Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov.)

The bill authorizes the regional transportation district (RTD) to create a program to offer reduced fares to low-income riders and directs the rail and transit division of the department of transportation to provide assistance and oversight. The bill makes an appropriation of \$80,000 to be used to establish and implement the program.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

- **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares that:
 - (a) The regional transportation district (RTD) convened the pass program working group (working group) in March of 2017 to conduct a year-long effort to review and make recommendations to RTD staff on revisions to all pass programs.
 - (b) The guiding principles of the working group included brand loyalty, convenience, cost-effectiveness, equitable access, increased ridership, meeting strategic budget plan targets, revenue certainty, and simplifying rider-operator interaction.
 - (c) The working group included members of RTD staff and stakeholders representing schools, businesses, municipalities, neighborhood groups, and advocacy organizations.
 - (d) The working group completed its work and issued its recommendations in March of 2018.
 - (e) As part of its final report, the working group recommended creating a low-income fare program to offer a discount to those individuals who need it most. The working group recommended that the low-income fare program begin by offering a forty-percent discount to qualifying riders whose incomes are at or below one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty guidelines. Most of the working group supported raising the low-income discount to a fifty-percent discount for those living at or below one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty guidelines and raising funds from new sources to support the program.

1	(f) RTD transportation services are provided to assist
2	transit-dependent and lower-income individuals and families, to deliver
3	reliable transit options, and to relieve traffic congestion. Furthermore,
4	public transportation service should be provided at the lowest possible
5	cost to make the metro area a more equitable place to live and work by
6	ensuring that public transit is affordable and accessible to all.
7	(2) Now, therefore, it is the intent of the general assembly to
8	authorize and support the creation of a low-income fare program by RTD.
9	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 43-1-117.5, amend

12	duties. (3) (a) The transit and rail division shall be responsible for the
13	planning, development, operation, and integration of transit and rail,
14	including, where appropriate, advanced guideway systems, into the
15	statewide transportation system; shall, in coordination with other transit
16	and rail providers, plan, promote, and implement investments in transit
17	and rail services statewide; and shall have the following specific powers
18	and duties:
19	(IV) To administer and expend state and federal funds that may
20	be dedicated by law, by appropriation by the general assembly, or by the

SECTION 4. Appropriation. For the 2018-19 state fiscal year,					
18	\$80,000 is appropriated to the department of transportation for use by the				
19	transit and rail division. This appropriation is from the general fund. To				
20	implement this act, the division may use this appropriation to assist the				
21	regional transportation district with the establishment and implementation				
22	of a program to offer reduced fares for low-income riders.				
23	SECTION 5. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act				
24	takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the				
25	ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August				
26	8, 2018, if adjournment sine die is on May 9, 2018); except that, if a				
27	referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the

- state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act
- within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect
- 3 unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in
- 4 November 2018 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the
- official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
