## ANBI 116 Evolution of SEX Winter 2017/18



**INSTRUCTOR:** Pascal Gagneux (Assoc. Professor, Departments of Pathology and Anthropology)

- GOAL: The course will explore the evolution of sexual reproduction. Human reproduction, like that of all other mammals is strictly sexual. This requires the existence of two sexes and precludes the persistence of successful genetic combinations across generations. This course will consider the evolutionary advantages and costs of sex. We will discuss the genetics of sex-determination, molecular recognition between gametes, fetal tolerance during pregnancy, primate mating systems, social and cultural aspects of sex and latest developments in assisted reproductive technologies.
