ARPA Introduction and Overview



The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

The American Rescue Plan Act allocates pandemic relief and recovery funds directly to states, localities, and other units of government.

ARPA Overview



\$350 billon for states, territories, tribal governments, and units of local government



Focus on many initiatives, including the future of infrastructure and healthcare resilience

Key Elements



ALLOCATION AMOUNTS

Total: \$350 billion

Georgia total: \$8.4B

Georgia Counties total: \$2.1B



FUNDING DEADLINES

12/31/2024 (obligate) 12/31/2026 (spend)



FUNDING FLOW TO LOCALITIES

Flows directly from Treasury

1st Tranche: May 2021

2nd Tranche: May 2022



ALLOCATION FORMULA

Considerations include population, unemployment, and poverty levels

Cobb County will receive a total of \$147M in ARPA funds



ARPA State and Local Treasury Guidance Overview

Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds are designed to deliver \$350 billion to state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to bolster their response to the COVID-19 emergency and its economic impacts.



Support public health expenditures

 Address a range of public health needs across COVID-19 mitigation



Replace lost public sector revenue

• Support government services, including infrastructure, cybersecurity, and health services



Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure

- Improvements to critical water and sewer infrastructure
- Projects that address impacts of climate change



Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency

- Individuals and households, including those hardest-hit communities
- Small businesses and impacted industries



Provide premium pay for essential workers

Direct payment to essential critical infrastructure sectors

Cobb County is required to expend its American Rescue Plan Act funds within these broad investment areas.

Eligible Uses of Funds - Public Health Examples

Funding may be used to address a broad range of public health needs across COVID-19 mitigation, which may include support to the examples below.



Vaccination Programs



Medical Expenses



Testing, Contact Tracing, and PPE



Mental and Behavioral Health Services



IT Improvements to Enhance Public Health Programs

Eligibility

Must first identify a need or negative impact.

Must then identify how the program, service, or another intervention addresses the identified need or negative impact.



Eligible Uses of Funds - Address Negative Economic Impacts

Funding may be used to support individuals and households, including those hardest-hit communities, small businesses, and impacted industries, such as through the below examples.



Aid to Households Facing Food or Housing Insecurity



Small Business Assistance



Economic Relief Programs



Investments in Housing and Neighborhoods



Assistance to Impacted Industries such as Tourism, Travel, and Hospitality

Eligibility

Must respond to the identified negative economic impact.

Responses must be related and reasonably proportional to the extent and type of harm experienced.



Eligible Uses of Funds - Small Business & Non-Profit Assistance Examples

Funding may be used to adopt safer operating procedures, weather periods of closure, or mitigate financial hardship resulting from the COVID–19 public health emergency, including through the following examples.



Loans or Grants

to mitigate financial hardship such as declines in revenues or impacts of periods of business closure, for example by supporting payroll and benefits costs, costs to retain employees, mortgage, rent, or utilities costs, and other operating costs



Loans, Grants, or In-Kind Assistance

to implement COVID-19
prevention or mitigation tactics,
such as physical changes and
barriers to enable social
distancing, enhanced cleaning
efforts, or COVID-19 vaccination,
testing, or contact tracing
programs



Technical Assistance

and counseling or other professional services to assist with business planning needs



Eligible Uses of Funds - Provide premium pay for essential workers

Funding may be used to provide premium pay directly, or through grants to private employers, to a broad range of essential workers who must be physically present at their jobs, including those examples listed below.



Staff at Nursing Homes, Hospitals, and Home-Care Settings



Sanitation Workers



Public Health and Safety
Staff



Truck Drivers, Transit Staff, and Warehouse Workers



Childcare Employees, Educators, and School Staff

Eligibility

Work must not be performed while teleworking from a residence.

Work must involve regular in-person interactions or physical handling of items handled by patients, public, or coworkers.



Eligible Uses of Funds - Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure Examples

Funding may be used for necessary improvements to broadband and water, sewer, and stormwater infrastructure, including projects that address the impacts of climate change, such as the examples listed below.



Stormwater Resiliency and Green Infrastructure



Clean Water and Drinking Water Infrastructure



Cybersecurity Improvements to Water and Sewer Infrastructure



Digital Literacy



Broadband Infrastructure

Eligibility

Water projects must be eligible under the EPA's Clean or Drinking Water State Revolving Funds.

Broadband projects must deliver service with at least upload and download speeds of 100 Mbps.

The online survey is designed to gather community input on how Cobb County should prioritize its \$147M allocation of federal ARPA funding, it is open to all Cobb County residents and organizations through November 22, 2021. This American Rescue Plan Act was passed by the U.S. Congress in March 2021. It set aside funding for local and state governments to support public health, essential workers, infrastructure measures and to lessen the negative economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The survey will help the county to reflect the community's priorities in its plan for investing the funds between these eligible uses.
