101	CONCERNING THE DESIGNATION OF UNITED STATES HIGHWAY 6 IN
102	EAGLE COUNTY FROM MILE MARKER 139.5 TO MILE MARKER
103	134 AS THE "LIEUTENANT ERIC HILL MEMORIAL HIGHWAY".
1 2	WHEREAS, Eric Hill was born in California on February 29, 1968; and
3	WHEREAS, Eric Hill moved with his family to Gypsum, Colorado
4	at four years old and spent his early childhood playing in the mountains
5	with his younger brother Jeff; and
6	WHEREAS, Eric Hill attended local schools and graduated from
7	Eagle Valley High School in 1986, earning the nickname "Hillbilly" along
8	the way; and

1 2	WHEREAS, After graduating high school, Eric Hill joined the Air Force, where he served for six years in an armored detail; and
3 4 5 6	WHEREAS, Though he was willing to join fighting troops in Iraq, Eric Hill later opted out of military service and left with an honorable discharge, settling in Albuquerque, New Mexico where he met his future wife Cissy; and
7 8 9 10	WHEREAS, Eric Hill eventually returned to his home in Gypsum, Colorado, where he worked at the post office and then Premier Electric before making the career-defining move to sign up as a volunteer firefighter; and
11 12 13 14	WHEREAS, Eric Hill earned paid positions as a firefighter, attaining the rank of lieutenant, for both the Eagle and Gypsum fire departments and also became a certified wildland firefighter, which took him all over Colorado and to Washington, Oregon, and California; and
15 16 17	WHEREAS, In addition to working as a firefighter, Lieutenant Eric Hill was also an Airport Fire Rescue Firefighter for Eagle County for many years; and
18 19 20 21	WHEREAS, Over the course of his 16-year career as a firefighter, Lieutenant Eric Hill accumulated countless stories, both sad and happy and everything in between, and many of them are still shared by his family and friends; and
22 23 24	WHEREAS, On March 16, 2019, Lieutenant Eric Hill was killed in a tragic highway work accident while on the job with the Colorado Department of Transportation maintenance; and
25 26 27	WHEREAS, On March 23, 2019, a crowd of more than 500 mourners gathered at the Eagle River Center to remember the life of Lieutenant Eric Hill; and
28 29 30	WHEREAS, Lieutenant Eric Hill was a devoted servant to both his family and his community, and he was often the first one out of the fire truck, ready to risk his life to save others; and
31 32	WHEREAS, Lieutenant Eric Hill will be remembered as a natural and dedicated leader, family man, and mentor; now, therefore,

1	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-third
2	General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
3	(1) That the portion of United States Highway 6 in Eagle County
4	from Mile Marker 139.5 to Mile Marker 134 be designated as the
5	"Lieutenant Eric Hill Memorial Highway".
6	(2) That the Colorado Department of Transportation may accept
7	and expend gifts, grants, and donations for the purposes of the initial
8	placement of signs to mark United States Highway 6 in Eagle County
9	from Mile Marker 139.5 to Mile Marker 134 as the "Lieutenant Eric Hill
10	Memorial Highway".
11	(3) That the Colorado Department of Transportation may explore
12	a cooperative agreement with the Board of County Commissioners for
13	Eagle County for the maintenance of the signs marking the "Lieutenant
14	Eric Hill Memorial Highway".
15	Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent
16	to the family of Eric Hill, the Gypsum Fire Protection District, Gypsum
17	Mayor Steve Carver, the Gypsum Town Council, the Eagle County Board
18	of County Commissioners and Eagle County Manager, and CDOT Region
19	3 Director Michael Goolsby.
