

DEVELOPING A HEALTHY DISCERNMENT POSTURE

Introduction

As believers grow in dreams, visions, encounters, and revelatory experiences, it becomes increasingly important to develop a healthy posture toward revelation. While many people focus on receiving spiritual experiences, Scripture places equal emphasis on wisdom, humility, discernment, and spiritual maturity.

A healthy discernment posture is not merely about identifying whether something is from God. It is about cultivating a heart that remains teachable, grounded, and submitted to both Scripture and the Holy Spirit. The goal is not to become fascinated with spiritual experiences but to become transformed through a deeper relationship with God.

Throughout church history, some believers have become so focused on experiences that they neglected biblical accountability and spiritual growth. Others became so cautious that they rejected genuine revelation altogether. Healthy discernment avoids both extremes.

God desires His people to be spiritually sensitive and spiritually balanced.

The mature seer learns to value revelation while remaining anchored in truth.

POSTURE FOR DISCERNMENT

What Is a Discernment Posture?

A posture is one's attitude, position, or approach toward something.

A healthy discernment posture reflects the condition of the heart when receiving, evaluating, and responding to revelation.

Discernment begins long before interpretation.

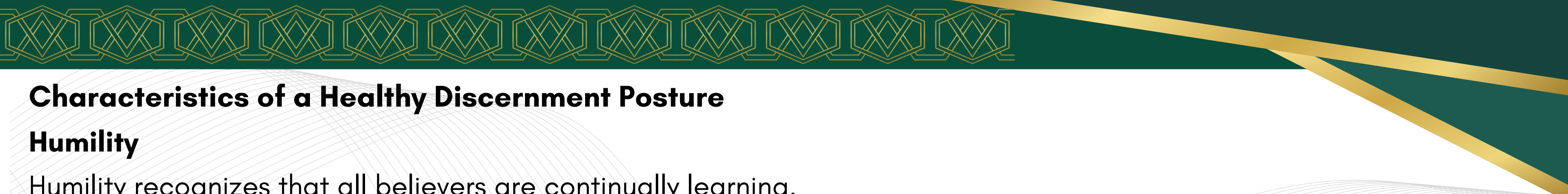
It begins with the attitude of the person receiving the experience.

A healthy posture says:

- I am teachable.
- I do not know everything.
- I am willing to test what I receive.
- I desire truth more than being right.
- I trust God's timing.
- I remain submitted to Scripture.

Humility is one of the greatest safeguards in prophetic ministry.

The moment a believer assumes they can never be mistaken, discernment begins to weaken.



Characteristics of a Healthy Discernment Posture

Humility

Humility recognizes that all believers are continually learning.

Even mature prophetic voices continue to grow in wisdom and understanding.

Humility allows room for correction, growth, and further revelation.

Teachability

A teachable person remains open to learning.

Teachable believers welcome biblical instruction, wise counsel, and accountability.

Patience

Not every experience requires immediate interpretation.

Some revelations unfold over time.

Patience allows God to reveal meaning according to His timing.

Biblical Grounding

Scripture remains the foundation for evaluating all experiences.

No revelation should contradict God's written Word.

Dependence on the Holy Spirit

Discernment is not merely intellectual.

Believers must rely upon the Holy Spirit for wisdom, guidance, and understanding.



