Fiscal note status: The final fiscal note reflects the introduced bill. This bill was postponed indefinitely by the Senate Agriculture & Natural Resources Committee on March 20, 2025; therefore, the impacts

Summary Information

Overview. The bill would have modified certain laws related to the practice of veterinary telehealth.

Types of impacts. The bill was projected to affect the following areas on an ongoing basis starting in FY 2025-26:

Summary of Legislation

The bill modifies certain laws regarding the practice of veterinary telehealth. Specifically, the bill:

- allows veterinarians to establish a client-patient relationship through telehealth;
- clarifies the definition of telehealth;
- changes references in current law from "telemedicine" to "telehealth;"
- authorizes veterinarians to prescribe drugs through telehealth, with exceptions for controlled substances and antimicrobials;
- removes the requirement that veterinarians using telehealth be available in person for follow-up evaluations; and
- allows veterinary specialists, within their scope of practice, to prescribe drugs through telehealth.

State Expenditures

Workload in the Department of Regulatory Agencies may increase to conduct additional rulemaking, provide information and outreach to practitioners, respond to complaints, and take disciplinary action against license holders. The department may require legal services, provided by the Department of Law, related to a rise in complaints. This workload is expected to be minimal, and no change in appropriations is required.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
