	CONCERNING THE INSTALLATION OF A SCULPTURE ON THE STATI		
	CAPITOL GROUNDS TO MEMORIALIZE MAJOR GENERAL		
	Maurice Rose.		
	WHEREAS, The State Capitol and its grounds contain memorials		
	to the state's political past as well as memorabilia promoting the state's		
	natural environment and history of events, individuals, and ethnic groups;		
	and		
	WHEREAS, From time to time, proposals for gifts of art and		
	memorials are made to the state to be placed in the State Capitol or on its		
	grounds; and		
	WHEREAS, Section 24-82-108 (3)(h), Colorado Revised Statutes,		
	requires the State Capitol Building Advisory Committee to establish		

1 2	memorials for placement in the State Capitol or on its grounds; and
3 4 5 6 7 8	WHEREAS, The State Capitol Building Advisory Committee's evaluation criteria for a memorial is based partly upon the association the proposed memorial has with a significant event in the state's history, the connection of the memorial with persons significant in the heritage of the state, and its appropriateness to the designated area of the State Capitol; and
9 10 11 12 13 14 15	WHEREAS, The procedure stipulates that, if the Capital Development Committee concurs with the State Capitol Building Advisory Committee's recommendations regarding the placement of memorials on the State Capitol grounds, the Capital Development Committee may make its recommendation for acceptance of the donated art to the General Assembly in the form of a joint resolution introduced during an annual legislative session; and
16 17 18	WHEREAS, Major General Maurice Rose was a Colorado resident and national hero and is an example to future generations of extraordinary patriotism and fortitude; and
19 20 21 22	WHEREAS, General Rose was born on November 26, 1899, in Middletown, Connecticut, and moved to Denver when he was three years old. He attended Elbert Elementary, Wittier Elementary, and East High School in Denver; and
23 24	WHEREAS, General Rose, his parents, brother, wife, and son all lived in Denver until his death in 1945; and
25 26 27	WHEREAS, When German forces in Tunisia were reduced to combat ineffectiveness, General Rose negotiated with their commander, Fritz Krause, on the details of his unconditional surrender; and
28 29 30 31	WHEREAS, General Rose was the highest-ranking United States serviceman killed by enemy fire in the European theater during World War II and was the highest ranking and most distinguished Jewish American soldier in United States history; and
32 33 34	WHEREAS, General Rose had one of the most distinguished military records and was the most decorated armored battlefield commander in United States history; and

1 2 3 4 5 6	WHEREAS, General Rose was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, French Legion of Honor, French Croix de Guerre with Palm, and the Belgian Croix de Guerre with Palm; and
7	WHEREAS, Under General Rose's command, the following firsts
8	were accomplished in World War II:
9	(1) First to fire artillery shells into Germany;
10	(2) First tank unit to enter Germany;
11	(3) First to capture a German town;
12	(4) First to breach the Siegfried line;
13	(5) First to shoot down a German plane with guns placed on
14	German soil; (6) First agreement with the ententing of Colornal.
15	(6) First armor unit to enter the city of Cologne;
16	(7) First ground invasion of Germany since Napoleon; and
17	(8) Record holder of the longest one-day advance in history of one
18	hundred one miles; and
19	WHEREAS, General Rose never gained the prominence of many
20	of his contemporaries, for reasons including the fact that he did not
21	survive the war, and as an intensely private man, he rarely if ever sought
22	publicity; and
22	publicity, and
23	WHEREAS, General Rose died by enemy fire on March 30, 1945,
24	and he is buried at the Netherlands American Cemetery in Margraten,
25	Netherlands; and
20	Tremending, and
26	WHEREAS, The State Capitol Building Advisory Committee and
27	the Capital Development Committee have approved a plan for placement
28	of a sculpture and an accompanying explanatory plaque to memorialize
29	General Rose on the State Capitol grounds, the boundaries of which are
30	described in section 24-82-108 (3)(a), Colorado Revised Statutes, subject
31	to the State Capitol Building Advisory Committee approving the final
32	design and the specific location; and
33	WHEREAS, The sculpture of General Rose will be a tribute to
34	Colorado's rich history as well as to an individual and an ethnic group that
35	has not been previously recognized with a sculpture, statue, or monument;

4	hereby approve of the plan recommended by the State Capitol Building
5	Advisory Committee and approved by the Capital Development
6	Committee for the installation of the sculpture of Major General Maurice
7	Rose and the accompanying explanatory plaque on the State Capitol
8	grounds.

10	transmitted to Governor Jared Polis, the State Capitol Building Advisory
11	Committee, and the Capital Development Committee.
