HISTORY OF EASTMAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

In response to a petition of certain members of the Presbyterian Church residing in the Town of Eastman, the Presbytery of Macon, in Session in Columbus, Georgia, appointed Rev. William McKay to visit the field and if the way was clear organize the petitioners into a church to be known as the First Presbyterian Church of Eastman, Georgia.

Rev. William McKay visited Eastman on Sunday, June 23, 1877, held services in the courthouse and organized the church with the following members: Mrs. Fannie P. Chandler and Miss Lillie E. Chandler by letter from Statesville, N. C., Mrs. Mary DeGroat by letter from the Methodist Episcopal Church in New York, William Pitt Eastman and Miss Carro C. Eastman from the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A, Mrs. John Gardiner from the First Presbyterian Church, Springfield, Ill., Mrs. Ursula Roberts by letter from Flemington, Ga. Joseph W. Sheldon and Mrs. Nancy Sheldon from Methodist Episcopal Church, New York, George W Sheldon and John D. Sheldon by profession of faith, Mrs. Mary Russell by letter from First Presbyterian Church in Macon, Ga.

Messrs W.P. Eastman and J. W. Sheldon were elected Ruling Elders, and Mr. Sheldon declaring his acceptance of the office, was ordained and installed in the duties of the office. Mr. Eastman was not present and seems to have declined the office, as there is no record of his acceptance.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then administered and at the close of the Service, a meeting of Session was held with Rev. McKay acting as Moderator, at which Ruling Elder Sheldon was elected Clerk of Session. Rev. McKay became the supply of the Church, part of his salary being paid by the home Mission Committee of Macon Presbytery.

The Church continued to use the courthouse as their place of worship until their house of worship was erected in 1892. The records are incomplete and it is, therefore, hard to determine the time during which various ministers have served the congregation, but at least, as can best be determined, the following list seem to have been the ministers:

Mr. Stanford Parnell, a senior student of Columbia Seminary, preached for us three months during the summer of 1932. Rev. W. J. Hazelwood is our present pastor.

In 1925 plans were underway to erect a more adequate place of worship. The first building had no space provided for the Sunday School. In addition to this fact the church being in a very undesirable location, the building was sold and the fund was used for the purchase of the present lot.

Through the patient and untiring efforts of Rev. J. S. Davis, the plans for the present building were formulated and erection begun and the church completed.

The Presbyterian organization is greatly indebted to Rev. Davis for his work here. He was a pastor not only of the Presbyterian Church, but of the whole city. He was loved by all.

The Church is a brick edifice of colonial design. A feature of this building is the unusual arrangement of the Sunday School rooms, which allow a child to start on one side of the church in the Cradle Roll and when he finished Young People's work, he will have been around the church.

This church is one of the most modern equipped buildings in Georgia. We have running water and ceiling fans and adequate heat. The Woman's Auxiliary of the church has furnished the church with the beautiful carpets which we now have. The Auxiliary of the church has through the years been responsible for the lawn. Needless to say, the grounds are well kept and form one of the most beautiful lots in the city.

In June 25, 1933, Rev. William James Hazelwood came as a supply pastor. After the fall meeting of Macon Presbytery, he was ordained and installed as pastor of the church. During his ministry the church was dedicated on October 28, 1935. From the church we organized a Mission point at Chester, Georgia. This work has been carried on for two years, at a point where church work and influence is wanting.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Donot know the year the Sunday School was organized. We now have an enrollment of 38. Have as many, or more, grown people attending Sunday School, as we have children.

The Church and the School have both lost members by families moving away. We have a Bible class, Intermediate, Junior and Primary department.

The Sunday School sends each year, several young people to the Conference at Houston Lake.

The Sunday School is responsible for the maintenance of the Church building. Also contributes to Thornwell Orphans and Ministerial Relief.

The school has held the banner for a number of years for the largest per capita offering in the Macon Presbytery for Rally Day.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE EASTMAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

In 1910 the women of the Presbyterian Church of Eastman called themselves The Ladies Aid. The year 1912 they were organized by Mrs. Morgan of Americus into a Woman's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church.

Our work was carried on under our new name until 1921, when again we changed our name to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church. This change was made under Mrs. Frank Gunn's administration as Presbyterial President. We have carried on the work as the Auxiliary, and according to the plan for the women of the church. Our Auxiliary has grown in interest. The most outstanding development is in leadership. We have many weak places, and we are not satisfied with ourselves by any means.

Knowing the work as I do from 1910 until now, I can see where we have made some progress in Auxiliary work. Our Auxiliary has helped pay church dept, paid for carpet in church. Also bought shrubbery and placed around the church. We also keep the shrubbery pruned and the lawn mowed. We respond to all causes of the church as far as we can.

In White Cross, Birthday Offering, Home and Foreign Mission Study and gifts, Blessing Boxes and Bible Study, we are quite active.

The Eastman Presbyterian Church is still without a pastor. Three new members were received by letter into the church during 1938: Mrs. B. W. Yawn, from the Methodist Church of Eastman, March 24, 1938; Mrs. W. D. Gaster, from the Sherwood Presbyterian Church, Fayetteville, N. C., May 3, 1938; Preston Stamps, son of Mrs. Gaster, from the Sherwood Presbyterian Church, Fayyetteville, N. C., May 3, 1938.

Death visited our ranks. Miss Margaret Harrington passed away June 9, 1938. Mrs. B. W. Yawn died at Greenville, S. C., September 1, 1938.

The Death Angel also visited our Auxiliary Family and took away our beloved president, Mrs. W. D. Gaster, on January 10, 1939. How we miss her! Her patience in planning, her love and loyalty to the church and auxiliary is still an inspiration and a challenge to each of us to go forward. It can be truly said, "She fought a good fight; she has kept the faith; she has finished her course".

