HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 21-1013
CONCERNING HONORING AND COMMEMORATING THE SERVICE
MEMBERS WHO HAVE PAID THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE TO OUR
NATION IN RECOGNITION OF MEMORIAL DAY.
WHEREAS, Brave Americans from all walks of life, all corners
of this nation, and some from around the world have fought, sacrificed, and died in service to this nation since its founding; and
WHEREAS, Memorial Day has various origins from our Civil
War. On May 1, 1865, more than 1,000 Black Americans recently freed
from enslavement, accompanied by regiments of the U.S. Colored
Troops, including the Massachusetts 54th Infantry Regiment and a
handful of White Charlestonians, gathered in a POW camp in Charleston,
South Carolina, to consecrate a new proper burial site for the over 250
Union soldiers who died in the POW camp singing hymns, reading

1 2	scripture, and distributing flowers around the cemetery, which they dedicated to the "Martyrs of the Race Course"; and
3	WHEREAS, In May 1868, General John A. Logan, the
4	commander in chief of the Union veterans group known as the "Grand
5	Army of the Republic", issued a decree that May 30 should become a
6	nationwide day of commemoration for the more than 620,000 soldiers
7	killed in the recently ended Civil War, and should be known as
8 9	Decoration Day, where Americans lay flowers and decorate the graves of those who died in the war; and
10	WHEREAS, Decoration Day continued until after World War I
11 12	when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war; and
13	WHEREAS, In 1968, Congress passed the "Uniform Monday
14	Holiday Act", which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in
15	May, with the changes going into effect in 1971, officially declaring
16	Memorial Day a federal holiday; and
17	WHEREAS, More than 1.1 million Americans have made the
18	ultimate sacrifice and have been killed in all U.S. wars, including well
19	over 3,000 Coloradans; now, therefore,
20	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-third
21	General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
22	That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, honor
23	and commemorate those service members who have paid the ultimate
24	sacrifice to a grateful nation by taking a moment of silence to reflect on
25	the lives lost, on how their sacrifices have shaped this nation and have
26	allowed us the freedom and privilege to serve in this great body, and on
27	the friends and family who were left behind by the sacrifices of those
28	brave men and women.
29	Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent
30	to the commanders of the American Legion posts in Colorado; the
31	commanders of the Veterans of Foreign Wars posts in Colorado; the
32	commanders of Colorado's active military bases; the U.S. Air Force

Academy; the Pikes Peak Chapter of Gold Star Mothers; the Denver

Chapter of Gold Star Wives; the chapters of the Blue Star Mothers of

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- Colorado; the Colorado Fallen Heroes Memorial Organization; and the Colorado Freedom Memorial Foundation. 1
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
