J.002	Staff-prepared appropriation amendment

## **Current Appropriations Clause in Bill**

The bill includes a provision that appropriates a total of \$233,018 cash funds from the Division of Insurance Cash Fund to the Department of Regulatory Agencies for FY 2022-23, based on the assumption that the department will require an additional 1.6 FTE. Of that amount, \$88,713 is reappropriated to the Department of Law, based on the assumption that the department will require an additional 0.5 FTE. A further \$7,506 cash funds from the Health Facilities General Licensure Cash Fund is appropriated to the Department of Public Health and Environment for FY 2022-23, based on the assumption that the department will require an additional 0.1 FTE.

# **Description of Amendments in This Packet**

**J.002** Staff has prepared amendment **J.002** (attached) to change the existing clause to appropriate the funds to different line items in the Department of Public Health & Environment. There is also a technical correction to the title of the bill. This amendment does not change the fiscal impact of the bill.

#### **Points to Consider**

# General Fund Impact

The Joint Budget Committee has proposed a budget package for FY 2022-23 based on the March 2022 Legislative Council Staff revenue forecast. The budget package includes two set-asides:

- \$40.0 million General Fund for bills that create ongoing obligations; and
- \$900.0 million General Fund for bills that create one-time obligations in FY 2022-23.

The \$40.0 million *appropriations* set-aside includes an additional \$6.0 million General Fund to provide a 15.0 percent General Fund reserve for those appropriations. The \$900.0 million *obligations* set-aside does not include an additional amount for a General Fund reserve and, assumes, but does not require, that obligations be addressed through statutory transfers rather than appropriations. Therefore *appropriations* from the \$900.0 million set-aside require an additional 15.0 percent to maintain the statutory General Fund reserve.

Pursuant to Section 10-3-209 (4), C.R.S., taxes on insurance premiums are credited to the Division of Insurance Cash Fund (with a maximum transfer of five percent of premium tax collections) to cover appropriations made by the General Assembly. Any increase in appropriations reduces the amount of tax revenue deposited in the General Fund, thereby reducing the \$900.0 million General Fund set aside for one-time obligations. The bill is anticipated to reduce the set-aside by \$233,018.
