SUMMARY OF GAMES

THE MOUNTAINEERS started the season by winning a decisive victory from Whitworth College of Spokane. The score was 35 to 0.

The second and third games were played with Lewiston Normal. The first one was played in La Grande, October 6, and the second, a week later at Lewiston. These games proved to be easy victories for the Mountaineers. The scores were 38 to 0 and 26 to 0, respectively.

College of Idaho played in La Grande October 28. This game was the homecoming game and was one of the most interesting games of the season. It ended in a tie, 6 to 6. This was the first game in which the Mountaineers had an opportunity to show their full strength.

The next week the Mountaineers traveled to Albion Normal, where another victory was won. The score was 26 to 7. This game was played in six inches of snow.

The team met its first defeat at the hands of the strong Whitman College of Walla Walla. The score was 7 to 0.

“CY” CRAWFORD—*Half*—“Cy” was the handy man of the backfield. He played practically every minute and gave a good account of himself.

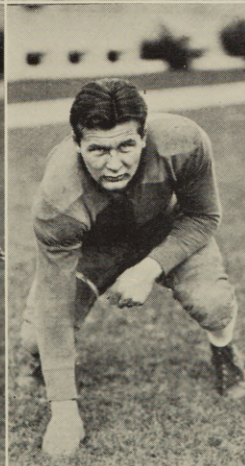
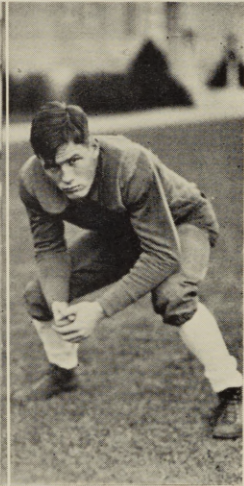
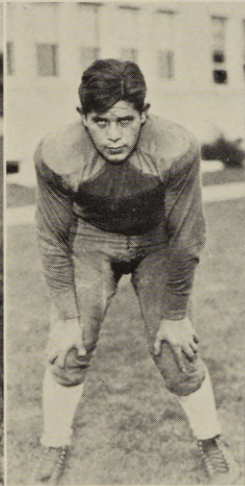
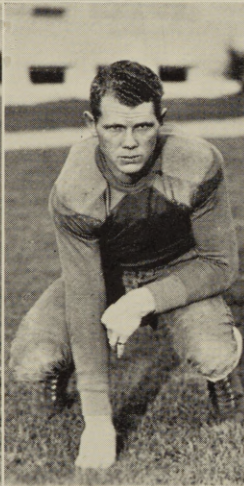
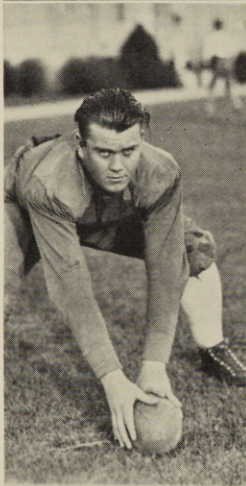
“PETE” MILES—*Half*—This sorrel topped quarterback was the hardest man to stop on the team in spite of his weight. Pete will not soon be forgotten.

VOLLEYBALL

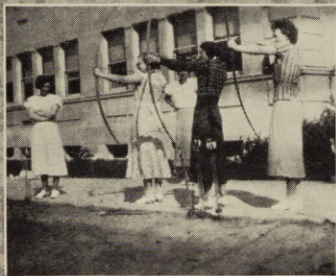