SAFE LANGUAGE FOR DISCERNMENT

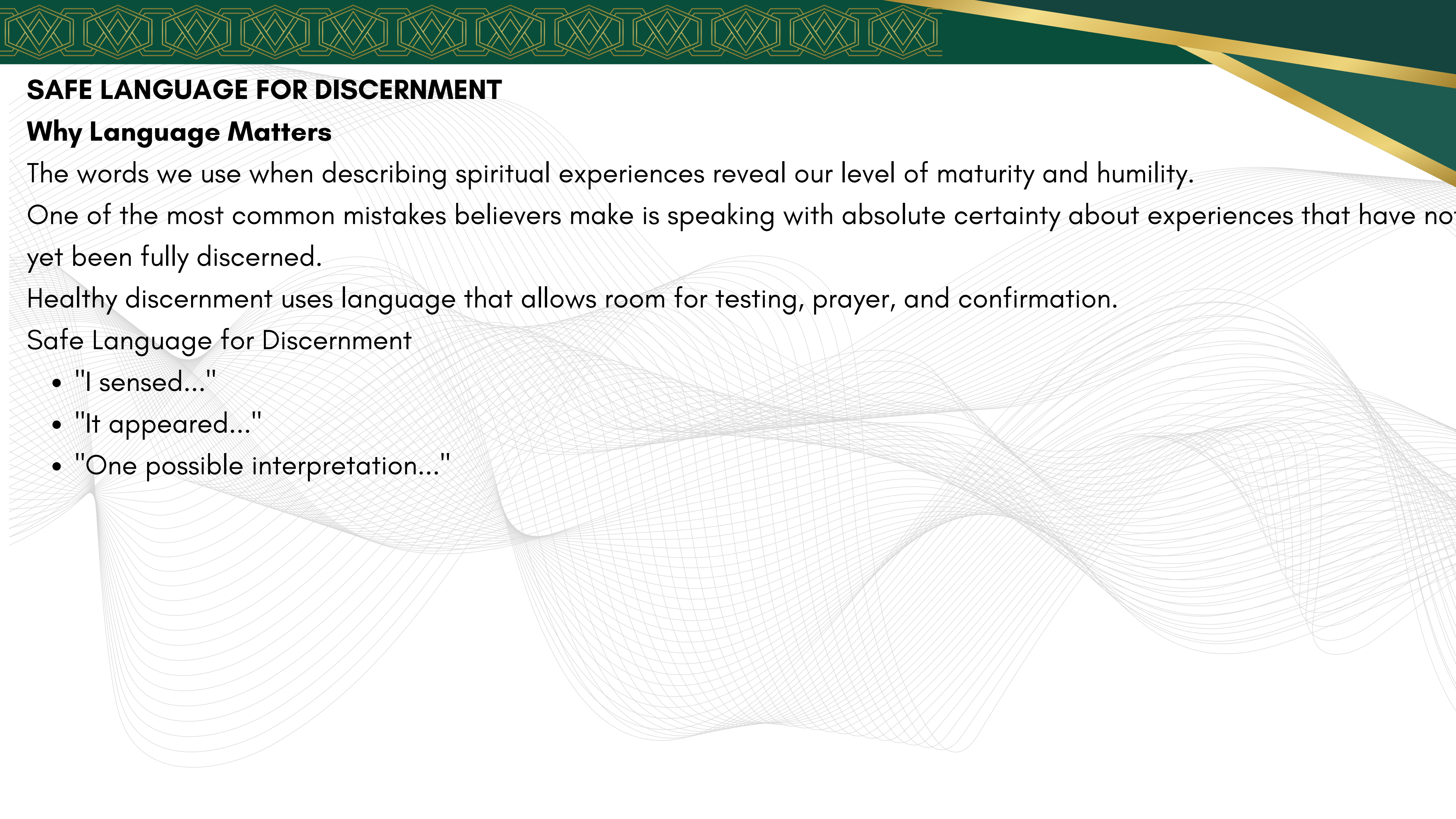
Why Language Matters

The words we use when describing spiritual experiences reveal our level of maturity and humility.

One of the most common mistakes believers make is speaking with absolute certainty about experiences that have not yet been fully discerned.

Healthy discernment uses language that allows room for testing, prayer, and confirmation.

Safe Language for Discernment

- "I sensed..."
 - "It appeared..."
 - "One possible interpretation..."
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Examples of Safe Language

Instead of saying:

"God told me."

Consider saying:

"I believe the Lord may be showing me something."

Instead of saying:

"This definitely means..."

Consider saying:

"This may represent..."

Instead of saying:

"Thus saith the Lord."

Consider saying:

"I am continuing to pray about this."

Safe language demonstrates humility and acknowledges that interpretation may still be developing.

