE
4 AREAS. SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, THE PRIMARY CARE
5 OFFICE SHALL AWARD SCHOLARSHIPS TO HELP DEFRAY THE EDUCATION
6 AND TRAINING COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH OBTAINING CERTIFICATION AS AN
7 ADDICTION COUNSELOR OR WITH PROGRESSING TO A HIGHER LEVEL OF
8 CERTIFICATION FOR APPLICANTS WHO AGREE TO PRACTICE IN A HEALTH
9 PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA FOR A SPECIFIED PERIOD.

10 (2) UNDER THE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM, SUBJECT TO THE
11 LIMITATIONS SPECIFIED IN THIS SECTION, UPON ENTERING INTO A
12 SCHOLARSHIP CONTRACT, THE STATE MAY PAY UP TO THE FULL COST OF
13 EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS AND DIRECT EXPENSES ASSOCIATED WITH
14 EDUCATION AND TRAINING REQUIRED FOR CERTIFICATION AS AN
15 ADDICTION COUNSELOR OR FOR PROGRESSING TO A HIGHER LEVEL OF
16 ADDICTION COUNSELOR CERTIFICATION, WHICH AMOUNT SHALL BE PAID TO
17 THE ACADEMIC INSTITUTION OR STATE-APPROVED TRAINER WHERE THE
18 ADDICTION COUNSELOR STUDENT IS ENROLLED OR PARTICIPATING.

19 (3) AS A CONDITION OF RECEIVING A SCHOLARSHIP AWARD TO
20 ASSIST WITH OBTAINING CERTIFICATION OR A HIGHER LEVEL OF
21 CERTIFICATION, AN APPLICANT MUST ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH THE
22 PRIMARY CARE OFFICE PURSUANT TO WHICH HE OR SHE AGREES TO SERVE
23 AT LEAST SIX CONSECUTIVE MONTHS IN A COMMUNITY THAT IS LOCATED
24 IN A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA.

25 (4) SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, THE PRIMARY CARE
26 OFFICE SHALL ANNUALLY SELECT APPLICANTS FROM THE LIST PROVIDED
27 BY THE ADVISORY COUNCIL PURSUANT TO SECTION 25-1.5-504 (5)(b) FOR

1 SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS UNDER THIS SECTION.

2 (5) FOR PURPOSES OF RECOMMENDING SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS, THE
3 ADVISORY COUNCIL SHALL PRIORITIZE ADDICTION COUNSELORS WHO ARE
4 PRACTICING WITH A NONPROFIT OR PUBLIC EMPLOYER. THE ADVISORY
5 COUNCIL MAY ALSO CONSIDER FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SCHOLARSHIP
6 PROGRAM ADDICTION COUNSELORS WHO ARE PRACTICING WITH A
7 FOR-PROFIT EMPLOYER, SUCH AS A PRIVATE PRACTICE OR OTHER SITE,
8 THAT PROVIDES SERVICES TO AN UNDERSERVED POPULATION.

9 (6) IN THE EVENT OF A BREACH OF CONTRACT FOR A SCHOLARSHIP
10 ENTERED INTO UNDER THIS SECTION, THE PRIMARY CARE OFFICE SHALL
11 ENFORCE THE CONTRACT AND COLLECT ANY DAMAGES OR OTHER
12 PENALTIES OWED.

13 **SECTION 8.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-504, **amend**
