A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 **CONCERNING A PROHIBITION AGAINST ENGAGING IN PRICE GOUGING.**

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. Under current law, a person engages in an unfair and unconscionable act or practice in violation of consumer protection laws (unfair act) if the person engages in price gouging during a declared disaster. The bill adds engaging in price gouging in the sale of necessities as an unfair act and creates a presumption that, if the price of a necessity is increased by 10% or more above the average price that the necessity cost during the 90 days preceding the price increase, the price increase amounts to price gouging.

The bill also defines "necessities" as goods or services that are necessary for the health, safety, and welfare of consumers or of the general public.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-703,
3 **amend** (3) as follows:

4 **24-33.5-703. Definitions.** As used in this part 7, unless the
5 context otherwise requires:

6 (3) "Disaster" means the occurrence or imminent threat of
7 widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property resulting
8 from any natural cause or cause of human origin, including but not
9 limited to fire; flood; earthquake; wind; storm; wave action; hazardous
10 substance incident; oil spill or other water contamination requiring
11 emergency action to avert danger or damage; volcanic activity; epidemic;
12 air pollution; blight; drought; infestation; explosion; civil disturbance;
13 hostile military or paramilitary action; A MARKET DISRUPTION, INCLUDING
14 A TRADE DISRUPTION OR AN ATYPICAL DISRUPTION IN THE MARKET THAT
15 AFFECTS PRODUCTION, DISTRIBUTION, OR CONSUMPTION OF A PRODUCT OR
16 SERVICE; or a condition of riot, insurrection, or invasion existing in the
17 state or in any county, city, town, or district in the state.

18 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 6-1-730, **add** (2.5)
19 as follows:

20 **6-1-730. Price gouging during declared disaster prohibited -**
21 **deceptive trade practice - legislative declaration - definitions.** (2.5) IF
22 THE GOVERNOR DECLARES A DISASTER EMERGENCY PURSUANT TO SECTION
23 24-33.5-704 (4) AND THE DISASTER EMERGENCY DECLARATION CITES TO
24 THIS SUBSECTION (2.5), A PRICE INCREASE IN THE SALE OR OFFER FOR SALE

1 OF ANY GOOD OR SERVICE LISTED IN SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION
2 AMOUNTS TO PRICE GOUGING IF THE PRICE HAS INCREASED BY MORE THAN
3 TEN PERCENT OF THE PRICE AT WHICH THE SELLER SOLD OR OFFERED FOR
4 SALE SIMILAR GOODS OR SERVICES BEFORE THE DISASTER BEGAN OR, IF
5 THE SELLER DID NOT SELL OR OFFER FOR SALE SIMILAR GOODS OR
6 SERVICES BEFORE THE DISASTER BEGAN, THE PRICE AT WHICH A SIMILARLY
7 SITUATED SELLER SOLD OR OFFERED FOR SALE SIMILAR GOODS OR
8 SERVICES BEFORE THE DISASTER BEGAN.

9 **SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date -**
10 **applicability.** (1) This act takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following
11 the expiration of the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the
12 general assembly; except that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant
13 to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an
14 item, section, or part of this act within such period, then the act, item,
15 section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the
16 general election to be held in November 2026 and, in such case, will take
17 effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by the
18 governor.

19 (2) This act applies to conduct occurring on or after the applicable
20 effective date of this act.
