



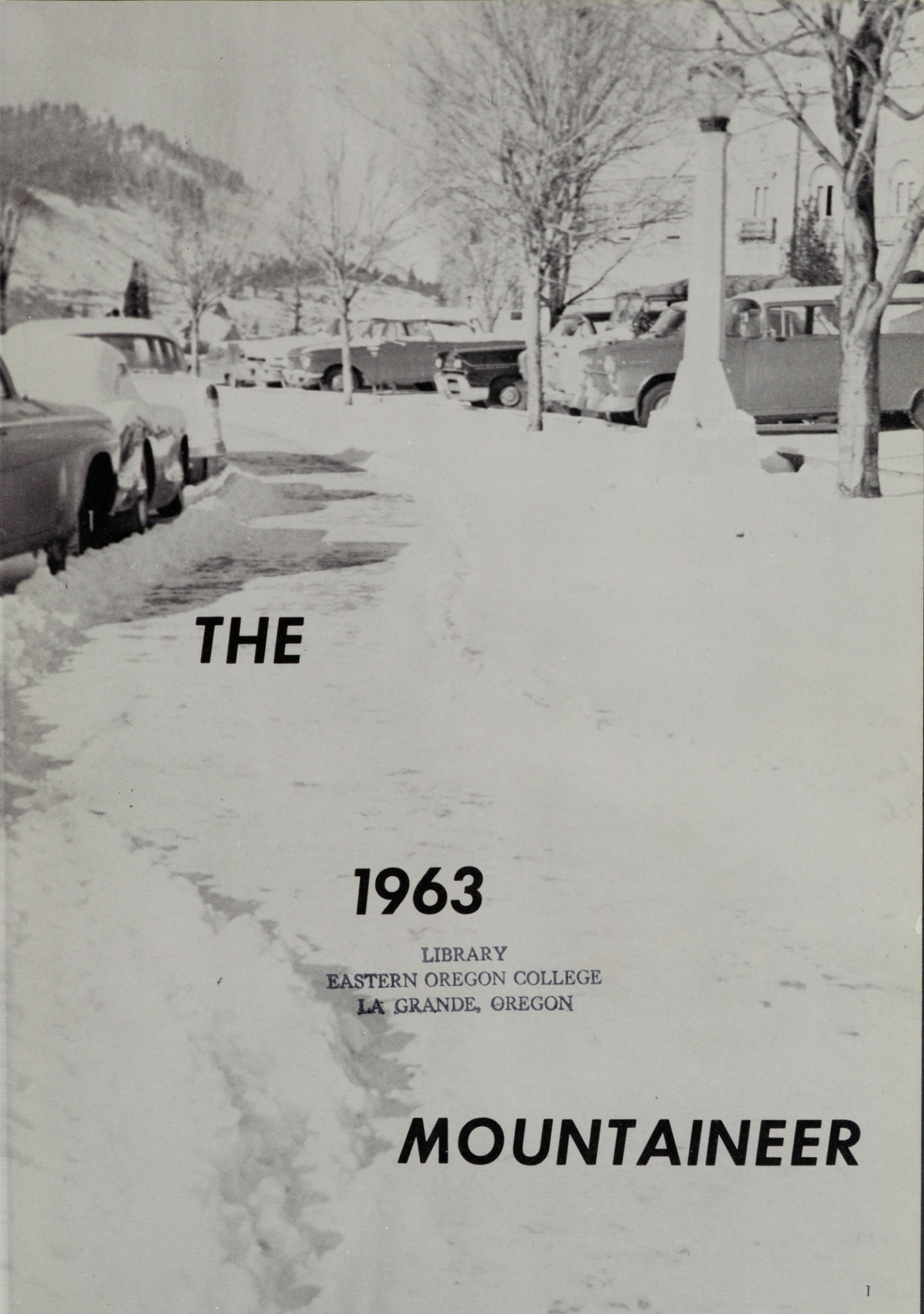

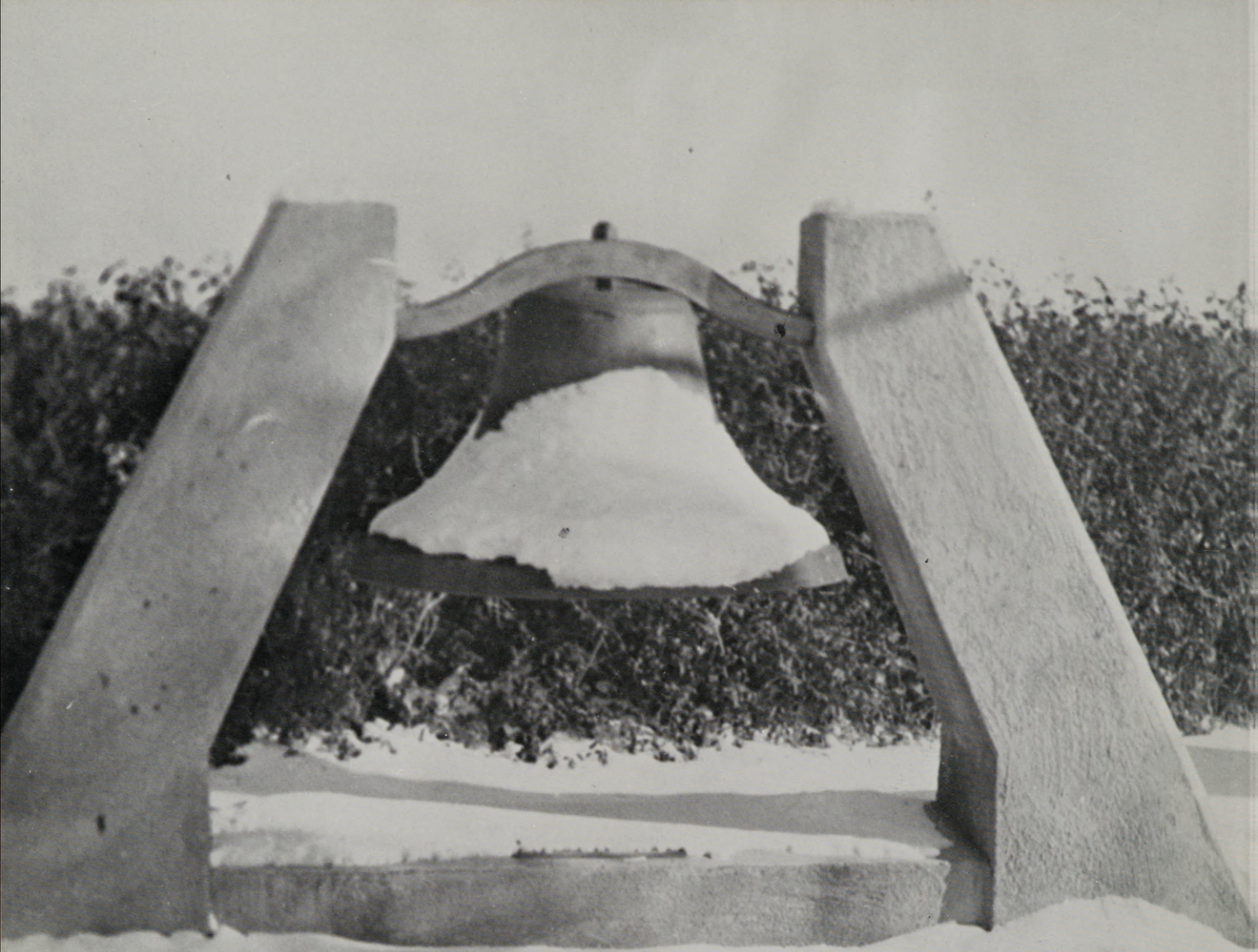

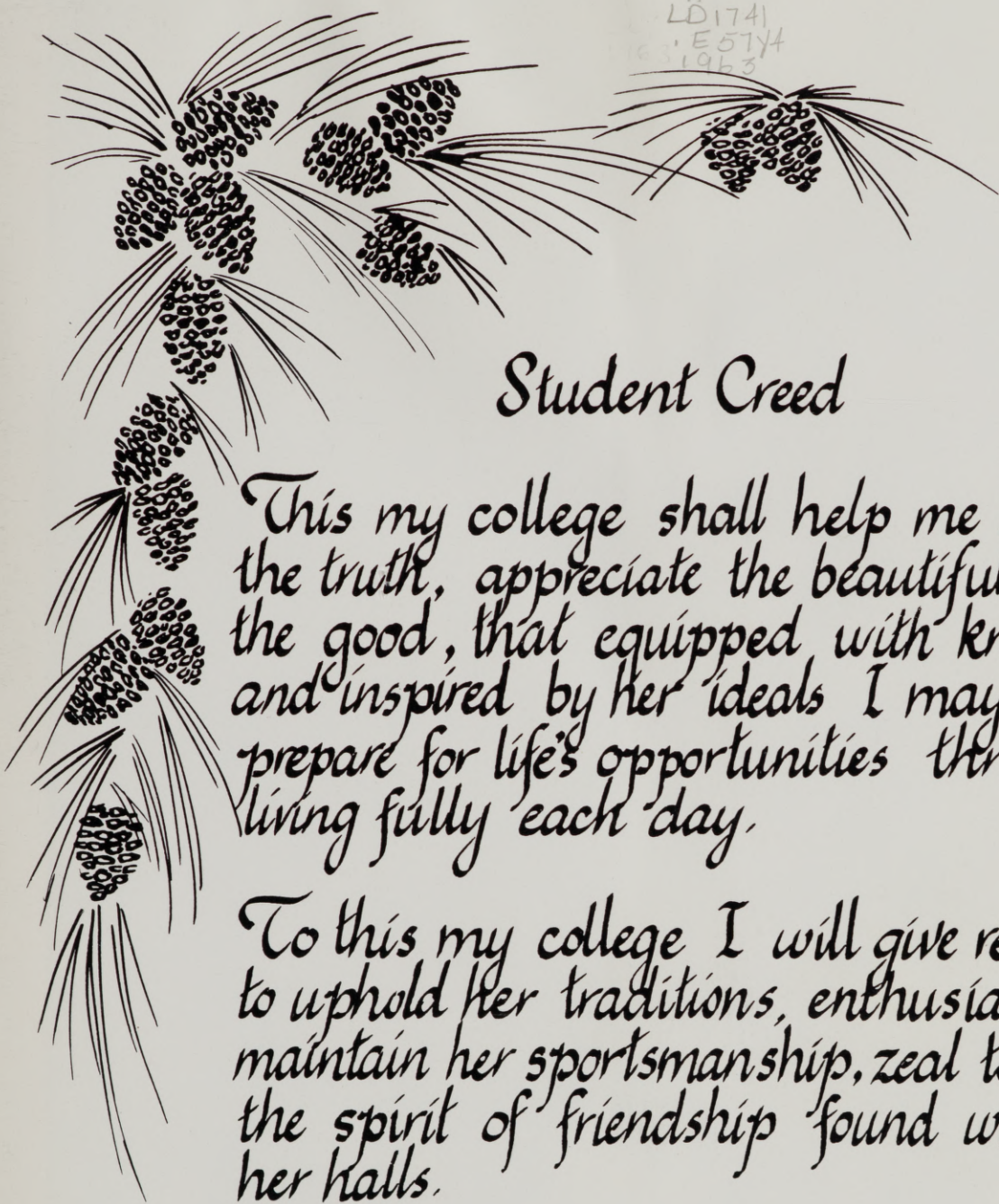

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Our hope for a science-mathematics building expressed a year ago is still very much alive. The legislature has not yet adjourned but so far has carried it in very high priority. Legislative approval will make it possible for us to proceed immediately with this fine additional structure.

Enrollments again have surged forward, giving us a new high of 1,161. The continued growth makes necessary constant attention to adequate housing space both for instruction and for student housing. A new science-mathematics building will ease our instructional space and we will open the west addition to Dorion Hall for women student housing in September, 1963. This will house one hundred and seventy women students and make available sixteen fine new courts for married housing.

Our growth also makes possible new curricular offerings and requires constant attention to our need in this direction. Guidelines for the college have been established and submitted to the State Board of Higher Education for approval. It is our hope that we may soon make a beginning in subject major areas in a limited number of fields. If this is done, there will be added to the breadth in subject areas we have already attained greater subject depth in our curriculum offerings.

All these things are factors that work together with the excellence of our staff and students to give us increasing status and stature as an institution.

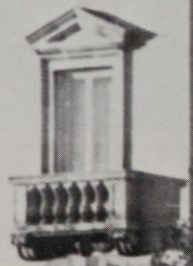
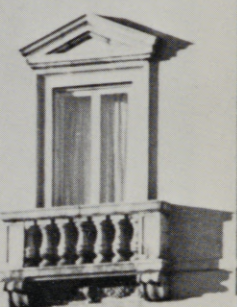


