Praise God such a change from last year! We will continue both in-person and on-line services but with more people being vaccinated, we are hoping for an increase in our church worship attendance. We are still under CDC guidance about gathering in large groups.

We will be singing a little and praying together during Easter Sunday services but will continue to wear our masks as well as social distancing ourselves.

Pastor Julia's priority is to keep the well-being and safety of our congregation in the forefront and the council is blessed and grateful for her leadership. She is very aware of how much we miss the old days of gathering for worship and fellowship afterwards. The council has decided to offer coffee and cinnamon rolls after each Easter service. Regardless of weather, it will be served outdoors.

This council has faced some very tough decisions in the last 13 months. We are always mindful of how our congregation feels about worship, fellowship, committees etc. However, the bottom line is safety first because that's how we care for each other. We pray for your patience and understanding. Our goal is to get back to "normal" as quickly as possible, something we have no control over. God knows this too. We rely on his unwavering faithfulness and love to get us through this pandemic. I know I pray daily for help in this.

The meaning of Easter to me is suffering, forgiveness, hope and unconditional love.

Let us all rejoice in God's ultimate sacrifice: giving his Son to pay for our sins. Have a beautiful Easter.

Dear friends in Christ-

Words from Pastor Julia

If anyone among you thinks he is religious, and does not bridle his tongue but deceives his own heart, this one's religion is useless. Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world. — James 1:26-27 (New King James Version)

The verse above serves as a two-fold reminder. First, it is a note that our upcoming Bible study (beginning on 12 April) will be on James. Secondly, it is a point of reflection as we pass our one-year anniversaries related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Last year, we had hoped that Easter would be a day of release and celebration, but instead it marked increased uptick in cases in what turned out to be a long slog, with many lives lost. We were slow here in Sweet Grass Country to be affected and it is easier here to think it is all finished.

Speaking for myself, I have deep grief in my heart, not only for the losses of the past year, but for the divisions in relationships and community that are on-going. Some would like to see any kind of restriction lifted anywhere, including church. Others recognize that there are still risks and that we are not yet fully out of the woods for getting sick or spreading COVID.

The changes proposed by the Church Council for Easter- to permit more singing and to include communion in the worship service- are decisions being made out of pressure by people in the congregation, who are impatient and frustrated with our continued precautions. The best research available says that singing a four-minute song is the same as being in the presence of a 4-minute sustained cough. A shorter amount of singing is like a shorter cough. In order to sing at all, we must have the windows open and continue to wear masks in the hopes that we will not create a COVID-spreader event after a year of such care. The same is true of standing up and sitting down or moving around during the service. The stirring of the air without a good provision for airflow creates a significant potential infection risk.

The majority of our most seasoned congregation members have been vaccinated, but not all of them. Those who are not as seasoned continue to wait. We must be careful not to create an intentionally or unintentionally segregated church experience by making worship comfortable for those who are vaccinated and unattend-able for those who are not, which is very close to our current situation.

All of which brings me back to the quote above from James: do we have pure and undefiled religion? With Holy Week just ahead, it is worth each of examining our hearts and discerning what the gift of faith means to us. What are we doing in response to God's love poured out in Jesus? What does our individual witness and our congregational witness say about what we believe is the most important part of being a Christian in a worshipping community?

I know we have been through a long and difficult year. We all desperately want "normal", but in our rush to feel that- we may risk everything we've tried so hard to prevent. Let us keep the faith, encourage one another in doing what is right and loving, and ask God to direct us in pure and undefiled religion.

What to expect when we worship in the sanctuary now

*As long as it is technologically possible, we will continue to stream all services through Facebook Live

- 1) Enter through the front doors (under the steeple). These two doors are <u>entrance only</u>. The ramp door is also available if necessary.
- 2) Masks are required in the building. The Council is asking all of us to model Jesus Christ by taking this seriously. Please be respectful and gentle around this issue in the church.
- 3) Pick up your own bulletin or other material from the table in the foyer. Take a mask if you need one. Take other materials (devotionals, magazines, newsletters) as desired. Sign up for tasks, if you are willing and able to serve.
- 4) There will be a basket just inside the main doors for your offering. Please put it in there and know that we are grateful for your generosity.
- 5) Please choose a pew. Families and household groups may sit together. We encourage spacing of 6 feet where possible between people who do not live or normally socialize together. Pews can generally hold one family (3+ people), 1 couple and 1 single person (sitting apart on the ends), or 3 singles people (spaced out along the pew).
- 6) At this time, we are still refraining from congregational singing. We have not omitted all the congregation responses from the liturgy, so you may participate in the spoken responses.
- 7) When we have communion, Pastor Julia will consecrate the elements at the altar during the service. After the blessing and dismissal, she will wash her hands and prepare for distribution at a table in the Parish Hall. You will be dismissed for communion by row, by an usher. Carry everything with you when you leave your row. When you have received communion, please exit the building from Parish Hall, either down the hall or through the door to the steps and the ramp. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may exit through the ramp door from the sanctuary when your row is dismissed.
- 8) For children: we will have children's bulletins available. At this time, we do not have any crayons, colored pencils, or other similar resources generally available. You can bring some from home or we can assign a baggie for your child/children. Children's sermons will be taped separately from the regular service and shared via social media. This may change in the future. Your children are still very, very welcome and are encouraged to attend.

President Gemma George called the meeting to order. Al Buerkle sent devotions to Gemma to be read in his absence.


