waterSmartSM Honors 15 Cobb County Elementary Students in 17th Annual Tappy Turtle Artist Challenge

MARIETTA, Ga. (March 29, 2022) – The Cobb County Water System and the Cobb County-Marietta Water Authority (CCMWA) congratulate the 15 Cobb County elementary school students selected as this year's winners of the 17th Annual Tappy Turtle Artist Challenge.
