## **Summary Information**

**Overview.** The bill conforms state Medicaid statutes to recent changes in federal law by prohibiting third-party payers from refusing to reimburse the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing for items or services provided to a member without prior authorization.

## **Summary of Legislation**

The bill mandates third-party payers to reimburse the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF) for health care items and services provided to Medicaid members regardless of any prior authorization requirements they impose.

The bill also requires third-party payers to respond to claims issued by HCPF within 60 days of receipt – either with payment or written denial.

## **Background**

The bill conforms state Medicaid statutes regarding third-party payers to recent changes in federal law. The federal Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2022 amended federal third-party liability provisions and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) directed states to pass legislation to adhere to the new provisions.

## **State Revenue**

The bill may increase state revenue to the extent that third-party payers fulfill more claims issued by HCPF. Since the requirements are already in place federally, any impact will be minimal.

## **Effective Date**

This bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on March 7, 2025.
