## MANCHESTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Manchester, Georgia 1913-1934

The Presbyterian Church of Manchester, Georgia, was organized on Novemember 30,1913 at the Baptist Church building by a Commission of the Presbytery of Atlanta composed of Rev. J.G. Herndon of LaGrange, Rev. J.E. Hannah of Newnan, Rev. Frank D. Hunt of Decatur and Elder W.E. Newell of Inman Park Church, Atlanta. The following persons received by letter from several different Church and the charter members of this Church wis:

After the organization, the name chosen by the congregation was "The First Presbyterian Church of Manchester". Mr.D.P.Weldon and Mr.T.L.Parsons were duly elected Elders and Mr.C.E.Long, Mr.Omar L.Little and Mr.W. J.Weldon were elected to serve as Deacons, all of whom were duly ordained and installed by the Commission except Mr.T.L.Parsons who was absent.

The Baptist and Methodist congregations kindly offered the use of their buildings for the Presbyterian services until such time as they could provide a building of their own. A vote of thanks and appreciation was tendered these Churches for their kindness. It was decided to have preaching on the first Sabbath in each month for the present. A vote of thanks was also tendered Mrs C.B. Wilburn, by whose interests and efforts, this organization had largely been effected and who would have been one of the charter members but for the fact that she was changing her residence to another town. Frank D. Hunt, Evangelist of the Atlanta Presbytery and Clerk of the Commission.

April 5,1914- Mr. George H. Gwin was elected to the office of Ruling Elder and was regularly ordained and installed.

April 5,1914- The Statistical report to the Presbytery is as follows:

May 30,1915- A congregational meeting was ordered to be held at the home of Mrs.J.C. Dennis to discuss the erection of a building to the interest of the Church work.

March 31,1915-Statistical report: Elders, 2; Deacons, 3; Communicants, 24 Sep.12,1915- The Sunday School was formally organized at the M.E.Church. Mr.W.J.Weldon was elected Supt. and Mr.N.A.Weldon as Sec.

This Session formally approved of the S.S. and its officers. Feb. 20,1916- The Session met at the new building of the Church at 3:30 p. m. and was called to order by Elder Weldon, Moderator and o-o-pened with prayer. Present Elders D.P. Weldon and G.H. Gwin.

July 12,1916-At a meeting of the Session it was ordered that the S.S. be re-organized or resumed with Mr.Wm.Weldon as Superintendent and Mr.V.L.Leohr as Assistant Superintendent.

July 12,1916- Session met at the Church at the close of the 11 o'clock se service, Rev. J.G. Herndon, Moderator. Mr.G. H. Gwin reported his attendance upon the meeting of Presbytery at Lithonia and

that arrangements were made for a protracted meeting to be held in the Church with Rev. Herndon as leader.

Aug.13,1916 - Session met after the close of public worship at 12:30 m.

Present Elders D.P. Weldon and G.H. Gwin. Licentiate J.G. Patton,

Jr. was invited to sit with the Session.

Sep.5,1916- A meeting of the congregatio was called for Sunday, Sep.10 to discuss and plan for pastoral supply for the balance of the year since Mr.J.G.Patton had finished his summer term of service for the Church.

Jan. 21,1917-Session met at the close of the Sunday School. Present Rev. John Goff, Presbytery's Evangelist.

July 29,1917-Session met et the close of the Church service at which Rev. W.G.Harry was ordained to the Gospel Ministry and installed as Pastor of this Church by the following Commission from Presbytery:Rev.J.G.Herndon,LaGrange,Chairman,Rev.J.E.Hannah of Newnan,Rev.Doughtery of College Park,Elders Caldwell of Greenville and Newell of East Point.

March 24,1918- Session met. Present, Rev. W.G. Harry and Elders Gwin and Weldon. Mr. V.L. Loehr was made an Elder.

May 1,1918 Session met with Rev.W.G.Harry, Elders Gwin and Loehr present. It was reported the Presbytery had accepted the resignation of Rev.Harry of this Church and Group, and had dissolved the pastoral relationship and had granted Mr.Harry a letter of dismission to the Presbytery of New Orleans. The Session expressed regretated Mr.Harry is departure and he being willing to remain, it was decided to send a message to the Presbytery of New Orleans asking them to release Mr.Harry from that call.

