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### Summary Information

**Overview.** The bill creates transparency and notification requirements for metropolitan districts and sellers of residential property within metropolitan districts.

**Types of impacts.** The bill is projected to affect the following areas on an ongoing basis:

## Summary of Legislation

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The bill requires that metropolitan districts notify residents through postcard or e-mail about the district's annual meeting where financial information is shared, and where residents can ask questions about the district. At this meeting, self-nomination and acceptance forms must be available to residents in paper form.

Metropolitan districts that are required to have a publicly available website must include certain information, including information on annual meetings, what services the metropolitan district provides, and the name and contact information of an individual residents can call outside of regular business hours to address questions and concerns about the metropolitan district.

Under current law, sellers of certain residential properties with new construction located within the boundaries of metropolitan districts must provide disclosures about the district and its authority to issue debt and levy mills for property taxes. The bill requires this disclosure to be made by owners of any residential real property located within the boundaries of a metropolitan district organized after January 1, 2000.

Beginning January 1, 2025, metropolitan districts that submit a service plan to county commissioners must include in the plan certain information on debt service mill levies.

## Local Government

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The bill increases workload and expenditures for certain metropolitan districts to notify residents about annual meetings and modify their websites to comply with the bill. Districts may also incur expenses to have a person available outside of business hours to address questions or concerns from residents.

## Effective Date

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The bill was signed into law by the Governor on May 29, 2025, and takes effect on August 6, 2025, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
