#### **Summary of Legislation**

Under current law, regular special district elections occur on the Tuesday after the first Monday of May in every even-numbered year. This bill changes the years that special district elections are held to odd-numbered years, and changes the term for special district directors to three years for 2020 and 2022; director terms will reset to four year terms in 2023 and 2025.

## **Background**

The Division of Local Government in the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) provides election resources, technical assistance, and training for special district elections. Special districts are required to file their election results and director oaths, bonds, and appointment documents with the Division of Local Government. There are over 2,200 special districts that must file their election results with DOLA; approximately 10 percent of these require technical assistance from the department.

### **State Expenditures**

This bill shifts election workload from 2024 to 2023, resulting in a shift in election-related workload from even to odd years. For FY 2022-23, workload will increase for the Division of Local Government in DOLA to provide election resources, including forms, technical assistance, and training for special districts for special district elections in 2023. It is expected that this change in workload can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

## **Local Government**

Workload and costs for special districts may minimally increase to notify residents in the special district of the change in the election date and to submit documents to DOLA. This bill is not expected to increase or decrease the actual election costs for special districts or county clerks and recorders that assist with coordinated elections, other than shifting the year they occur.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect August 8, 2018, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 9, 2018, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.