Feb.16,1919-Session met with Rev.S.B.McGheeslin, Moderator and present Elders G.H.Gwin and D.P.Weldon; DeaconsC.E.Long, & W.J.Weldon. G.H.Gwin was appointed Treasurer fort the Church.

Mar.31,1919-Session met with Rev.S.B.Gheeselin and Elder G.H.Gwin present. The books were audited for the Church Treasury and the report filled to Presbytery: Resident members 26; non- resresident 6 making a total of 32. Members by letter 1; infant baptism 1; Elders 3 and Deacons 2. Finances received and paid out by the Church, \$191.87; paid to Presbyterial tax \$5 to sexton \$1 and to Pastor \$155 making total of \$161 paid out and leaving a balance of \$30.87. G.H.Gwin, Clerk.

Oct.5,1919- Session met with Rev.R.E.Telford, Moderator. Rev.Telford was from Cornelaia, Ga., Athens Presbytery. A congregational meeting was called for the purpose of calling a Pastor.

March 21,1920-Session met at the Church with Rev.E.B. Thompson, Moderator and Elders Gwin and Weldon present. The Ladies Aid Society of the Church was discussed and its organization approved.

March 31,1920- Statistical report: Resident members, 26; non-resident 2; members by certificate 1; Elders 3 and Deacons 2.

Sep.29,1920-N.A.Weldon was made Superintendent of the Sunday School. Apr.11,1921-Rev E.B.Thompson announced to the Session in meeting his resignation to take place the 30th of June.1921.

Apr.16,1921-Brother George H.Gwin read a letter of resignation as acting Elder and Treasurer of the Church.

May 28,1922-W.A. Weldon resigned as Church Treasurer and Mr. W.R. Parsons was elected to that office.

Mar. 28,1920-The Sunday School books were audited at the request of the Treasurer. These were approved with some exceptions.

Mar.11,1923-Session met with Rev.R.E.Telford, Moderator and Elder Weldon.
The Church and Sunday School badly disorganized bacause of

Rail Road strike and members moving away.

Sep.30,1923- Congregational meeting with Rev. Telford, Moderator. Mr.W.R..

Parsons was elected Ruling Elder and also made Clerk of the Session.

Mar.31,1926-Elders 2; Deacons 1; added on profession of faith 1; by certificate 3; resident communicants 23; non-residen communicants, none; making a total membership of 23. Total SUnday School enrollment of 30.

Mar. 31,1927-Elders 2; Deacons, 2; added on profession, 2; on certificate, 2; Total number of communicants 28.

Mar. 4,1928- Session met and opened with prayer. Present Rev.R.E. Telford W.R.Parsons and D.P. Weldon. They decided to call a congregational meeting for the purpose of authorizing the Trustees of the Church to act according to their best judgement in selling the present building and purchasing the Methodist Church building, the meeting to be held at the beginning of the evening service.

Mar.17,1928-Session met with Rev.R.E.Telford and W.R.Parsons present.It was decided to call a congregational meeting March 24th for the purpose of calling a Pastor if the way be clear.

March, 1929-Report for the year: Elders 1; Deacons,1; added on confession 2; by certificate,4; baptized adults,1; total communicants,30; total Sunday School enrollment,30. Mr.Hal Kellar came as Pastor in April or May,1929 and resigned in March,1930.

Oct., 1930-Rev.W.G.Harry was called to the pastorate and was installed in October, 1930 and still serves the Church (1934).

Feb. 7, 1932-Mr. W.R. Parsons is still Ruling Elder and Clerk of the Session (1934). On this above date Mr. T. P. Barclay was elected Elder and Messrs. R. E. Pouneley, O. E. Montfort, and Dr. J. A. Knight were elected Deacons, all off whom were ordained and installed on this date.

### AN INTERESTING BIT OF HISTORY

The first ordination of a Presbyterian Minister on Georgia soil took place under the old poplar tree near Washington, Ga., on July 21,1790 and the name of this minister was John Springer.

