- **2. A suggested approach to leading a discussion.** A good discussion will usually have a blend of observation: what does the passage say; interpretation: what does the passage mean; and then application: how does this relate to me?
 - **a. Observation questions.** Ask questions that address the main point.
 - What stands out to you in this passage?
 - What is Paul talking about?
 - What were some broad takeaways from the sermon/lesson?

The two questions you should use most frequently during the observation stage are: what things strike you in this passage; and what else do you see?

- **b. Interpretation questions.** What does the passage mean? Establish the right answers and gently distinguish these from the wrong ones. Ask questions that get them into the text and it may require some thought.
- **c. Application questions.** What does the passage mean to me? This is the heart of your discussion. Your small group provides a great setting to go deep on application. The person who teaches should give two or three application questions, which you can use as starter questions.

There are *general application* questions that are open-ended. There are also *specific application* questions.