ROBERT "BOB" OESTERLING

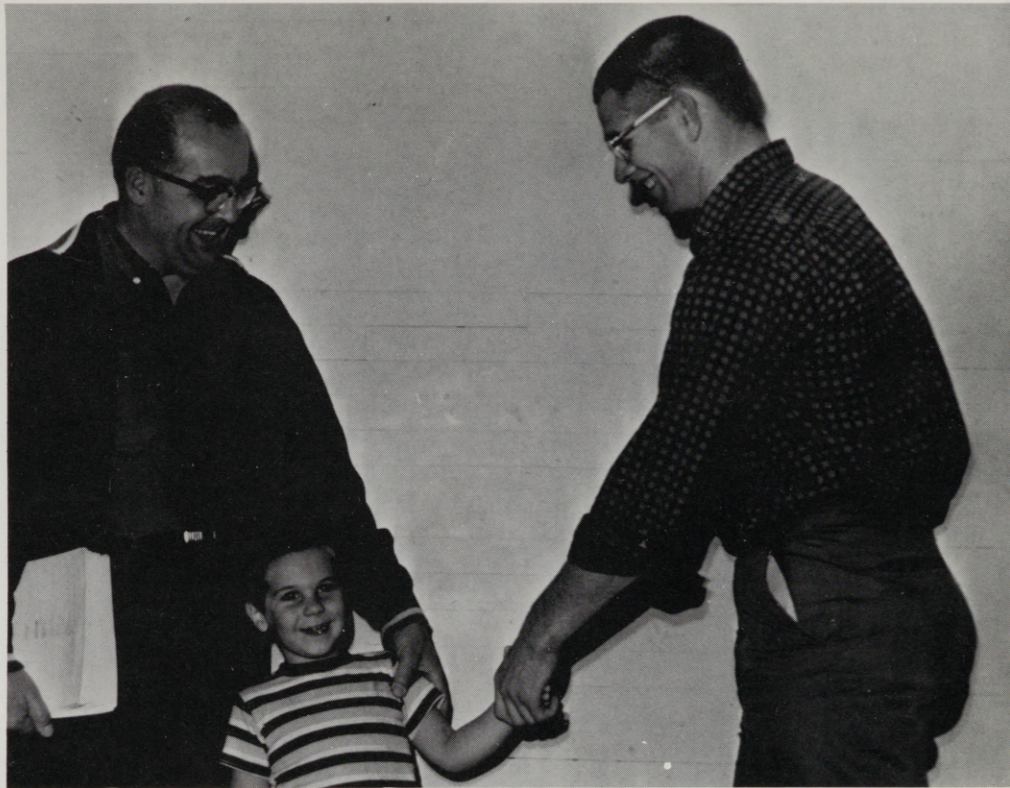

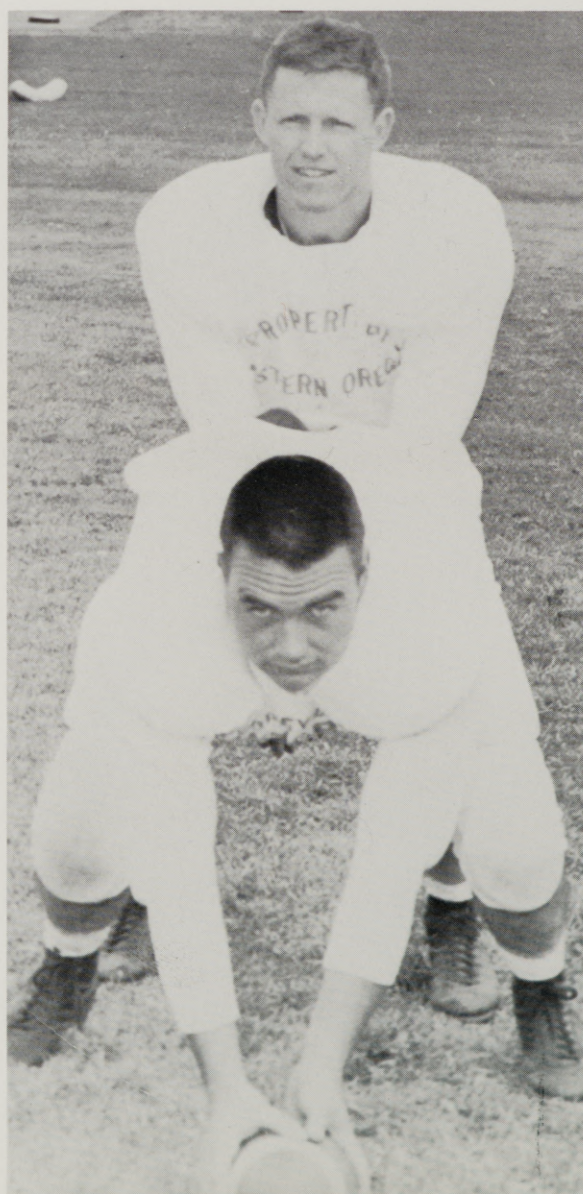

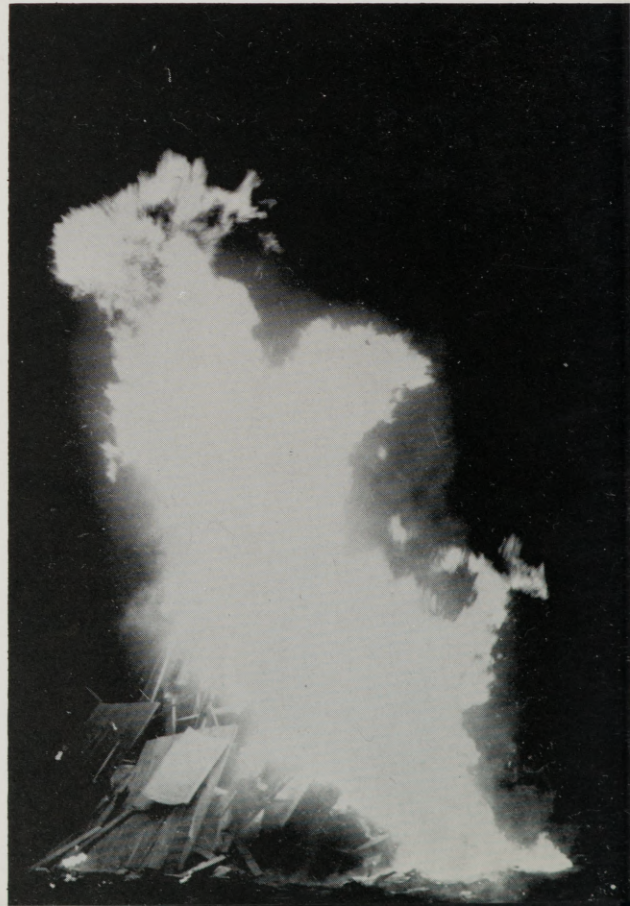

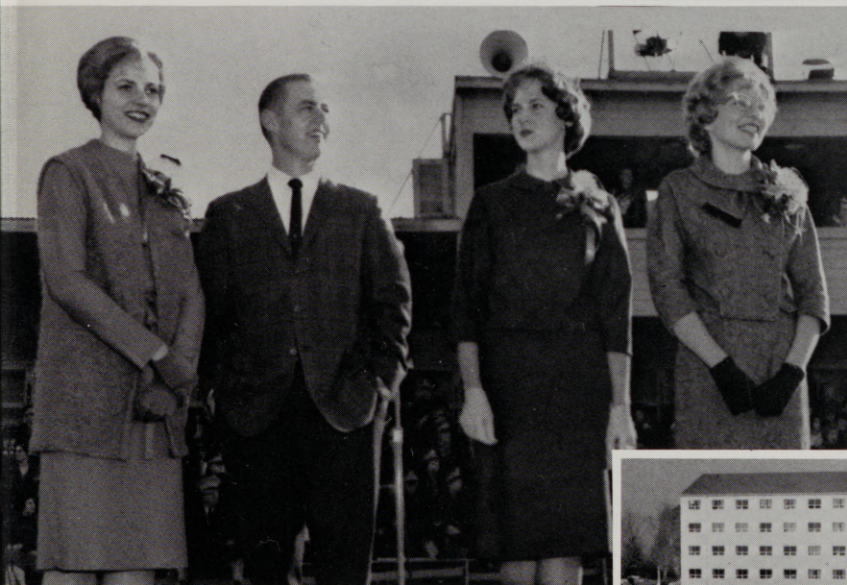

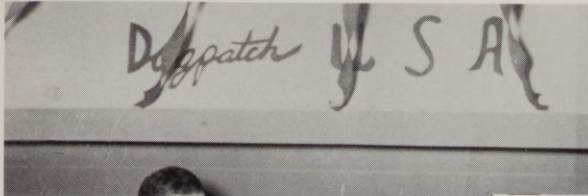

Dick Turley has also played his last collegiate basketball game of his career. Dick did outstanding work in the center position this year. He did outstanding work on the back

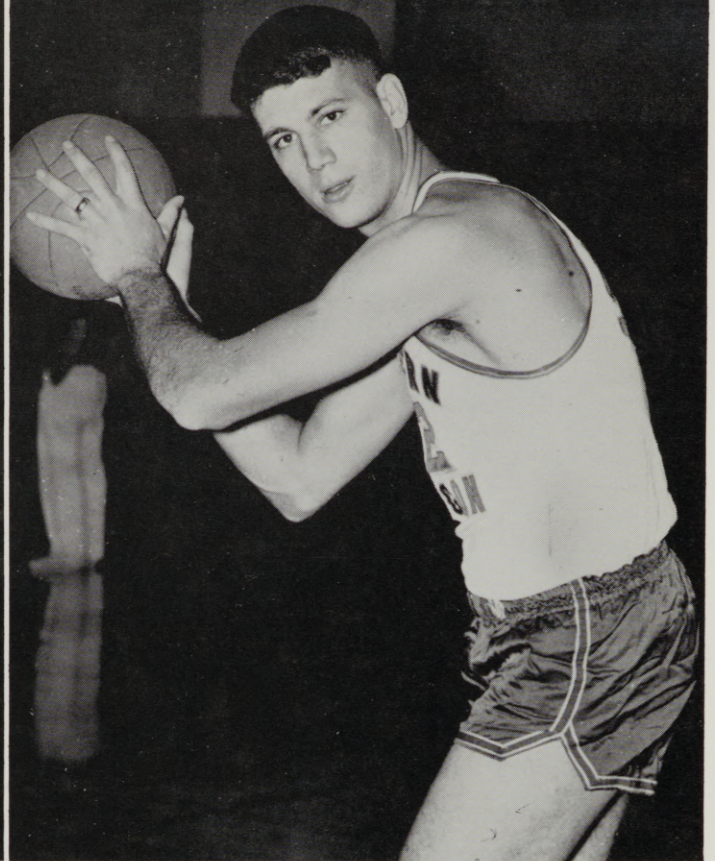

Mounties winning matches against Pacific U. and their weight division were: Lee Derrick, decision, 123; Dennis Waite, pin, 130; Ron Dunn, dec., 137; Darrel Good, 167, Chuck Holliday, 177, and Steve Straughan, heavyweight, all won by forfeit.

Whitman went down to defeat against the Mounties 23-11, with the following EOC grapplers winning their respective divisions: Curtis, forfeit, 123; Derrick, pin, 130; Waite, decisions, 137; Holliday, pin, 177; Straughan, pin, heavyweight.

EOC 3rd In NAIA Tournament

Pacific University was the scene of

the District 2 NAIA Tournament, February 23 and 24, in which EOC finished third among the seven teams competing.

Represented by four men, or less than one-half a squad the Mountie matmen compiled 42 points. Portland State won the tournament with 93, Southern Oregon gained 71, EOC 42, Oregon College 21, Pacific U. 18, Linfield 15, and Lewis and Clark 12.