### Manchester Presbuterian Church

Manchester, Georgia 1993-1921

(Copied from a History loaned by courtesy of Rev.W.E.Dazier)
In the year 1907, where the town of Manchester now is, there a broad expanse of old field and gully. There was only a house or two to be seen anywhere; the town was only conceived. In the year 1908, the town had begun to grow and in 1913 Manchester was recognized as the fastest growing town in Georgia, there being a population of fifteen hundred or more people with buildings and business in proportion.

At the very beginning there was a very rough element in practical control of the town and it took the better element, principally church folk,

to gain control and run the rough crowd to cover.

It was in the fall of 1913, that the agitation of the subject of organganizing a Presbyterian Church was begun by Mrs.C.B.Wilburn. Alredy there
was a flourishing M.E.Church, South, there and a Missionary Baptist, each
having a nice building. Also a Christian congregation with a temporary
building as a house of worship. The Catholic Priests came accasionally to
look after the spiritual interests of such Catholics as were in the place
and the Episcopal Ministers came regularly to preach for their members.
Mrs.Wilburn's investigations developed the fact that there were quite

Mrs. Willburn's investigations developed the fact that there were quite a number of Presbyterians in the vicinity, some of whom were affiliating with other denominations. After some effort, Mrs. Wilburn interested others in the town and, also, the Presbytery of Atlanta in the enterprise, so that on November 30,1913, the First Presbyterian Church of Manchester was organized at the Baptist Church with twenty-one members.

The following Ministers composed the Commission that organized the Church in the name of the Presbytery: Rev. J.G. Herndon, LaGrange, Ga., Rev. J.E. Hanna, Newnan, Ga., and Rev. Frank D. Hunt, Evangelist for the Presbytery

of Atlanta.

Upon the organization of the Church, the Baptist and Methodist congregations came forward and volunteered the use of their housesfor the Presbyterians until such time as they could make arrangements for their own building. This hospitality was gratefully accepted and made use of; using alternately the Baptist and Methodist Church buildings for holding services until a short time before their building was completed.

Unfortunately, Mrs. Wilburn was denied to the Church as a charter member, as she meved away before it was organized. Through the grace of God, preaching services have been held once a month since organization, with the exception of a few months. While using the other Church buildings, the Presbyterianspaid all the incidental expenses attached to such use and have always been able to pay each preacher ample compensation for his time. However, they have been compelled to have first one preacher and then another as they are not in position to have a regular Pastor.

It was well into the year 1914 before any definite steps were taken toward a Church building. After a lot of discussion, the Elders of the Church were appointed to co-operate with Rev Frank D. Hunt in an effort to select a lot and secure the donation of the same by the Manchester Development Company, it being understood that this Company had donated lots to the other denominations. After long consideration, the lot where the Church was subsequently built was selected by the Committee and their selection concurred in by the congregation. Rev. F.D. Hunt and the Committee met in LaGrange at the office of the Development Company and with the assistance of Rev. J.G. Herndon made their request which was granted and the deed to the lot on the corner of Second Ave. and Fifth St. was mailed to the Church officers, dated November 24,1914. Prior to this the trustees were elected for the Church, said Trustees being the Elders of the Church and their successors forever and the deed to the Church through these Elders or Trustees. The lot faces 50 feet on Fifth

Street and 100 feet on Second Avenue. A provision of the deed is that there must be a Church building on the lot within eighteen months from the date of the deed or the building must be started, and completed within 30 months from the date of the deed. Also the lot can never be sold except for the purpose of buying another lot for the same purpose within the same town. Any violation or failure to comply with these conditions forfeits the lot which reverts to the Company. The first money toward a building was deposited at the Bank of Manchester by the Ladies' Society in the spring of 1915. This fund of \$14.00 was the beginning of the "building fund" for the erection of a Church on the lot and remained practically the same until May 1915, when a baby show was given by the ladies of the Church, with the aid of the ladies of other denominations who fist formulated the plan and gave it to the Presbyterians; the net results of this baby show was nearly \$200.00 which added materially to te building fund.

