SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 16-017 101 CONCERNING THE DESIGNATION OF MARCH 16, 2016, AS 102 AGRICULTURE DAY IN COLORADO. 1 WHEREAS, Americans enjoy the safest, most abundant, and most 2 affordable food supply in the world, thanks largely to the efficiency and 3 productivity of America's farm and ranch families; and 4 WHEREAS, As the world's population is predicted to grow from 7 billion to 9 billion by 2045, and the worldwide demand for food will 5 double by 2050, farmers and ranchers face the challenge of producing 6 7 more food, feed, fiber, and fuel; and 8 WHEREAS, Today, 97% of all U.S. farms are family owned, and each American farmer feeds more than 156 people, a dramatic increase 9 10 from the 1960s, when each farmer could feed only 25 people; and

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, Americans spend less than 9% of their annual income on food, less than any other developed nation, while American farmers and ranchers receive on average only 15.8 cents of every dollar spent on food; and
5 6 7	WHEREAS, American farmers and ranchers are the most capable and responsible providers for the safety, health, and well-being of their livestock; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, The agriculture industry is the second largest industry in Colorado, supporting more than 173,000 jobs in Colorado and contributing \$41 billion to the state's economy; and
11 12	WHEREAS, Colorado was responsible for exporting more than \$2 billion in food and agricultural products in 2014; and
13 14	WHEREAS, Colorado agriculture contributes to national security not only by providing food and fiber, but also by producing energy; and
15 16 17	WHEREAS, Colorado recognizes landowners whose livelihood depends upon the property they reside on, operate on, and care for as they work to provide basic necessities to all; and
18 19 20 21 22	WHEREAS, Leadership is vital to the viability of the agriculture industry, and participants in programs like Future Farmers of America, 4-H, and the Colorado Agricultural Leadership Program help develop those leadership skills necessary to promote agriculture and educate their urban cousins on the importance of agriculture to the world; and
23 24	WHEREAS, Colorado's agriculture industry requires an adequate, reliable workforce in order to provide food from the field to the table; and
25 26 27	WHEREAS, Colorado's farms and ranches provide wildlife habitat, open space, and a site for innovative and sustainable farming practices that ensure the protection of state resources; and
28 29 30 31 32	WHEREAS, Colorado's agricultural producers provide a diverse and valuable array of livestock and crops, including cattle, dairy, sheep, hogs, horses, goats, bison, elk, poultry and eggs, and aquaculture; as well as field corn, sweet corn, wheat, hay, potatoes, barley, sorghum, sunflowers dry beans soybeans onions carrots wine grapes fruit

3 4 5	WHEREAS, Colorado's agriculturists employ sound animal husbandry practices, ensuring that livestock remain healthy, productive, and content; and
6 7	WHEREAS, Colorado agriculture provides an estimated \$67.5 million annually to support the state's wildlife; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, Colorado's farmers and ranchers are innovative entrepreneurs and business leaders who remain resilient in their dedication to the continued prosperity of the state's agriculture; and
11 12 13	WHEREAS, The protection of private property and the rights of landowners who provide wholesome, safe food to Americans and others worldwide is essential; and
14 15 16	WHEREAS, Farmers and ranchers are critical to Colorado agritourism, welcoming tourists from around the world and showing them all Colorado has to offer; and
17 18 19	WHEREAS, Losing agricultural land and water to other uses will result in overall negative impacts to the state's economy and a loss of food production vital to all Coloradans; and
20 21	WHEREAS, March 15, 2016, is "National Agriculture Day"; now, therefore,
22 23	Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Seventieth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring herein:
24 25 26 27 28	That we, the members of the General Assembly, proudly recognize and designate "Colorado Agriculture Day" on March 16, 2016, in celebration of the many men and women who strengthen the nation's agriculture industry; promote a safe, high-quality, and sustainable food supply; and protect consumers, the environment, and natural resources.
29 30 31 32	<i>Be It Further Resolved</i> , That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent to the Honorable Governor John Hickenlooper, Colorado Commissioner of Agriculture Don Brown, and the members of the Colorado congressional delegation.