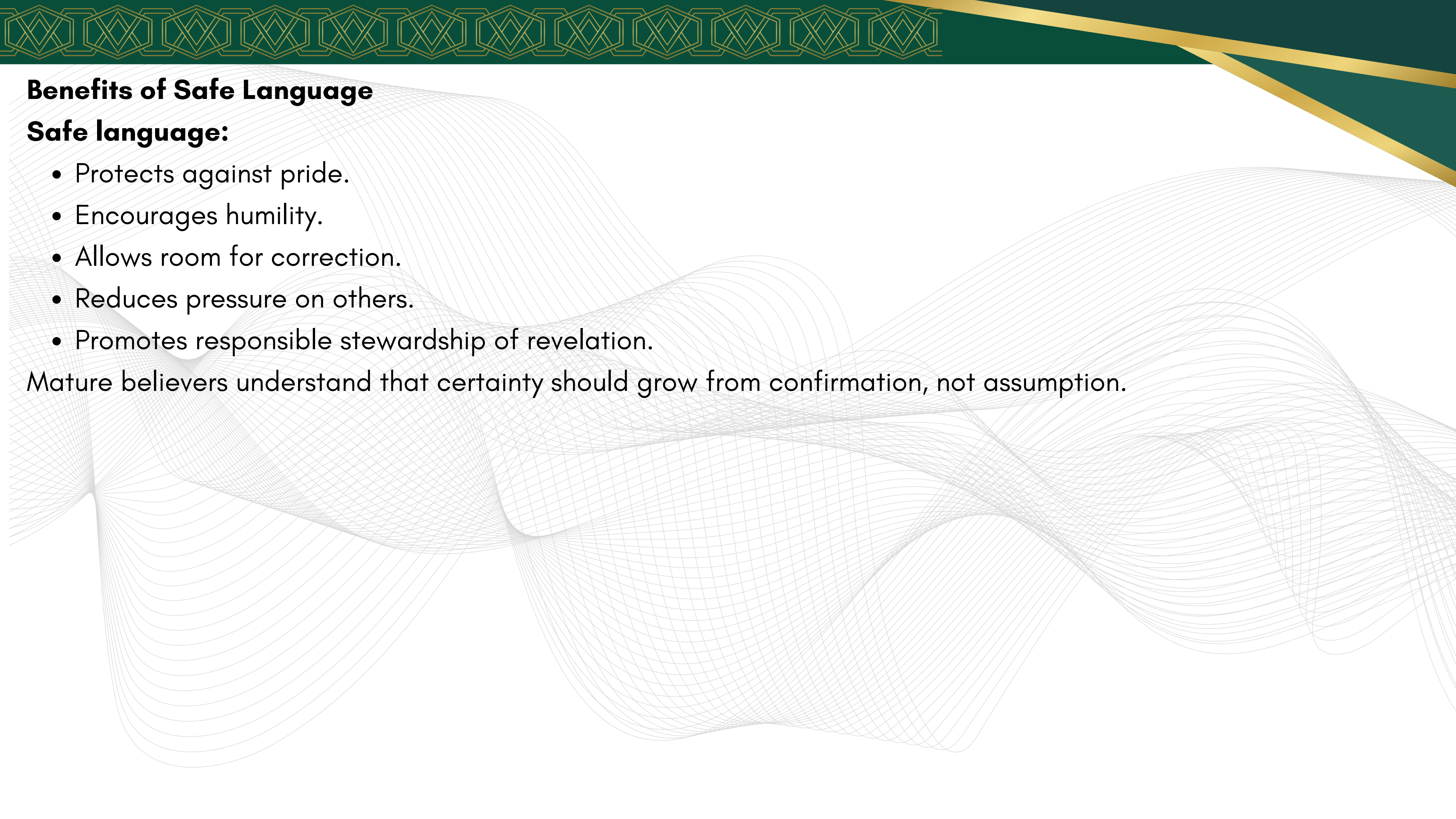


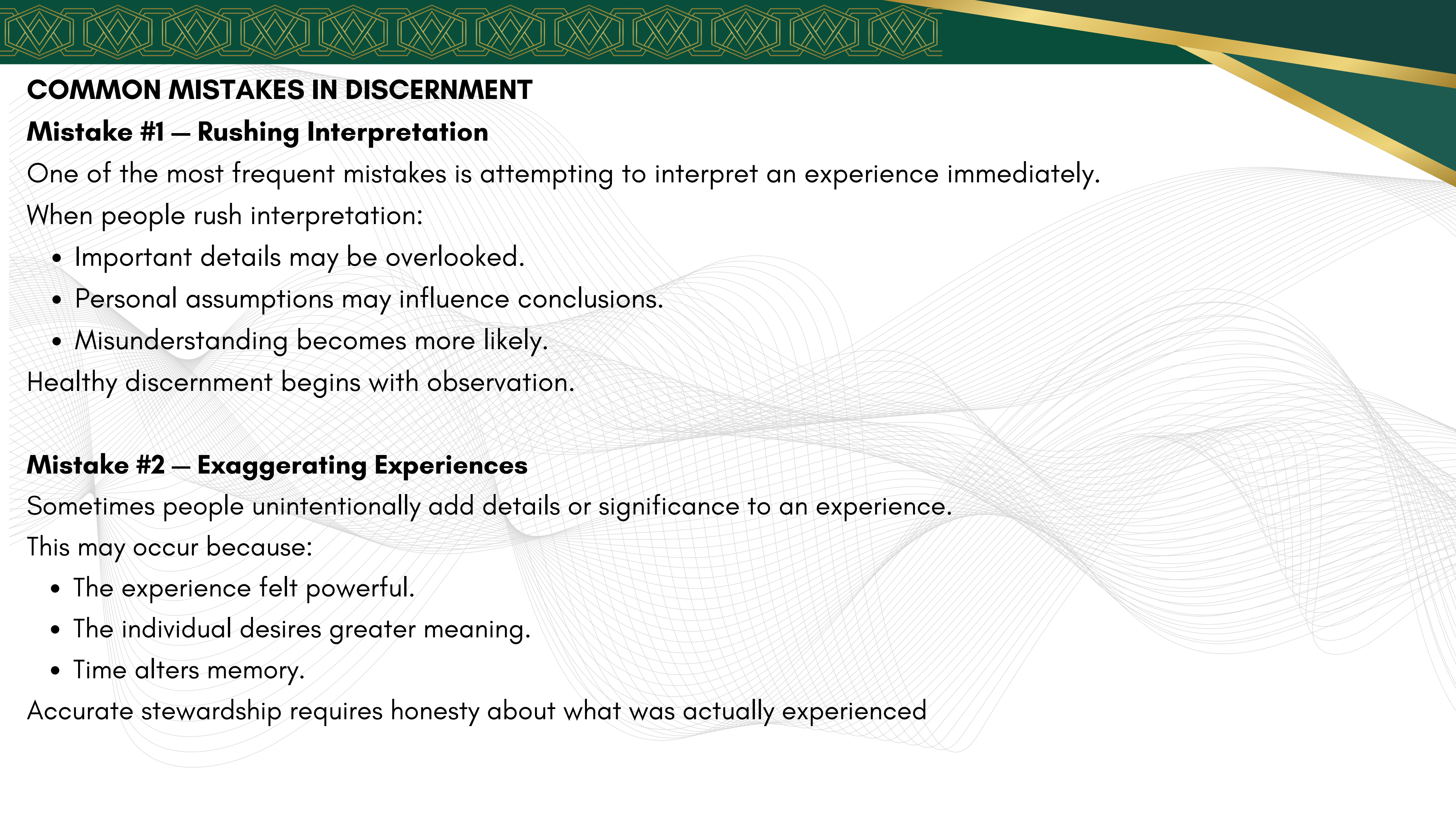
Benefits of Safe Language

Safe language:

- Protects against pride.
- Encourages humility.
- Allows room for correction.
- Reduces pressure on others.
- Promotes responsible stewardship of revelation.

Mature believers understand that certainty should grow from confirmation, not assumption.





COMMON MISTAKES IN DISCERNMENT

Mistake #1 – Rushing Interpretation

One of the most frequent mistakes is attempting to interpret an experience immediately.

When people rush interpretation:

- Important details may be overlooked.
- Personal assumptions may influence conclusions.
- Misunderstanding becomes more likely.

Healthy discernment begins with observation.

Mistake #2 – Exaggerating Experiences

Sometimes people unintentionally add details or significance to an experience.

This may occur because:

- The experience felt powerful.
- The individual desires greater meaning.
- Time alters memory.

Accurate stewardship requires honesty about what was actually experienced



Mistake #3 – Ignoring Context

Every dream, vision, encounter, or revelation occurs within a broader context.

Important considerations include:

- Personal circumstances.
- Current season of life.
- Biblical principles.
- Historical setting.
- Spiritual condition.

Ignoring context can lead to inaccurate conclusions.

Mistake #4 – Seeking Experiences Instead of God

Spiritual experiences are gifts.

They are not the goal.

