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**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 23-1009**

101     **CONCERNING RECOGNITION OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN VETERANS.**

1                WHEREAS, The military history of African Americans spans from  
2                the arrival of the first enslaved Africans during the colonial history of the  
3                United States to the present day; and

4                WHEREAS, African Americans have participated in every war  
5                fought by or within the United States, including the Revolutionary War,  
6                the War of 1812, the Mexican-American War, the Civil War, the  
7                Spanish-American War, the Indian Wars, World Wars I and II, the  
8                Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Gulf War, and the wars in  
9                Afghanistan and Iraq; and

10               WHEREAS, Nearly 198,000 African-American soldiers served  
11               during the Civil War, roughly 350,000 African-American soldiers served  
12               during World War I, and another 1.25 million African-American soldiers  
13               served during World War II, with many more African Americans serving  
14               in the years since World War II; and

15               WHEREAS, On July 26, 1948, President Harry S. Truman signed  
16               Executive Order 9981, integrating the military and mandating equality of

1 treatment and opportunity for African-American soldiers; and

2 WHEREAS, Desegregation of the military was not complete for  
3 several years, and all-African-American units persisted well into the  
4 Korean War; and

5 WHEREAS, The last all-African-American unit was not disbanded  
6 until 1954; and

7 WHEREAS, Until the Korean War, African-American veterans  
8 were precluded from direct access to benefits from the Veterans  
9 Administration, which included VA housing loans, employment  
10 assistance, unemployment benefits, and health care; and

11 WHEREAS, African Americans continue to serve in the United  
12 States military, providing exemplary service, duty, integrity, dedication,  
13 and commitment to our great nation; and

14 WHEREAS, Currently, seventeen percent of the United States  
15 Armed Forces are African American; now, therefore,

16 *Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the*  
17 *Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate*  
18 *concurring herein:*

19 That we, the General Assembly, in recognition of the heroic efforts  
20 and great sacrifice of African-American veterans, hereby encourage this  
21 commemoration throughout the Senate and House of Representatives.

22 *Be It Further Resolved,* That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent  
23 to the Congressional Black Caucus; the National Black Caucus of State  
24 Legislators; the Retired Enlisted Association; the Tuskegee Airmen; the  
25 Colorado Black Women for Political Action; the National Association for  
26 Black Veterans, Inc.; the Colorado Veterans of Foreign Wars; the  
27 Colorado American Legion; the United Veterans Committee of Colorado;  
28 the Colorado Disabled American Veterans; and the Mountain States  
29 Chapter of the Paralyzed Veterans of America.
