**Summary of Legislation**

This bill prohibits the state or an agency of a political subdivision of the state from knowingly assisting an agency of another state or the federal government in arresting a Colorado citizen for an act that is a Colorado constitutional right or violating his or her Colorado constitutional rights. The bill defines a Colorado constitutional right as a right that has not been declared unconstitutional by a federal or Colorado appellate court.

**State Expenditures**

Beginning in the current year FY 2016-17, this bill increases state agency workload to determine if a request from the federal government or an agency of another state violates a Colorado citizen's constitutional rights. To the extent that such requests are determined to violate a Colorado citizen's constitutional rights, state agency workload may decrease from denying the request. This workload impact is expected to be minimal and will not require a change in appropriations for any state agency.

**Local Government and Statutory Public Entity Impact**

Similar to the state, local government and statutory public entity workload is also impacted by this bill to determine if requests from the federal government or an agency of another state violate a Colorado citizen's constitutional right and, if so, to abstain from it.

**Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
