Analyzing Politics

Course Description

Politics can be understood as the combination of individual preferences and decisions into social choices. This course presents an analytical framework for understanding the main issues involved in aggregating individual preferences into group choices. Canonical analytical models are explained and applied to such topics as collective action, majority rule, and coalition formation.

Format

The class will meet three times a week for the duration of the quarter. Class sessions will be conducted as lectures. The lectures will review the concepts discussed in the readings, but should be taken neither as a *duplication* nor as a substitute for them. In other words, you should not assume that because you came to class, you can skip the readings, and/or that because you made the readings you may not attend the lectures.

Assignments

Each week students are expected to read the materials. The formal examinations consist of a mid-term exam in week five and a final exam at the end of the term. The midterm exam accounts for 35% of the final grade and the final exam accounts for 50% of the final grade. Discussion and general class participation accounts for the remaining 15%. Extensions, incompletes, etc. will be given in accordance with UCSD policy. Except under **very pressing circumstances**, they will be discouraged.
