Table 1 shows the new impacts resulting from changes to the program under the bill, and the continuing impacts from extending the program beyond its current repeal date. Because the bill continues a program without making any changes, there are no new impacts. The continuing program impacts will end if the bill is not passed and the program is allowed to repeal.

Summary of Legislation

The bill continues the Suicide Prevention Commission indefinitely. Under current law, the commission repeals on September 1, 2024.

Background

In 2014, the General Assembly established the Suicide Prevention Commission to provide leadership for suicide prevention and intervention. The commission advises the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and helps establish statewide priorities related to suicide prevention. Continuing Program Impacts

Based on the department's current costs, CDPHE is expected to have expenditures of \$97,000 to continue to administer the commission. If this bill is enacted, current expenditures will continue for the program starting in FY 2024-25. If this bill is not enacted, the program will end on September 1, 2024, and state expenditures will decrease starting in FY 2024-25 by the amounts shown in Table 1, above.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.

State Appropriations

The fiscal note assumes that funding to continue the Suicide Prevention Commission will be included in the FY 2024-25 Long Bill. However, if funding is not included, the General Assembly should appropriate \$97,000 from the General Fund to the Department of Public Health and Environment, and 1.0 FTE in this bill.