The Auxiliary followed the programs as given in the literature sent from the Committee on Woman's Work, Atlanta, for circle and auxiliary meetings. Due to the small membership of church and Sunday School, most causes were presented through the Sunday School, using the literature sent for each cause.

The Auxiliary completed the study of Home and Foreign Mission Books, and collections were taken for both. A Birthday Party was held; a Joy Gift was taken from each member before Christmas.

The Presbyterian Young People met at the church March 24, 1938, to organize a Presbyterian League. The League is still functioning in combination with the young people's organization of the Methodist Church, meeting on alternate Sunday evenings in the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches. Many of our young people who would participate actively in the work are in out-of-town schools and colleges.

Those who carry on the work say it was very difficult to maintain the interest of the members before the Methodist and Presbyterian forces were combined. Since then there is renewed interest in the work.

1939-1940

The Eastman Presbyterian Church secured Mr. Howell Anderson, a student from Columbia Seminary, for the summer months. While here, with the aid of Mr. Dick Horne, a series of services were held, which proved very helpful. As a result of this meeting, eleven members were received into the church; some on profession of faith and the others by letter.

We have lost four members on account of moving away. Miss Persons, Mrs. Clarence Rawlins and Miss Francis Rawlins received their letters to unite with the Thomaston Presbyterian Church, and Mrs. H.M.O'Callaghan received her letter to unite with the church in Milledgeville.

The Sunday School has a membership of 48 and functions with a good attendance. The Banner was received again this year for the largest per capita offering on Rally Day for S. S. Extension. The Sunday School sent four representatives to the young people's conference at Houston Lake.

The Woman's Auxiliary was very active, following the plans laid out in the Year Book as nearly as possible. The Eastman Presbyterian Church has been without a pastor since
September. During the summer months we had Rev. James Gailey, a graduate
of Columbia Seminary and a student of Princeton University. He was well
liked by everyone and his work with the young people of the town was very
outstanding. Our church cooperated with the Methodist Church in conducting a two-week's Daily Vacation Bible School, which was held in the
Methodist Church. Mr. Gailey and two of the Auxiliary members assisted
in this school. Mr. Gailey went to the Young People's Camp at Pine Mt.
as an instructor, and Miss Catherine Harrington of our church was diet-

ician. Norma Jean Jiles went from the Intermediate Department.

The Woman's Auxiliary has 12 members. We used the Year Book and the Circle and Auxiliary Literature and contributed to all causes of the church. We have had many of our programs given at Sunday School, especially the Home and Foreign Mission and Christian Education and Ministeria Relief. As we are without a pastor, it is the only way we have of getting these causes before the men and young people of the church. The Auxiliary sent Testaments to each of the boys from our church who are in the armed

forces of our country.

We had a review of the book, "While It Is Day", at the close of Week of Prayer and Self Denial, at which time an offering was taken. The Foreign Mission Week was observed with Mrs. L. M. Woodward, Jr., giving a review of the books on South America. An offering for the Emergence Fund was taken.

The Auxiliary sent one of the colored teachers to the Conference for Colored Women which was held at Gammon Institute. She gave a most enthusiastic report of the conference to the Auxiliary, and began immediately to put into practice the things that she learned at the conference. She put on a very successful D.V.B.S. for her people.

Our White Cross assessment was met and the gauze sponges and bandages

were sent to the Presbyterial Chairman of White Cross.

During this year our church was saddened by the loss of one of our most beloved members. In the death of Elder E. M. Harrington, Sr., which occurred August 15, 1942, the Eastman Presbyterian Church suffered an irreparable loss. He was not only an Elder worthy of his calling, but was alman of immeasurable influence for good among all people, a good business man, a good husband and father. His guidance and leadership in our church is sorely missed, but heaven is made richer by his passing from us.

To honor his memory, his family have placed in the church new Mymnals bearing his name, a tribute indeed fitting; for he loved the church and was ever ready to lend a helping hand to any movement that was was its advancement.

We humbly bow to God's will, and only pray that we may be led in paths that he has followed.

A Service Flag hangs on the wall of our church bearing 16 stars in honor of our 15 boys in various branches of services and 1 girl who is a member of the WAACS.

The Adxiliary has a membership of 16, and all phases of the work as outlined by the Committee on Woman's Work, has been carried out as well as is possible with so small a group.

The Eastman Church and Auxiliary entertained the 1943 meeting of the Macon Presbyterial, which was a most inspiring and informative occasion. A conference was held for the colored women, and very helpful and interesting talks were made by several of the members and visitors of the Presbyterial.

Our most outstanding work was the organization, in July, of a Sunday School for the colered people in Plainfield by Mrs. E. M. Harrington, with a membership of 40, which has grown to 60 and shows promice of further growth and development. Mrs. Harrington has supervised all of their activities.

A box of clothing has been given to a needy family, and the Auxiliary and Sunday School co-operated with the other churches of the town in the distribution of Christmas baskets for the poor and needy.

Our church suffered an irreparable loss and the entire community a true and honored friend, in the death of Dr.J. C. Wall, who passed away in May of 1943. Dr.Wall was, at the time of his death, Senior Elder in our church, having been elevated to that honored post several months prior to his death. He was very liberal with his gifts to all branches of our church, and especially to our Thornwell Orphanage.

As a physician he was most liberal to the unfortunate, and was known for his charity among this class. He played an important roll in all movements for the betterment of the church and community; a civic leader and active in administrative affairs to the town and county. Truly a good man, a good citizen has passed from us; a man who is missed by both the masses and classes; a man who held alphace in the church and community rare to the average man.