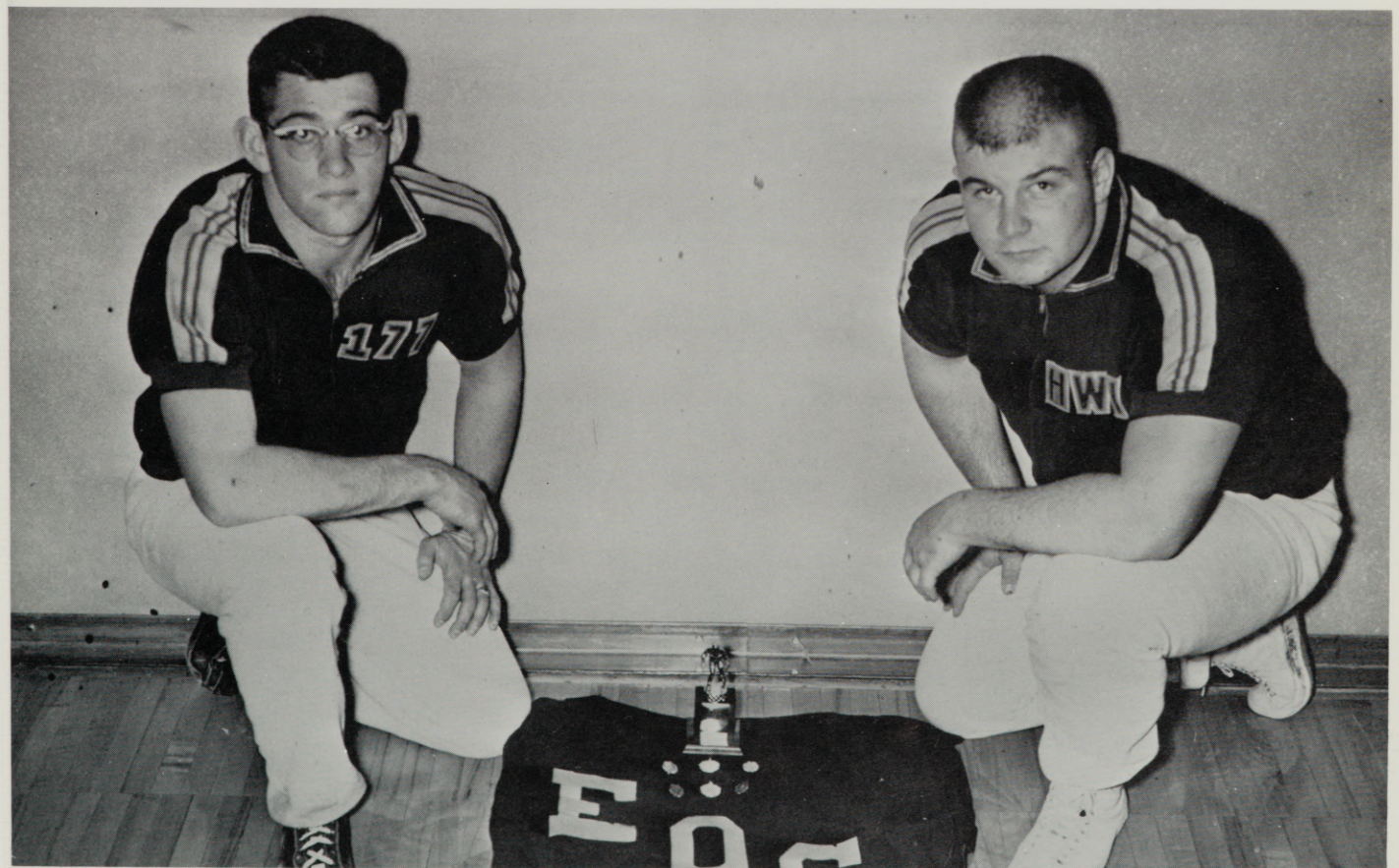
Straughan, Holiday, Champions

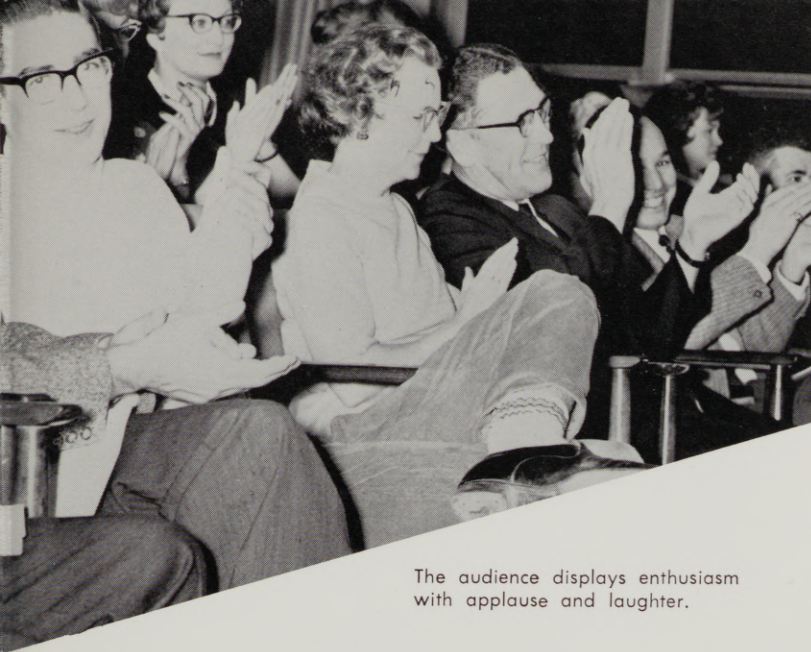

RESOLUTION

Whereas the Young Democrats Club of EOC believes that it is at least half as important to avoid the necessity of war as it is to prepare for war; and whereas a society's allocation of resources is a reasonable indicator of that society's scale of values, we suggest:

That an amount equal to one-half of the annual military budget be allocated to the task of raising living standards in deprived areas of the world. The major part or all of this money could be raised by current taxation through increase in the federal income tax. We suggest that this program include massive investment in simple tools that will replace simple digging sticks, hand powered systems of raising water, and in any other situation in which it is feasible at the most intimate level to multiply the power of men's muscles.

