## Political Science 120A Political Development

The purpose of this course is to provide an analytical introduction to the application of contemporary analytic political science to the understanding of historical and contemporary political issues.

The course will focus on the 4 origins of the modern state; the conditions of the democratic stability and instability, and the political economy of modern democracies.

Course grades will be based on one take home mid-term (40%, assigned approximately the end of the 5<sup>th</sup> week) and one take home final (60% assigned approximately Friday of the 10<sup>th</sup> week).

There are no prerequisites and all are welcome.
