101	CONCERNING THE INSTALLATION OF A BRONZE SCULPTURE AND
102	EXPLANATORY PLAQUE ON THE STATE CAPITOL GROUNDS TO
103	HONOR THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO SERVE ABOARD THE U.S.S.

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, The State Capitol and its grounds contain memorials to the state's political past as well as memorabilia promoting the state's natural environment and history of events, individuals, and ethnic groups; and
5 6 7	WHEREAS, From time to time, proposals for gifts of art and memorials are made to the state to be placed in the State Capitol or on its grounds; and
8	WHEREAS, Section 24-82-108 (3)(h), Colorado Revised Statutes,

requires the State Capitol Building Advisory Committee to establish 1 2 criteria and a procedure for the evaluation of proposals for gifts of 3 memorials for placement in the State Capitol or on its grounds; and 4 WHEREAS, The State Capitol Building Advisory Committee's 5 evaluation criteria for a memorial is based partly upon the association the proposed memorial has with a significant event in the state's history, the 6 connection of the memorial with persons significant in the heritage of the 7 8 state, and its appropriateness to the designated area of the State Capitol; 9 and 10 WHEREAS, The procedure stipulates that, if the Capital 11 Development Committee and the Governor concur with the State Capitol Building Advisory Committee's recommendations regarding the 12 placement of memorials on the State Capitol grounds, the Capital 13 14 Development Committee may make its recommendation for acceptance of the donated art to the General Assembly in the form of a Joint 15 Resolution introduced during an annual legislative session; and 16 17 WHEREAS, The State Capitol Building Advisory Committee and the Capital Development Committee have approved a plan for placement 18 19 of a bronze sculpture and an accompanying explanatory plaque in the south wing on the first floor of the State Capitol building, consistent with 20 the military theme of that area; and 21 22 WHEREAS, The proposed language for the explanatory plaque 23 reads as follows: 24 "SHIP'S CREST OF THE U.S.S. Colorado (SSN-788) 25 This bronze bas-relief sculpture of the Ship's Crest of the U.S.S. Colorado is a replica of the sculpture that is permanently mounted in the 26 27 Ward Room on board the U.S.S. Colorado (SSN-788) submarine. The original was presented to the ship's crew during the christening ceremony 28 on December 3, 2016, in Groton, Connecticut. 29 30 The art is the work of USN Ensign Michael Nielson, originally from Arvada, Colorado, and was selected from 140 entries in a blind 31 32 competition for selecting the design of the crest. The bronze sculpture is 33 the work of Native American artist Doug Hyde, a Vietnam veteran and 34 nationally noted bronze artist.

- 1 The U.S.S. Colorado was assembled at the Electric Boat shipyard in 2 Groton, Connecticut, where the christening took place. The U.S.S. 3 Colorado is capable of launching surface-to-air missiles. It is a 4 nuclear-powered boat and will not require refueling during its life, expected to be about 33 years. Its operational distances will be unlimited 5 and the submarine is capable of diving to depths greater than 800 feet. 6 The U.S.S. Colorado was christened on December 3, 2017, and will be 7 8 commissioned into active service on March 17, 2018. 9 The Colorado Thirty Group is a Colorado non-profit corporation that was founded in 1978 and serves to "educate, inform, and foster understanding 10 and cooperation between the civilian community, the government of the 11 12 United States, and the U.S. armed forces.""; and 13 WHEREAS, The sculpture and the plaque would serve to honor 14 the men and women who serve on the U.S.S. Colorado and remind them of the support and gratitude of the citizens of Colorado for what they do 15 to defend our great nation, and to remind the citizens of Colorado that the 16 U.S.S. Colorado works tirelessly to defend us all; now, therefore, 17 18 Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Seventy-first General Assembly 19
 - of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring herein:
