A BILL FOR AN ACT 101 CONCERNING THE EXPANSION OF THE MEDICATION-ASSISTED 102 TREATMENT EXPANSION PILOT PROGRAM, AND, IN CONNECTION 103 THEREWITH, SHIFTING ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROGRAM 104 FROM THE COLLEGE OF NURSING TO THE CENTER FOR 105 RESEARCH INTO SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER PREVENTION, 106 TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY SUPPORT STRATEGIES; EXPANDING 107 THE COUNTIES THAT MAY PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM; 108 EXTENDING THE DURATION OF THE PROGRAM; AND INCREASING 109 THE FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAM.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. In 2017, the general assembly enacted Senate Bill 17-074, which created a 2-year medication-assisted treatment (MAT) expansion pilot program, administered by the university of Colorado college of nursing, to expand access to medication-assisted treatment to opioid-dependent patients in Pueblo and Routt counties. The 2017 act directs the general assembly to appropriate \$500,000 per year for the 2017-18 and 2018-19 fiscal years from the marijuana tax cash fund to the university of Colorado board of regents, for allocation to the college of nursing to implement the pilot program. The pilot program repeals on June 30, 2020.

The bill:

- Expands the pilot program to the counties in the San Luis valley and 2 additional counties in which a need is demonstrated;
- ! Shifts responsibility to administer the pilot program from the college of nursing to the center for research into substance use disorder prevention, treatment, and recovery support strategies;
- ! Adds representatives from the San Luis valley and any other counties selected to participate in the pilot program to the advisory board that assists in administering the program;
- ! Increases the annual appropriation for the pilot program to \$5 million for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 fiscal years; and
- ! Extends the program an additional 2 years.

27	(c) IN THE SAN I HIS VALLEY WHICH HAS ADDROVIMATELY FIETY

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1	THOUSAND RESIDENTS AND CONSISTS OF THE COUNTIES OF ALAMOSA,
2	CONEJOS, COSTILLA, CUSTER, HUERFANO, MINERAL, RIO GRANDE, AND
3	SAGUACHE, OPIOID OVERDOSES HAVE BEEN INCREASING SINCE 2010, WITH
4	RECENT REPORTS OF MORE THAN TEN OVERDOSES PER ONE HUNDRED
5	THOUSAND IN POPULATION YEARLY IN EACH OF THE COUNTIES IN THE
6	VALLEY;
7	(d) HUERFANO COUNTY, WHICH HAS ABOUT SIX THOUSAND SIX
8	HUNDRED RESIDENTS, HAD SIX OVERDOSE DEATHS IN 2016, A RATE OF
9	152.6 PER ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND IN POPULATION, WHICH WAS THE

21	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-21-803, add (1.5)

23	23-21-803. Definitions. As used in this part 8, unless the context

25	(1.5) "CENTER" MEANS THE CENTER FOR RESEARCH INTO
26	SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER PREVENTION, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY
27	SUPPORT STRATEGIES ESTABLISHED PURSUANT TO SECTION 27-80-118.

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1	(10) "SAN LUIS VALLEY" MEANS THE COUNTIES OF ALAMOSA,
2	CONEJOS, COSTILLA, CUSTER, HUERFANO, MINERAL, RIO GRANDE, AND
3	SAGUACHE.
4	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-21-804, amend
5	(1)(b), (3), and (4) as follows:
6	23-21-804. Medication-assisted treatment expansion pilot
7	program - created - pilot program location - eligible grant recipients
8	- rules. (1) (b) The MAT expansion pilot program is available to provide
9	grants to community agencies, office-based practices, behavioral health
10	organizations, and substance abuse treatment organizations practicing or
11	providing treatment in Pueblo county or Routt county, AND, STARTING IN
12	THE 2019-20 FISCAL YEAR, THE SAN LUIS VALLEY AND UP TO TWO
13	ADDITIONAL COUNTIES SELECTED BY THE CENTER FOR PARTICIPATION
14	BASED ON DEMONSTRATED NEED.
15	(3) The college of nursing CENTER shall administer the MAT
16	expansion pilot program and, subject to available appropriations, shall
17	award grants as provided in this part 8. starting as soon as practicable in
18	the 2017-18 fiscal year, but no later than January 2018. Subject to
19	available appropriations, grants shall be paid out of money annually
20	appropriated for the pilot program as provided in section 23-21-808.
21	(4) The college of nursing CENTER shall implement the MAT
22	expansion pilot program in accordance with this part 8 and shall develop,
23	with assistance from and in coordination with the advisory board, pilot
24	program guidelines and procedures as necessary to implement the pilot
25	program, including guidelines and procedures specifying the time frames
26	for applying for grants; the form of the pilot program grant application;
27	the time frames for distributing grant money, technical assistance, and

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1	consultation to grant recipients; and evaluation of the pilot program.
2	SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-21-805, amend
3	(1), (2)(a)(III), and (2)(b) as follows:
4	23-21-805. MAT expansion advisory board - created - duties.
5	(1) There is hereby created in the college of nursing CENTER the MAT
6	expansion advisory board, which shall:
7	(a) Review and approve pilot program guidelines and procedures;
8	(b) Advise and provide assistance to the college of nursing
9	CENTER on the implementation of the pilot program;
10	(c) Review and make recommendations to the college of nursing
11	CENTER on grant applications, including recommendations for grant
12	award amounts;
13	(d) Assist the college of nursing CENTER in evaluating the pilot
14	program; and
15	(e) Perform other tasks, as requested by the college of nursing
16	CENTER, related to the implementation and administration of the pilot
17	program.
18	(2) (a) The advisory board consists of representatives of the
19	following entities or organizations who are designated by the entity or
20	organization:
21	(III) The Colorado consortium for prescription drug abuse
22	prevention, administered under the school of pharmacy and
23	pharmaceutical sciences CENTER at the university of Colorado Anschutz
24	medical campus;
25	(b) In addition to the members specified in subsection (2)(a) of
26	this section, at least one medical or public health professional from each
27	county REPRESENTATIVES FROM COUNTIES PARTICIPATING in the pilot

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1	program area, appointed as follows, shall serve on the advisory board:
2	(I) The Northwest Colorado Community Health Partnership in
3	Routt county shall appoint a medical or public health professional from
4	Routt county; and
5	(II) The Pueblo county heroin task force shall appoint a medical
6	or public health professional from Pueblo county;
7	(III) VALLEY-WIDE HEALTH SYSTEMS, INC., SHALL APPOINT A
8	MEDICAL PROFESSIONAL FROM THE SAN LUIS VALLEY;
9	(IV) THE SAN LUIS VALLEY AREA HEALTH EDUCATION CENTER
10	SHALL APPOINT A MEDICAL OR PUBLIC HEALTH PROFESSIONAL FROM THE
11	SAN LUIS VALLEY;
12	(V) THE COLORADO ASSOCIATION OF LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH
13	OFFICIALS SHALL APPOINT A PUBLIC HEALTH PROFESSIONAL FROM THE
14	SAN LUIS VALLEY; AND
15	(VI) IF ADDITIONAL COUNTIES ARE SELECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN
16	THE PILOT PROGRAM, THE CENTER SHALL DETERMINE THE APPOINTING
17	AUTHORITY FOR AND TYPE OF PROFESSIONAL FROM EACH PARTICIPATING
18	COUNTY.
19	SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-21-806, amend
20	(1) introductory portion, (1)(a), (1)(f), (2) introductory portion, (2)(d), and
21	(3); and add (1)(a.5) and (2)(a.5) as follows:
22	23-21-806. Grant application - criteria - awards. (1) To receive
23	a grant, an eligible organization or practice must submit an application to
24	the college of nursing CENTER in accordance with pilot program
25	guidelines and procedures established by the college of nursing CENTER.
26	At a minimum, the application must include the following information:
27	(a) The purpose for which the applicant will use the grant A