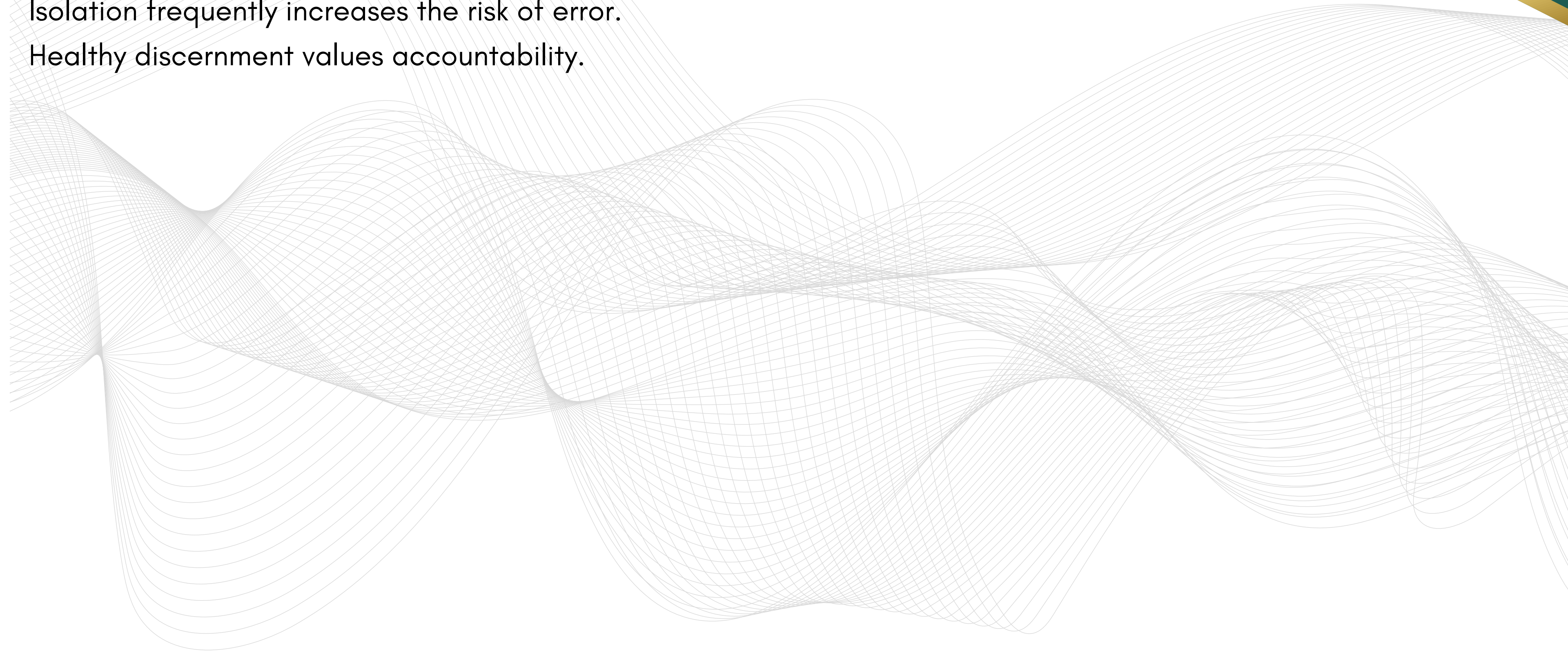
When believers become focused on pursuing experiences rather than pursuing God, spiritual imbalance often follows.

Mistake #5 – Rejecting Accountability

DO NOT RUSH REVELATION

God's Timing Matters

Not every dream, vision, or encounter will be understood immediately. Some revelations unfold over time through prayer, scripture, wisdom, and maturity. Students should avoid rushing to conclusions or forcing meaning before clarity comes. Waiting allows the Holy Spirit to bring understanding in the proper timing and helps protect against misinterpretation, exaggeration, or emotional assumptions.

One of the greatest lessons in discernment is learning to wait.

Not every revelation is meant to be understood immediately.

Throughout Scripture, individuals often received revelation long before its fulfillment or complete understanding.

Examples include:

Joseph

Joseph received dreams concerning his future, yet many years passed before their fulfillment.

Daniel

Daniel received visions that he did not fully understand and required additional explanation.

John

Some revelations in the Book of Revelation continue to be studied and understood today



Why Waiting Is Important

Waiting allows:

- Additional clarity.
- Greater understanding.
- Confirmation.
- Spiritual growth.
- Proper timing.
- Confirmation.

