A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING THE CONTINUATION OF THE COLORADO COMMISSION
102	FOR THE DEAF, HARD OF HEARING, AND DEAFBLIND, AND, IN
103	CONNECTION THEREWITH, IMPLEMENTING THE
104	RECOMMENDATIONS CONTAINED IN THE 2023 SUNSET REPORT
105	BY THE DEPARTMENT OF REGULATORY AGENCIES AND MAKING
106	AN APPROPRIATION.

Reading Unamended April 11, 2024 **Committee.** The bill implements the recommendations in the department of regulatory agencies' 2023 sunset review and report on the Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind (commission) by:

- Continuing the commission for 7 years, until 2031;
- Establishing a permanent state auxiliary services program;
 and
- Changing the name of the deafblind citizens council to the deafblind advisory council.

1	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
2	SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly
3	finds and declares that:
4	(a) The Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and
5	deafblind was established to facilitate the provision of state and local
6	government services to the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind, while
7	making government more efficient;
8	(b) Under the federal "Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990",
9	42 U.S.C. sec. 12101 et seq., as amended, Colorado has a duty to provide
10	equivalent access to state government and public accommodations to the
11	deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind;
12	(c) This duty requires state departments and agencies to provide
13	auxiliary services, communications technology equipment, and other
14	resources to ensure access;
15	(d) Auxiliary services include sign language interpretation
16	services, real-time captioning services, and other vital communication
17	aids and access services;
18	(e) These services are necessary for people who are deaf, hard of
19	hearing, and deafblind to communicate effectively with one another; and
20	(f) The state of Colorado does not have a centralized, statewide
21	system to provide communication access services for the deaf, hard of

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1	hearing, and deafblind.
2	(2) Therefore, the general assembly declares that the Colorado
3	commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind in the department
4	of human services, in collaboration with the department of personnel and
5	administration and the department of labor and employment, shall consult
6	and make recommendations to the general assembly and the governor's
7	office on how to establish a centralized, statewide auxiliary services
8	program to arrange for the provision of auxiliary services for state
9	departments and agencies, including the governor's office, that employ or
10	serve individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing, or deafblind.
11	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-21-108, amend
12	(1) as follows:
13	26-21-108. Repeal of article - sunset review. (1) This article
14	ARTICLE 21 is repealed, effective September 1, 2024 2031.
15	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-34-104, repeal
16	(25)(a)(XII); and add (32)(a)(XI) as follows:
17	24-34-104. General assembly review of regulatory agencies
18	and functions for repeal, continuation, or reestablishment - legislative
19	declaration - repeal. (25) (a) The following agencies, functions, or both,
20	are scheduled for repeal on September 1, 2024:
21	(XII) The Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and
22	deafblind created in article 21 of title 26;
23	(32) (a) The following agencies, functions, or both, are scheduled
24	for repeal on September 1, 2031:
25	(XI) THE COLORADO COMMISSION FOR THE DEAF, HARD OF
26	HEARING, AND DEAFBLIND CREATED IN ARTICLE 21 OF TITLE 26.
27	SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-21-103, amend

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1	(1); repeal (2); and add (1.5) as follows:
2	26-21-103. Definitions. As used in this article 21, unless the
3	context otherwise requires:
4	(1) "Auxiliary services" means those aids and services that assist
5	in effective communication with a person who is deaf, hard of hearing,
6	or deafblind, including but not limited to:
7	(a) The services of a qualified interpreter as defined by section
8	13-90-202 (8);
9	(b) The provision of a qualified communication access realtime
10	translation (CART) reporter;
11	(c) The provision of an assistive listening device; or
12	(d) The acquisition or modification of equipment or devices to
13	assist in effective communication with a person who is deaf, hard of
14	hearing, or deafblind. "ADVISORY COUNCIL" MEANS THE COLORADO
15	DEAFBLIND ADVISORY COUNCIL APPOINTED BY THE COMMISSION IN
16	ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION $26-21-105$ (2)(f).
17	(1.5) "AUXILIARY SERVICES" MEANS THOSE AIDS AND SERVICES
18	THAT ASSIST IN EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION WITH A PERSON WHO IS DEAF,
19	HARD OF HEARING, OR DEAFBLIND. "AUXILIARY SERVICES" ARE ALSO
20	KNOWN AS "COMMUNICATION ACCESS SERVICES" AND MAY INCLUDE BUT
21	ARE NOT LIMITED TO:
22	(a) The services of a qualified interpreter as defined in
23	SECTION 13-90-202 (8);
24	(b) THE PROVISION OF A QUALIFIED COMMUNICATION ACCESS
25	REALTIME TRANSLATION (CART) REPORTER;
26	(c) THE PROVISION OF AN ASSISTIVE LISTENING DEVICE; OR
27	(d) The acquisition or modification of equipment or devices

