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	SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 17-034
1	CONCERNING SUPPORT FOR THE FEDERAL "PATIENT PROTECTION AND
2	AFFORDABLE CARE ACT", AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH
3	EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO EFFORTS TO REPEAL OR WEAKEN.
4	AND SUPPORT FOR IMPROVING, THE "PATIENT PROTECTION AND
5	AFFORDABLE CARE ACT" AND SUPPORTING ADDITIONAL
6	EFFORTS TO STRENGTHEN ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE.
1	WHEREAS, Under the federal "Patient Protection and Affordable
2	Care Act" (ACA), millions of previously uninsured Americans now have
	affordable and comprehensive health insurance coverage through the
•	health insurance exchange marketplaces as well as through the expansion
5	of the Medicaid program, significantly reducing the uninsured rate; and
6	WHEREAS, In Colorado, over 450,000 individuals have enrolled

1 2 3	in the Medicaid expansion and nearly 180,000 individuals have enrolled in plans offered through the state's health benefit exchange with nearly 60% receiving subsidies worth \$300 million; and
4 5	WHEREAS, In Colorado, the uninsured rate dropped by more than half between 2013 and 2015, from 14.3% to 6.7%; and
6 7 8	WHEREAS, Most Colorado businesses are small businesses, and Colorado continues to be a state where people start new businesses daily; and
9 10 11	WHEREAS, Individuals who are self-employed or whose employers do not offer them insurance now have affordable health care options; and
12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, A 2016 study conducted by the Colorado Futures Center at Colorado State University on the economic effects of the Medicaid expansion found that the Medicaid expansion in Colorado has created 31,074 jobs, and provided \$3.82 billion in economic activity; and
16 17 18	WHEREAS, Under the ACA, millions of seriously ill individuals are no longer subject to preexisting condition exclusions or annual or lifetime health insurance limits; and
19 20 21 22 23	WHEREAS, Many public health goals, including access to free immunizations, tobacco cessation products and counseling, well-child visits, screening mammograms and colonoscopies, and contraceptive services, are being effectively met without copayments or deductibles through private health insurance; and
24 25	WHEREAS, Under the ACA, millions of individuals have access to support for treatment of mental health and substance use disorders; and
26 27 28 29	WHEREAS, Under the ACA, instead of spending \$2.2 billion on uncompensated care, which increases costs for everyone, Colorado is receiving almost \$1 billion in federal support to provide low-income adults with much needed coverage; and
30 31 32	WHEREAS, The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has determined that the ACA will contribute, in the long term, to a reduced federal deficit; and

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1 2	WHEREAS, Provisions of the ACA require greater accountability from the health insurance industry regarding costs; and
3 4	WHEREAS, The ACA has extended the solvency of the Medicare trust fund; and
5	WHEREAS, The ACA is critical to addressing the biggest
6	challenges facing our health system, including rising costs, uneven quality
7	of care, deaths due to medical errors, discriminatory practices by health
8 9	insurance providers, and the shrinking ranks of the nation's primary care providers; and
10	WHEREAS, Repealing the ACA without ensuring a viable
11	replacement plan would result in nearly 30 million Americans losing their
12	health insurance coverage, with an estimated 82 percent of those losing
13	insurance coming from working families, leading to an increase in health
14	disparities and premature deaths; and
15	WHEREAS, Repealing the ACA without ensuring a viable
16	replacement plan would also result in a loss of at least \$907 million in
17	federal Medicaid funding to the state of Colorado; and
18	WHEREAS, The cuts in reimbursement to hospitals and other
19	providers should be accompanied by stronger mechanisms to ensure the
20	maintenance of safe staffing and effective care delivery; and
21	WHEREAS, The government must not shift costs to working
22	families and retirees or endanger the quality of care or limit access to care
23	by underfunding rural and urban safety-net hospitals and other critical
24	providers; and
25	WHEREAS, The ACA's payment and delivery reforms are an
26	important step toward lowering costs, but they should be implemented in
27	a way that protects the availability of services for our communities; and
28	WHEREAS The Coloredo Conorel Assembly continues to support
28 29	WHEREAS, The Colorado General Assembly continues to support the ACA's goal of securing high-quality, affordable health coverage for
30	all Americans; and

31	WHEREAS, Seven years after the passage of the ACA, the
32	Colorado General Assembly reaffirms its commitment to the goal of
33	affordable, quality health care for all but recognizes that the ACA remains

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1	a work in progress; and
2 3 4	WHEREAS, The Colorado General Assembly recognizes that political pressure could cause some federal policymakers to look again at cuts and changes to Medicaid as well as the ACA; now, therefore,
5 6	Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Seventy-first General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring herein:
7	(1) That the Colorado General Assembly:
8 9 10 11	(a) Will make comprehensive reform of the health care system an ongoing priority, supporting proposals to promote efficient, effective delivery of health care through integrated systems that provide coordinated and efficient care;
12 13	(b) Will continue to oppose efforts to undermine the U.S. health care system by shifting costs and risks to individuals; and
14 15 16	(c) Will oppose repealing or weakening and support improving the "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act" and additional efforts to strengthen access to care.