This increase of the building fund aroused the enthusiasm of the members and created a strong desire for a house of worship in the town. Realizing that it would take more definitely organized work to bring about results of any importance, there was a congregational meeting called to discuss the matter and plan a campaign to raise funds. After two attempts to get the members together and only succeeding in getting a few out, these few went ahead, after thoroughly debating the matter, and decided that it would be best to concentrate the management of the building campaign into the hands of as few as possible. These few were to study ways of raising money and were to have management of all general efforts toward this end; were to have full authority to do so in the name of the Church and to use the amounts as they saw fit for the purpose of building a house on the lot; were to have full authority as to the details of time, plans, costs etc., provided they contracted no debt to placed upon the Church, using only such funds as were on hand. The Moderator of this meeting was instructed by dinanimous vote to appoint a Committee to be known as the "Building Committee" of the Presbyterian Church, this Committee to be composed of three men and two women. The appointing of this Committe did not in any way relieve the other members of responsibility, but every member was expected to assist to the extent of his or her ability. The Moderator insisted that no member accept a place on this Committee without thoroughly praying over the matter and having a full determination to do all in their power to accomplish the ends for which they were appointed. Those appointed were: Deacons, C.E.Long and W.J. Weldon, Elder, G.H. Gwin, Mrs. Hugh Orr and Mrs. Mary Dennie. All that were appointed accepted, but the Committee did not meet to organize by electing officers until about the first of August, when C.E.long was elected Chairman and later later Mrs. Hugh Orr was elected Secretary and Treasurer, the latter office was abolished later as superfluous; all funds at the Bank were subject to withdrawal only upon vouchers signed by a sub-committee of two. Special rules were adopted for the guidance of the Committee and a regular meeting time fixed at two meetings per month and oftener if occasion demanded, the meeting to be called by the Chairman.

Meetings were opened with prayer and the Committee devised many plans of raising money with more or less success for a time; interest seemed to flag, meetings held less often, work was carried on in an unorganized way, consequently with less success. In the meantime it was found necessary to drop the preaching services for a time for lack of financial support and because the Methodists and Baptists were using their houses of worship every Sunday. The need of a house for worship became so imperative that the Committee decided to start at once on the building with what funds were on hand, depending on the desperate needs of the situation to the lagging interest of the members to raise what was still needed. About the first of December, 1915 a sub-committee was appointed to contract for such portion of the building as there was money enough to pay for, with a view to getting the building nearly enough finished to be used for services. OOSO yires for the big to establish the sulfding this establish the establish of the careful side building material so advanced in price it was difficult to get contractors to take a job under such conditions and it was not until January 8,1916 that the contract was finally let to Messys. Underwood and Land for the erection of a building. The building was 30 feet wide and 40 feet long; to be of good heart pine where exposed to the weather and of cheaper material on the inside. These specifications had to be reduced from a high grade to a low grade material in order to make the price meet the funds on hand; for this same reason it was necessary to leave off the tower and to leave the building unceiled and unplastered. The contractors, having finished their part of the contract, turned the building over to the Committee about the middle of February. It was necessary to borrow \$175:00dellars to pay the contractors in full, two members giving personal notes for the same, to be paid later. This enabled the Committee to buy twenty benches from the Methodist Church; the Baptists loaned four benches that they were not using, which gave a seating capacity of about 200. There were many other items of cost to be taken care of, such as heater, pulpit stand, table, seats for the rostrum, song books etc. The Committe installed the heater and the Ladies' Society took care of the other items. which were all paid for as they were installed. The ladies also rented a piano for the Church.

After having no services for several months, Mr. and Mrs. Linton Johnson of Rock Springs Church were secured to hold a revival in the Baptist Church in August, 1915. Mr. Johnson preached and Mrs. Johnson led the singing and there was af fine series of services; there were only two additions, but a real revival among the members.

