A BILL FOR AN ACT CONCERNING INFORMATION INCLUDED IN THE TRANSPORTATION

102 COMMISSION'S PROPOSED BUDGET ALLOCATION PLAN.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov.)

The bill requires the proposed budget allocation plan (plan) for money subject to the department of transportation's (department) jurisdiction to include the following for the department's headquarters and each engineering region designated by the department:

- Personnel costs including salaries and benefits;
- Facilities costs including utilities, maintenance, and any

other expenses associated with facilities; and

• Any other expenses.

The bill also requires the plan to include the following for any project involving the maintenance of the state highway and transportation systems:

- Personnel costs including salaries and benefits;
- Facilities costs including utilities, maintenance, and any other expenses associated with facilities; and
- Any other expenses.

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Finally, the bill prohibits the department, beginning July 1, 2023, from using an indirect or construction engineering rate for the expenses listed in its plan.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares that:

- (a) The department of transportation is required to submit a budget to the general assembly each year;
- (b) The general assembly has ceded much of its oversight responsibility over the department of transportation to the transportation commission with the expectation that the transportation commission will provide the general assembly with useful oversight information regarding the department of transportation's budget;
- (c) The department of transportation has over three thousand three hundred full-time employees;
- (d) The general assembly has removed a cap on the number of full-time employees the department of transportation may employ thus allowing the department of transportation to hire as many full-time employees as they see fit without any general assembly approval or review process;
- (e) The total number of full-time employees employed by the department of transportation has an impact on the public employees'

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retirement association's public employee retirement plan for all public agency employees;

- (f) The citizens of Colorado require transparent information from the general assembly to fully understand the general assembly's oversight of state agencies;
- (g) The department of transportation does not currently provide the general assembly a detailed breakdown of the full-time employee positions by key department of transportation areas such as by the department of transportation's headquarters and each engineering region or maintenance section designated by the department of transportation;
- (h) The department of transportation has submitted a request to the transportation commission to employee hundreds of additional full-time employees;
- (i) When the department of transportation advertises a project for construction, there are multiple numbers for the project value that sometimes include the expenses of the department of transportation, but often the department of transportation hides or refuses to discuss with the public the actual cost of the project;
- (j) To avoid public scrutiny, the department of transportation has developed and uses an indirect rate and other cost-hiding methods for the department of transportation personnel expenses and other nonconstruction-related expenses to hide the true costs of the department of transportation from the taxpayers of Colorado;
- (k) These methods purposefully do not show the costs of a project and the department of transportation is essentially paying for itself through added costs for projects by as much as twenty-seven percent on construction projects;

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1	(l) Thus, where the department of transportation says a
2	construction project costs ten million dollars, the project may actually
3	costs seven million three hundred thousand dollars for construction and
4	two million seven hundred thousand dollars for other agency costs; and
5	(m) The general assembly requires transparent information to
6	make informed budget decisions regarding executive agencies.
7	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 43-1-113, amend (2)
8	introductory portion; and add (2)(f), (2)(g), and (20) as follows:
9	43-1-113. Funds - budgets - fiscal year - reports and
10	publications. (2) Annually on or before December 15, the commission
11	shall adopt and the department of transportation shall submit to the joint
12	budget committee, the house transportation and energy committee, the
13	senate transportation committee, and the governor a proposed budget
14	allocation plan for moneys MONEY subject to its jurisdiction for the fiscal
15	year beginning on July 1 of the succeeding year. The plan shall MUST be
16	submitted in a format determined by the joint budget committee and shall
17	MUST include, but not be limited to, the following information:
18	(f) ALLOCATION OF SPENDING, BY THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES OF
19	EXPENDITURE, FOR THE DEPARTMENT'S HEADQUARTERS AND EACH
20	ENGINEERING REGION DESIGNATED BY THE DEPARTMENT:
21	(I) PERSONNEL COSTS INCLUDING SALARIES AND BENEFITS;
22	(II) FACILITIES COSTS INCLUDING UTILITIES, MAINTENANCE, AND
23	ANY OTHER EXPENSES ASSOCIATED WITH FACILITIES; AND
24	(III) ANY OTHER EXPENSES; AND
25	(g) ALLOCATION OF SPENDING, BY THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES OF
26	EXPENDITURE, FOR ANY PROJECT INVOLVING THE MAINTENANCE OF THE
27	STATE HIGHWAY AND TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS:

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1	(I) PERSONNEL COSTS INCLUDING SALARIES AND BENEFITS;
2	(II) FACILITIES COSTS INCLUDING UTILITIES, MAINTENANCE, AND
3	ANY OTHER EXPENSES ASSOCIATED WITH FACILITIES; AND
4	(III) ANY OTHER EXPENSES.
5	(20) BEGINNING JULY 1, 2023, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL NOT USE
6	AN INDIRECT RATE OR CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING RATE FOR THE
7	EXPENSES LISTED IN THE BUDGET ALLOCATION PLAN IN SUBSECTION (2) OF
8	THIS SECTION.
9	SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act
10	takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the
11	ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly; except
12	that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V
13	of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this
14	act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take
15	effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in
16	November 2022 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the
17	official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.

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