- Sometimes God reveals information progressively rather than all at once.

Throughout Scripture, genuine encounters with God produced change.

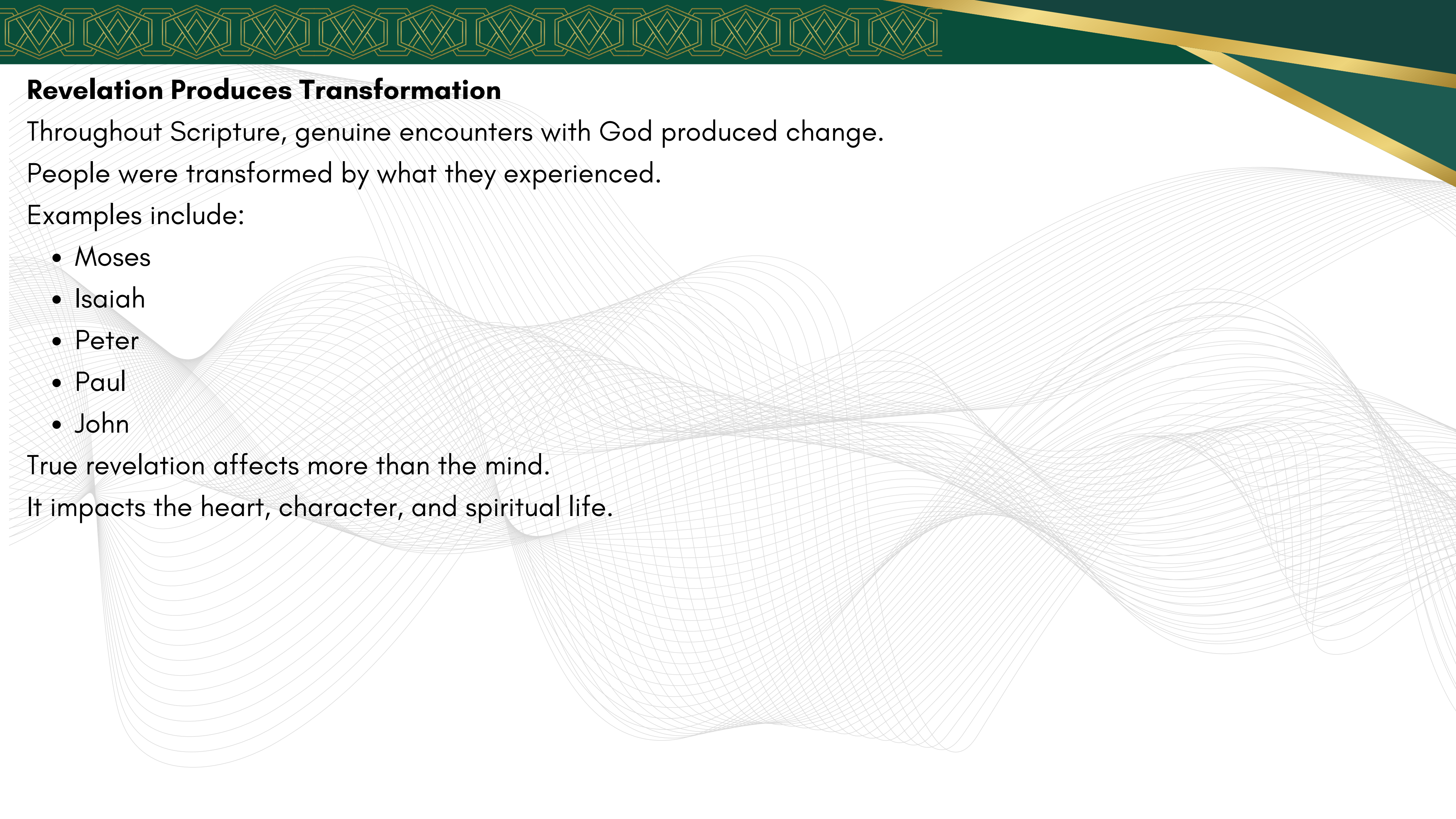
People were transformed by what they experienced.

Dreams, visions, encounters, and revelations are valuable.