It should be noted that these measures would not deprive men of the necessity for work, but would allow their work to be more fruitful and rewarding. It should also be noted that the free substitution of a simple power tiller for a digging stick upsets no economy—for the owner of the digging stick does not now constitute a market.

Perhaps in the long run the greatest domestic advantage to be gained from such a program would be the demonstration that there are constructive ways to take up the slack that might result from an arms reduction. This might help convince some unbelievers that it would be possible to tolerate peace in the world.

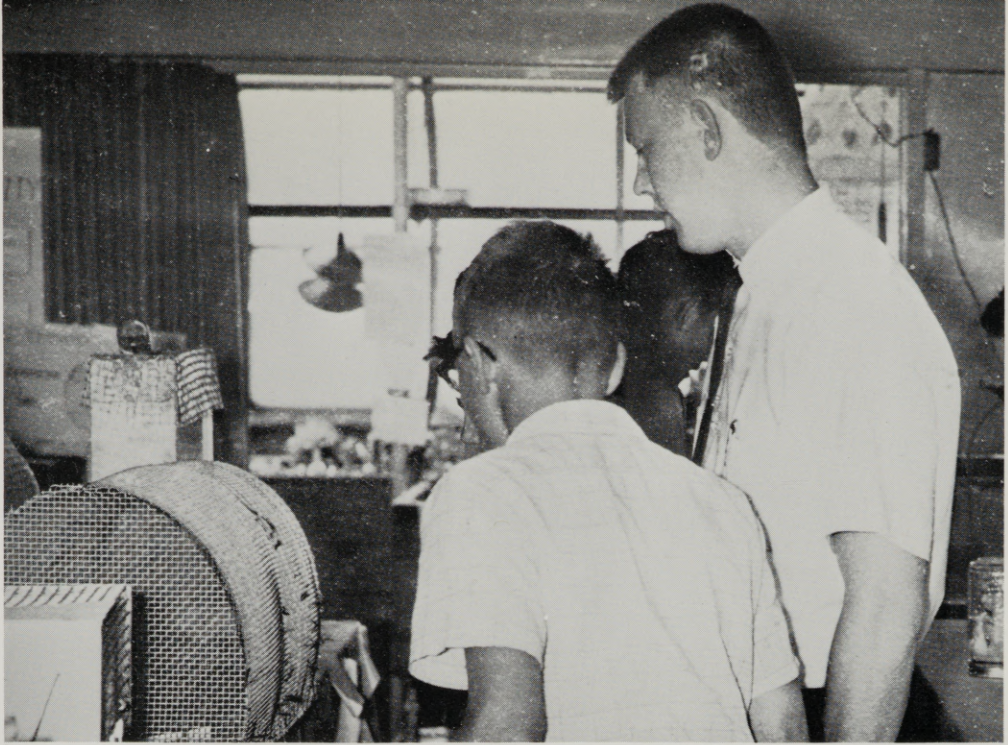

Eastern Oregon College wound up its 1963 Track season by taking third at the Oregon Collegiate Conference Meet, May 16-18, at Ashland. Also competing in this meet were PSC, OCE and SOC.

After the completion of this meet, several EOC thinclads found themselves in a position to attend the District meet at Salem, May 24-25. However, with finals so near, these men decided not to attend this meet. Those qualifying were: Jerry Evans, 3rd (9.8) in the 100 yard dash and 3rd (22.1) in the 220; Bill Lewis, 4th (17.12) in the 3 mile; Larry Christian, 5th (179 ft. 10 in.) in the Javelin; Larry Nice, Dave Green, Jerry Evans and Duane Wood 3rd (3:35.6) in the Mile Relay; and Orrin Lay, 5th (11 ft. 6 in.) in the Pole Vault.

Although, as of now, no one has asserted his intentions of going to the District meet, EOC's track men have set several records for this school. Records have been broken this year by: Jerry Evans, 9.8 for 100 yards; Larry Nice, 22.4 in 220 yards, (broken at the Conference meet by Jerry Evans with a time of 22.1); Larry Nice, Jerry Evans, Dave Green and Dave Larson, 1:33.3 in the 880 yard relay; and Skeet Correa, Jerry Evans, Duane Wood, and Larry Nice, 44.4 for the 440 yard relay.

Looking back on the track season, I have, and I feel I share the feelings of the other fellas, enjoyed working under Coach Don Campbell and Assistant Coach Louis Thorne, a record holder for EOC over the hurdles. Losing only two men to graduation.

The overall record for the season was: two wins, a second, a third (Conference), and a fourth. With a little more depth and experience, EOC could have a tremendous season next year. Support your Mounties, they ARE worth attention!