SABBATH SCHOOL

Realizing the great need of a Sabbath School for the training of the children and also as a means of getting the members together for religious services and worship, on the Sundays when there was no preaching. The members met at the Methodist Church on Sep. 12,1915 and organized a Sabbath School With Deacon, W.A. Welborn as Superintendent and Mr. N.A. Weldon as Secretary. The Methodists very kindly let us have their building on Sunday afternoons for holding the School, which was used until the Church was erected by the Presbyterians. The first session of the S.S. held in the new Church was before the seats were bought and they were seated on planks laid across dry goods boxes. The seats were installed before there were any preaching services in the following March. The Sabbaty School has been well attended by the children, the older ones not coming as well as might be hoped, but the work has been handicapped for lack of teachers. Notwithstanding, the School has progressed, despite the fact that many uninterested have fallen away; it has narrowed down to those who are realy interested in the word and is doing better work than ever before and the outlook is for more telling work.

FINANCIAL The Church through its Committee, Ladies' Aid Society and individual members has raised and paid out on the Church building \$845.00. Everything on the lot or inside the building is paid for except the piano. They only lack \$52 of having sufficient in the Bank to take up the #175 in notes with the interest(this was included in the \$845). \$100 was donated to the building from the Telfair fund in Savannah, which willbe paid to the Church later. It will take approximately \$400 to finish up the b building completely. While the building campaign was under way, services were kept up in the Church and Sabbath School, except where noted previously and the Church has been kept free from debt. Every minister who has preached has been compensated and all incidental expenses of the Church have been paid; something like \$200 to both. It addition to this the Church and some of the individual members have contributed to the Home Mission Committee, Thornwell Orphanage, the Building League of Atlanta Presbytery and have kept the Presbyterial tax paid promptly.

Only one meetingof the Presbytery(Stated Meeting) has closed without a representative from this Church having been present at least part of h the time; we have had a representative at one meeting of the State Synod.

Arrangements are being made to hold a revival service in the new Church sometime during the summer of 1916 and also to hold a series of services

at the Union Church in the Will District.

The Atlanta Presbytery has helped and encouraged the Church at all times and is helping to have a regular Pastor during the summer months. They have grouped us with Concord and Stone Mountain and Rev. J.G. Patton of Decatur is supplying the group once a month and such other pastoral srvices as each Church may desire.

The membership is 26, but two of the members have moved away leaving only 24 resident members. Of this number, four are children and fourteen

Approximate amount paid from the Church Treasury during the two and one-half years, for Pastor's salary, Presbyterial assessments, incidental expenses atc., exclusive of personal expenses incurred by individuals for the Church is \$500.00. All this has been done by a small and financially poor congregation, none of whom are well off in this world's goods and some are badly handicapped in rendering either financial or other assistance. This is a remarkable record considering the obstacles to be overcome and which goes to show that the Lord is with His people, that He is blessing their efforts and that He intends for them to go on with the work.

This history and summary of what has been done by a loyal few is written, so that others reading it may be encouraged to renewed efforts in the Lord's Work and that those who have kept themselves aloof from the work may become interested. Also as record to be kept by any who so desire. This work is a monument to the Lord and we pray that He will continue to

smile upon us for it. Amen.

### FURTHER HISTORY OF MANCHESTER CHURCH

This is written in the fall of 1921 as a supplement to the brief History of the First Presbyterian Church of Manchester, Georgia, which was written by one of the Elders of the said Church during the latter part of the year 1916 and given the title of "Our Church" and distributed among the members of the Church for the possible good that it might do in stimulating interest in the Church and its work and it is the purpose to try to briefly summerize the intervening history.

The first Pastor of the Church was the Rev.W.G.Harry, who was fresh from Columbia Seminary and who was ordained and installed by a commission from the Atlanta Presbytery in the Church at Manchester, both at the same time. The commission appointed for this purpose were the same men who acted as a commission to organize the Church. The installation of the first

Pastor was in June, 1917.

