**Joint Budget Committee.** Since July 1, 2011, money in the educator licensure cash fund (fund), which includes educator license fees, has been continuously appropriated to the state board of education and the department of education (department) for expenses incurred in the administration of the "Colorado Educator Licensing Act of 1991". While the money is continuously appropriated, the department is required to

report to legislative committees about its expenditures from the fund and about application processing time. Beginning with the next fiscal year, the general assembly is required to annually appropriate the money and the reporting requirement is repealed.

The bill grants the department 3 more years of continuous appropriation authority, and it likewise extends the related reporting requirement.

1       *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2           **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-60.5-112, **amend**  
3        (1)(b)(I), (1)(b)(II), and (1)(b)(IV) as follows:

4           **22-60.5-112. Fees - fund - repeal.** (1) (b) (I) Notwithstanding  
5        any provision of subsection (1)(a) of this section to the contrary, for the  
6        2011-12 fiscal year through the ~~2020-21~~ **2023-24** fiscal year, the money  
7        in the cash fund is continuously appropriated to the department to offset  
8        the direct and indirect costs incurred by the state board of education and  
9        the department in administering this article 60.5. In each of the fiscal  
10      years, the general appropriation bill must, for informational purposes,  
11      reflect the estimated amount of expenditures, including any funding for  
12      personnel, from the cash fund.

13           (II) Notwithstanding section 24-1-136 (11), during each of the  
14      regular legislative sessions from 2012 through ~~2021~~ **2023-24**, the  
15      department shall report to the education committees of the house of  
16      representatives and the senate, or any successor committees, and the joint  
17      budget committee of the general assembly concerning expenditures from  
18      the cash fund and the department's progress in meeting the goal of  
19      reducing to six weeks or less the processing time for issuing or renewing  
20      an educator license.

21           (IV) This subsection (1)(b) is repealed, effective July 1, ~~2021~~  
22      2024.

1                   **SECTION 2. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,  
2   determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate  
3   preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