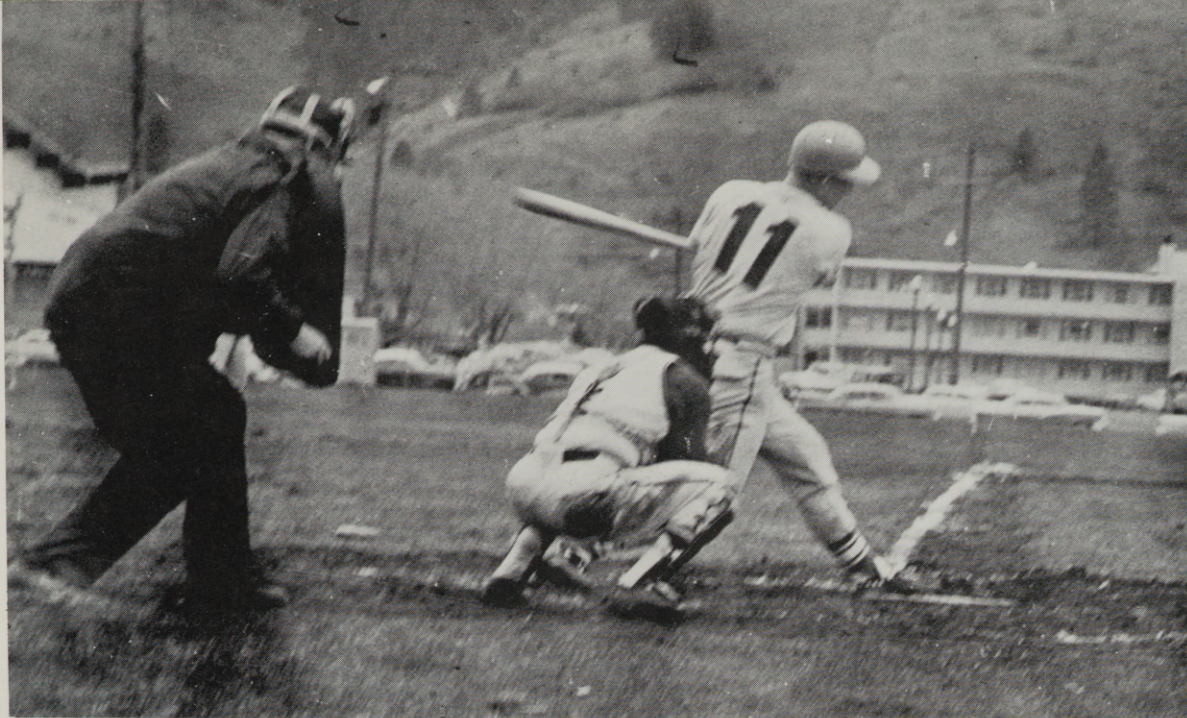

OCE needed three victories to throw the race into a three way tie, but such was not the case as PSC pranced home with three easy wins, 8-2, 14-2 and 4-1. The losses dropped OCE into fourth spot with a 5-7 record.

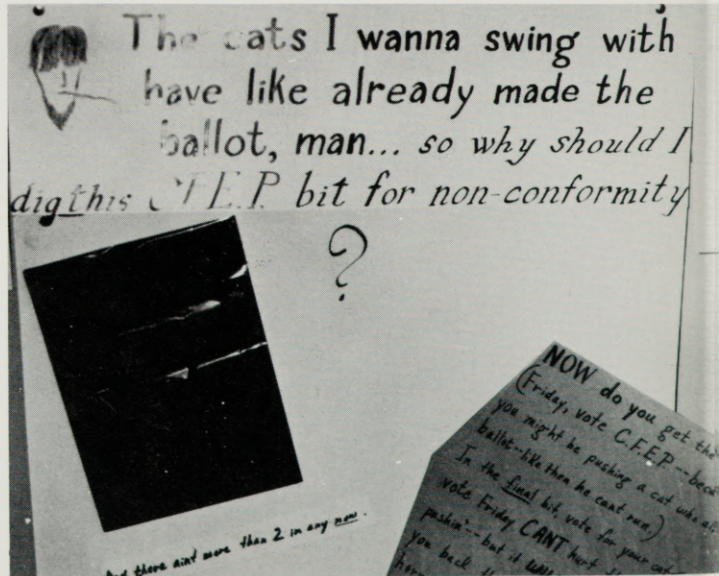

WHERE WE STAND:

The CFEP was originally organized by a group of students to express their dissatisfaction with the elimination of the write-in ballot in the primary election.

This action was merely an effect, not a cause. The responsibility for that action lies not with any student or group of students so much as it does with a constitution that allowed this situation to arise.

A remedy for this situation can not be found by allowing write-ins on the final election. This would make no more sense than their elimination in the primaries.

The remedy, if there is to be one, lies in action started now but directed at the future. In short, the ballots cast for CFEP are meant to indicate to the student senate that the students want that body to begin immediately preparations for a thorough revision of the school constitution with the purpose in mind of preventing in future years situations similar to the one that erupted this past week.

We feel that write-ins should appear on the primary ballot only, and that campaign speeches begin a week prior to the primary election.