The Rev. Harry also supplied the Turin-Senoia and Greenville Stacy Thurches, making this city his headquarters and preaching here two Sundays each month. During the first eight months of Rev. Harry's pastorage, the Church revived wonderfullyand for the first time since its organization began to contribute regularly and systematically to all of the benevolent causes of the Church, paying the Church's full apportionment the first year. Due to Mr. Harry being a young man and devoting a large part of his time to further study to the neglect of more organization work and mixing with people, the interest of the people began to flag about this time, also the war coming on with all the consequent excitement, the Church interest was sadly neglected. Mr. Harry, not having the experience necessary to know how to handle the situation or being unable to do so, grew discouraged and began to cast about for another lacation. This resulted in his resignation which was reluctantly accepted by this and the other Churches. of the group and by the Presbytery at its spring meeting in 1918. This left the Church without a Pastor for several months. During Mr. Harry's pastor ate ,Mr.V.L.Leohr was elected and ordained as an Elder and several members added, but some were dismissed on account of moving, so that the number of members remained about the same . About the first of January, 1918, Rev. S.B. M. Ghiselin was sent here by the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee as a Supply for the group. Mr Ghiselin had been in Y.M.C.A. work in the army and had very little experience in pastoral work, so proved utterly incompetent for the work here. Great friction arose among the membership and the Church was split into two factions, with a neutral faction trying to restore peace and harmony. After several months it was decided best for Mr. Ghiselin to leave and the Church was again without a Pastor. During all the periods that the Church was without a Pastor, regular serces were held once or twice each month, with visiting preachers and college students supplying the pulpit.

During the entire year of 1919 the Church was vacant and services were held only spasmodically. Rev. E. B. Thompson, a Seminary graduate, was called, he having just returned from active service as a Sergeant in the U.S.A. Army in France. He was installed by a commission from the Atlanta Presbytery, composed of Rev. J. E. Hannah, Rev. J. E. Hemphill, Rev. Caldwell and Elder Gwin. Mr. Thompson's pastorate proved even more inefficient than that of any of the former Pastors. The grouping had been changed with the coming of Rev. Ghiselin. With the assistance of Synod's Committee, Manchester was grouped with Geneva and Woodland Churches in the Macon Presbytery. This wa was a much more workable group. Almost with his coming, Mr. Thompson had a split with the Geneva Church, which resulted in Geneva being dropped from the group and Greenville-Stacy Church being substituted. Rev Thompson served the Church from January, 1920-July 1,1921. During this period the only additions to the membership were those secured by visiting ministers during revival services ; the dismissals by removal left the membership about the same at its termination. Without attempting to criticize Mr Thompson or to place any blame, we will say, that to all appearances the entire period of his pastorate was unfruitful for the Church; in addition to not growing in membership, the Progressive Program Campaigm fail. ed almost completely in the spring of 1921 and all iterest in the Church by the entire membership appeared to be dead, more so than at any previous Mr. Thompson tendered his resignation April 1 to take effect July 1 and the same was concurred in by the Church and by the Presbytery at the spring meeting.

Mr. Beck, a college student from Davidson College, supplied during the following two months quite acceptably. During this time Rev. Mc.D.Lacy, conducted a series of services , which resulted in five additions on confession of faith and two by letter. The Church has been supplied by visiting preachers and theological students since Mr. Beck left and practitically every preacher in the Presbytery has preached in the Church since its organization. The records are not available so no statistical reports canbe given, but the Church is meeting its obligations and is alive to eve

ery call. This is a fine field for labor and development.

History--1955

The new year 1955 began leaving us still without a minister at the First Presbyterian Church here in Manchester, Ga. But in spite of the fact of being without a minister, the work of the church went on and we seemed to make progress. With the help of Dr. Talmadge we had someone to speak to us each Sunday Morning.

Some work was done on the church, a new paint job on the inside and the choir moved out front, and we organized a choir under the direction of a very capable leader, Mrs. Randell Storms. The women's work made progress under the leadership of our President, Mrs. Ernest Hanger. A prayer group was organized by one of our oldest members Miss Vivian Perkerson. The group met each Sunday morning between Sunday School and the Worship Service.

The Birthday of the W.O.T.C came in May with a big birthday cake baked by one of our members. We had a very interesting program on the birthday celebration. The offering was taken and \$35.00 was collected.

The pulpit committee were still working hard to secure a minister for our church. We had several boys from the Seminary, of which some were available, but we felt somehow they were not the ones to lead our group. Among the group of boys was one we feltwwowld meet our needs, Mr. Sidney Maxwell, but we knew that it would be impossible to get him, for his desires were to go to the Mission Fields.