2	APPLICANT, INCLUDING DATA ON THE PREVALENCE OF OPIOID ADDICTION,

4	(a.5) The purpose for which the applicant will use the
5	GRANT;
6	(f) A description of how the applicant will achieve improved
7	access to medication-assisted treatment in the pilot program area THE
8	APPLICANT SERVES;
9	(2) The advisory board shall review the applications received
10	pursuant to this section and make recommendations to the college of
11	nursing CENTER regarding grant recipients and awards. In recommending
12	grant awards and in awarding grants, the advisory board and the college
13	of nursing CENTER shall consider the following criteria:
14	(a.5) The demonstrated need in the area served by the
15	APPLICANT;
16	(d) The written commitment of the applicant to have nurse
17	practitioners or physician assistants participate in periodic consultations
18	with college of nursing CENTER staff; and
19	(3) Subject to available appropriations, in the 2017-18 and
20	$\frac{2018-19}{2019-20}$ and $\frac{2020-21}{2020-21}$ fiscal years, the $\frac{1}{2020-21}$ Center
21	shall award grants to applicants approved in accordance with this section
22	and shall distribute the grant money to grant recipients within ninety days
23	after issuing the grant awards.
24	SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-21-807, amend
25	(1) introductory portion, (2) introductory portion, (2)(a), and (2)(b) as
26	follows:
27	23-21-807. Reporting requirements. (1) Each organization or

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practice that receives a grant through the pilot program shall submit an annual report to the college of nursing CENTER by a date set by the college of nursing CENTER. At a minimum, the report must include the following information:

- (2) On or before June 30, 2018, and on or before EACH June 30 2019 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2021, the college of nursing CENTER shall submit a summarized report on the pilot program to the health and human services committee of the senate and the health AND insurance and environment and THE public health care and human services committees of the house of representatives, or any successor committees, and to the governor. At a minimum, the report must include:
- (a) A description of the pilot program, INCLUDING A LIST OF COUNTIES PARTICIPATING IN THE PILOT PROGRAM;
- (b) A list identifying the grant recipients, including the amount awarded to each grant recipient, THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE GRANT RECIPIENT IS PROVIDING SERVICES, and a detailed description of how each grant recipient used the grant award;
- **SECTION 7.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **amend** 23-21-808 as follows:

23-21-808. Funding for pilot program. (1) (a) For the 2017-18 and 2018-19 2019-20 AND 2020-21 state fiscal years, the general assembly shall annually appropriate five hundred thousand MILLION dollars per fiscal year from the marijuana tax cash fund created in section 39-28.8-501 to the board of regents of the university of Colorado, for allocation to the college of nursing CENTER to implement AND ADMINISTER the MAT expansion pilot program. The college of nursing CENTER may use a portion of the money annually appropriated for the

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1	pilot program to pay the direct and indirect costs that the college of
2	nursing CENTER incurs to administer the pilot program, as well as to
3	provide consulting services to and oversight of grant recipients, for data
4	collection and analysis, evaluation of the pilot program, and program
5	reporting.
6	(b) If any unexpended or uncommitted money appropriated for the
7	2017-18 A fiscal year remains at the end of that fiscal year, the school of
8	nursing CENTER may expend the money in accordance with this section
9	in the $\frac{2018-19}{1}$ SUCCEEDING fiscal year. Any unexpended or uncommitted
10	money remaining at the end of the 2018-19 2020-21 fiscal year reverts to
11	the marijuana tax cash fund.
12	(2) The college of nursing CENTER may accept and expend any
13	gifts, grants, or donations it receives to implement or administer the pilot
14	program.
15	SECTION 8. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend 23-21-809 as
16	follows:
17	23-21-809. Repeal of part. This part 8 is repealed, effective June
18	30, 2020 2022.
19	SECTION 9. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
20	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
21	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