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1	TO ASSIST IN EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION WITH A PERSON WHO IS DEAF,
2	HARD OF HEARING, OR DEAFBLIND.
3	(2) "Citizens council" means the Colorado deafblind citizens
4	council appointed by the commission in accordance with section
5	26-21-105 (2)(f).
6	SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-21-105, amend
7	(2)(e), (2)(f)(I), (2)(f)(II), and $(2)(f)(III)$ introductory portion as follows:
8	26-21-105. Appointment of commission director - commission
9	procedures - advisory council - creation. (2) (e) The commission shall
10	encourage development and coordination of public and private agencies
11	providing assistance to deaf, hard-of-hearing, and deafblind citizens
12	PERSONS.
13	(f) (I) There is hereby created the Colorado deafblind citizens
14	ADVISORY council consisting of seven members.
15	(II) The citizens ADVISORY council will SHALL advise the
16	commission, state and local governments, and other relevant entities on
17	how to increase competitive integrated employment as defined by IN
18	section 8-84-301, enlarge economic opportunities, enhance independence
19	and self-sufficiency, and improve services for deafblind persons.
20	(III) The commission shall appoint initial members to the citizens
21	ADVISORY council by July 1, 2019. The commission shall designate four
22	members to serve an initial four-year term and three members to serve an
23	initial six-year term. After the initial terms, all subsequent appointees will
24	serve four-year terms. The commission shall appoint a qualified person
25	to fill any vacancy on the citizens ADVISORY council for the remainder of
26	any unexpired term. The citizens ADVISORY council must have HAS the
27	following appointees:

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1	SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-21-106, repeal
2	(5); and add (5.5) as follows:
3	26-21-106. Powers, functions, and duties of commission -
4	auxiliary services program - community access program - report -
5	rules - definitions. (5) On or before January 1, 2019, the commission
6	shall establish a one-year pilot program to provide auxiliary services to
7	state departments and agencies. The commission may continue the pilot
8	program in subsequent years if the commission has adequate funding to
9	provide auxiliary services through the pilot program. The commission
10	shall:
11	(a) Identify at least two state departments or agencies to
12	participate in the pilot program during calendar year 2019;
13	(b) Create a process for participating state departments or agencies
14	to request auxiliary services from the commission;
15	(c) Collect data on the utilization of auxiliary services through the
16	pilot program; and
17	(d) Hire an independent contractor to evaluate the pilot program
18	and make recommendations regarding whether to expand the program to
19	additional state departments and agencies. The evaluation must be based
20	on utilization data from the first year of the program. The evaluation must
21	be included in the September 1, 2020, annual report required by section
22	26-21-106 (1)(e).
23	
24	SECTION <u>7.</u> Appropriation. (1) For the 2024-25 state fiscal
25	year, \$203,163 is appropriated to the Colorado commission for the deaf,
26	hard of hearing, and deafblind cash fund created in section 26-21-107 (1),
27	C.R.S. This appropriation is from the Colorado telephone users with

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disabilities fund created in section 40-17-104 (1)(a), C.R.S. The public utilities commission in the department of regulatory agencies is responsible for the accounting related to this appropriation.

(2) For the 2024-25 state fiscal year, \$203,163 is appropriated to the department of human services for use by the office of adults, aging, and disability services. This appropriation is from reappropriated funds in the Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind cash fund under subsection (1) of this section, and is based on the assumption that the office will require an additional 1.6 FTE. To implement this act, the office may use the appropriation for the Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind.

SECTION 8. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly; except that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in November 2024 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.

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
