Because I do not want this experiment to interfere with your grades, your performance on these online quizzes can only improve your final grade in the class. Your final grade will be determined by first calculating your percentage of the total possible points earned in two ways—one without and one with the quizzes.

Exams Only: PCT1 = .20 *(MT1%) + 0.30 *(MT2%) + 0.50 *(FINAL%)

Exams and Quizzes: PCT2 = .15 *(MT1%) + 0.25 *(MT2%) + 0.45 *(FINAL%) + 0.15 *(QUIZ%)

Your total weighted points percentage will then be calculated as the *maximum* of those two percentages.

The following letter grades reflect the minimum of the letter grade you can expect to receive based on your total weighted points percentage: 98-100%= A+, 93-97=A, 90-92=A-, 88-89=B+, 83-87=B, 80-82=B-, 78-79=C+, 73-77=C, 70-72=C-, 50-69=D, <50% = F

The bins may be curved based on overall class performance. The curve can only improve your final letter grade relative to the minimums stated above, not lower it.

Policies

Exam dates are not negotiable. You MUST take the exams scheduled for the section of class you are enrolled in. If you miss a midterm because of documented illness, sports or legal reasons, the weight of the missed midterm will be added to the weight of the final exam. If you miss a midterm for any other reason, you will receive a score of zero on that midterm. There are no acceptable reasons for missing the final-- if you miss the final, you will receive a failing grade for the course. If you believe that an exam has not been properly graded, you must discuss this with the TA who graded the relevant part of the exam within two weeks of when exams were first returned to class. Any student found guilty of academic misconduct will earn a failing grade for the course. In addition to this academic sanction, the Council of Deans of Student Affairs will impose a disciplinary penalty.
