**Exams and Grading:** 

Two one-hour and twenty min. midterms (each worth a fifth of the course grade) will be given on **Monday**, **October 19**<sup>th</sup> and **Monday**, **November 16**<sup>th</sup>, both at the usual lecture time 7:30-8:50am but the room will be announced when finalized. A three-hour comprehensive final exam (for the remaining three-fifths of the course grade) will be given on **Monday**, **December 7**<sup>th</sup> from 8:00am to 11:00am in a location to be announced. Exams will emphasize lecture material but will also cover assigned reading. Exam format: short questions and answers, figures, diagrams, occasional problems. Performance in section will influence borderline decisions.

**Policy on missed Exams:** 

Do not miss them! The exam dates are published from the first day of class and make-up exams will not be offered. Unavoidable travel or serious illness will require documentation in order to be considered for an exception.

Regrades:

If you have an objection to a particular exam question, you have 24 hours from the end of the exam to raise your concerns. Objections to exam question must be made in person with a prepared argument of why that question was unfair and a decision will then be made whether to throw out that question for the entire class.

If you have objections to the grading of a question on your exam, you have one-week from when you receive your graded exam to petition a

regrade. Your argument must be prepared in writing and submitted in person with your graded exam. Graded exams will be randomly copied before being returned. If you are found altering your answer to an exam question and then resubmitting that question for a regrade you will be given a zero on the exam and reported for academic dishonesty.