Six months had gone by and we are still working to find a man who will supply our needs. After school was out we had a Mr. Anderson a devout christain and layman to come down to serve us during the summer months. He did a wonderful job.

Sometime in July one of the Elders recieved a letter from Mr.Maxwell stating he would come to the Manchester church if we still wanted him. We felt our prayers had been answered. A congregational meeting was called and it was voted unanimous to elect him. He was given premission to attend the Conference at Montreat, North Carolina and in thay way Mr. Anderson could finish out the summer work, which he had begun. Vacation Bible School was coming up and Mr. Anderson had spent lot of time working out plans. It was a very good success.

August marked an important month of the year. That was when our new pastor was tking over his work of the church. It had been one year since Mr. Hotchkiss had gone to a bigger field in Savannah, Ga. On August 14,1955 Mr. Maxwell preached his first sermon. We felt with this man of God as our leader we could go forward, and with a leadership such as his if we failed we might as well give up.

September was a busy month, the begining of school and the month for the Tri-County Fair, which meant the church could have a display if they wished. Some of the women of the church decided to get to-gether and have a display, and the money recieved would be applied to chairs for our choir. With the help of our new minister we worked out a display using as our theme: "THE WORD OF GOD IN MANY LANGUAGES". For this we won a blue ribbon and \$25.00. It was a very interesting display and won honorable mention of TV News and a write up in the

Columbus paper. The Elders and Deacons got to-gether and decided to get new pulpit furniture and pews. It seemed our church had a new interest and everyone wanted to do something. On September 27 Mr. Maxwell accompained by two of the Elders went before Presbytery This much was over and he was working hard to finish his work so he can be ordained. We are all looking forward to this important event which will be in the near future.

In the October General Meeting of the W.O.T.C the secretary gave each member a dollar that would accept it to see how much it could be increased. Some of the members felt they could do more selling Christmas cards. For several years we have sold Christmas cards which have helped in getting lot of the things we needed. Some of the women put their dollars to-gether and gave a Turkey Dinner to help raise money to carpet our church. From the Turkey dinner we cleared \$160.00 and some of the dollars working in different ways we have in the bank \$200.00. We feel the fellowship and the joy we received of working to-gether, that we accomplished more than just raising money.

The coming of November we had something to look forward too. We were intertaining the Senoir High Fellowship Ralley of District #3. This was something our church had not before had the pleasure to do. Mrs. Jack Buce was elected Adult Advisior for District #3 and Mary Janes, a Senior in our church was elected district officer. About 130 attended from about 15 churches. This month also brought about an election of some new officers in the church, two Elders and four Deacons.

December is a month we all look forward too. Aside from the Children looking for Santa, we have the Joy Gift Offering and the Christmas Party. Also the installation of the officers for the coming year and reports from all the different committees. We feel this year each committee will have a good report to give. As we enter the New Year we do not forget to ask God to bless us and guide us in every undertaking and may we have a wonderful year to-gether.

Then we have a Christmas program at our Church. This is enjoyed by the children as well as the older members. New officers are elected for the next year. The we have some new members this year and feel that we are growing in Christian work as well as numbers. We know God has blessed us and with His help and our prayer of faith, hope, and charity, we will try for even a better year in 1959. We close this year saying, Thank you God for our blessings.

ife of the honoree

Enclosed is a brief sketch of the life of the honoree Mrs. Judith Baugherty.

Mrs. Judith Daugherty, affectionately known as "Miss Judy"or Grandma Judy", was born, reared, and educated in LaRue County, Kentucky, the daughter of The Reverend and Mrs. C. Morgan Daugherty.

Early in childhood, Miss Judy learned to love her church and this devotion has remained throughout her life. As a young married woman, with three small children, she still had time to teach a Sunday School Class, sing in the choir, attend three church services on Sunday, and the midweek Prayer Meeting. She was a member of all church organizations, holding various offices, and a member of the Rebecca Lodge, Sister, Lodge of the Oddfellows.

Following the death of her husband, Thomas L. Chaudoin, Miss Judy joined the staff of Gulf Park College, Gulfport, Mississippi, as Chief Dietitian. She served as President of the local Rose Garden Club and now holds the office of Chaplain in that organization.