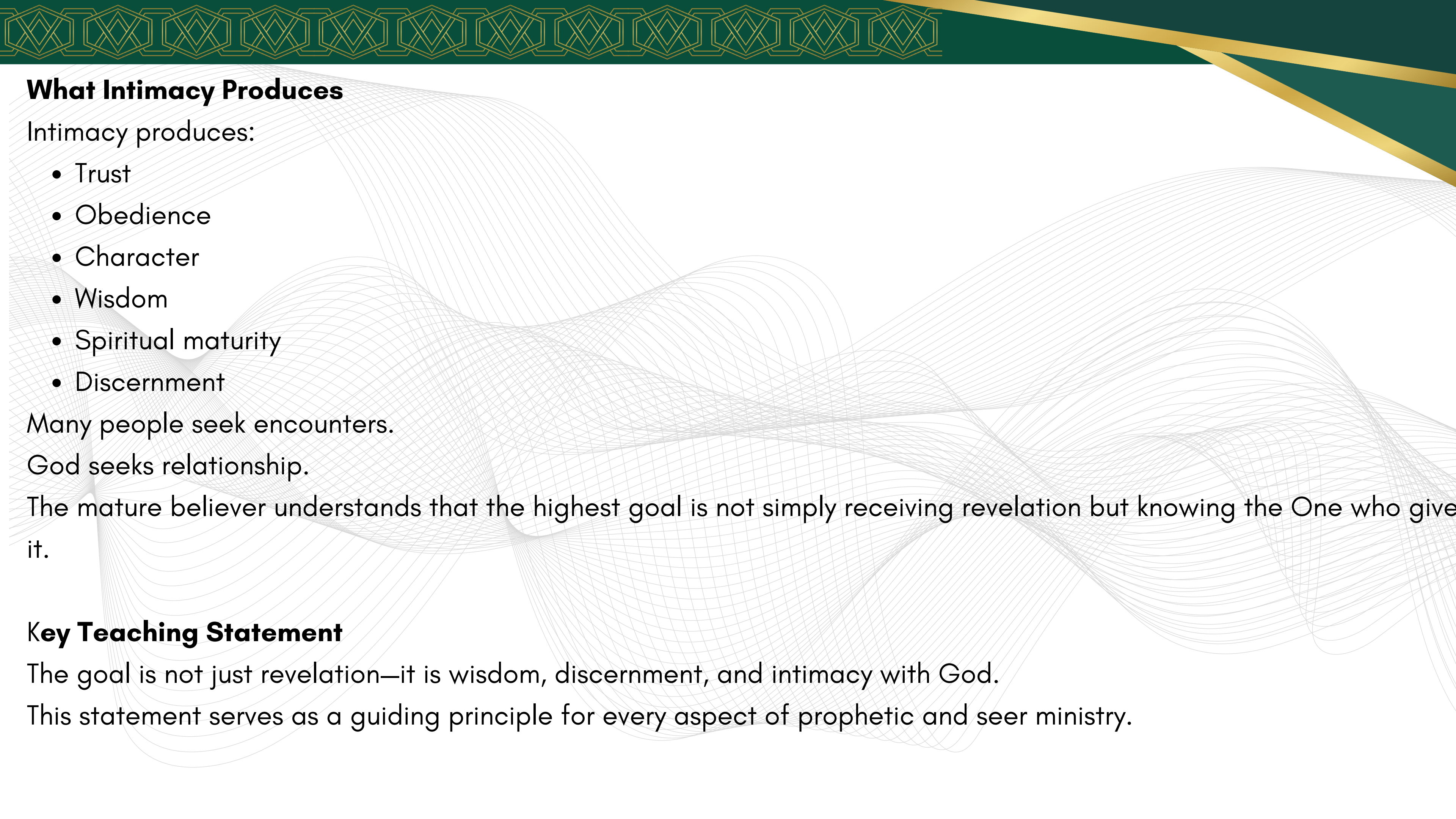
However, they should never replace intimacy with God.

Intimacy Over Experience

As believers grow in dreams, visions, and spiritual encounters, it is important to remember that intimacy with God is the goal—not the pursuit of experiences. While God may use dreams, visions, and encounters to communicate, these experiences are meant to deepen our relationship with Him rather than become the focus of our attention. Spiritual maturity is measured not by the number of experiences we have, but by our obedience, character, love for God, and conformity to Christ. Revelation should lead us closer to the Revealer.
