



HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF MILLEDGEVILLE GEORGIA by L. H. Andrews AT ITS 100TH ANNIVERSARY, JUNE 11TH, 1926 PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MILLEDGEVILLE GEORGIA ORGANIZED JUNE 11th, 1826 HOPEWELL PRESBYTERY Before the organization of the Presbyterian Church in Milledgeville, Georgia on June 11th, 1826, a small band of women assembled weekly in prayer, looking forward to the establishment of a church of their belief and faith. We cannot find any record of the names of this prayer band, but from information which has been handed down from generation to generation, we believe that we can accurately state that six members were Mrs. Richard J. Nichols, Mrs. Peter Jones Williams, Mrs. Louis Harris, Mrs. William S. Rockwell, Mrs. Charles J. Payne, and Mrs. Alfred Nisbet. In 1828, the church was incorporated, and many names that we are unable to secure signed a petition as charter members. The presbyterian Church in Milledg ville was organized June 11th, 1826 by Rev. Dr. Brown, Messrs. Gildersleeve, Foote, and Stiles as Commissioners, and Rev. Jos. C. Stiles as pastor in charge of Organization. Twenty members were added to the church at its organization and in the year 1826. The trustees appointed were Orrin Shaw, Joseph Washburn, and Hugh Craft. August 1, 1826 the trustees made application to the commissioners of the town of Milledgeville for the lot on which to build a church. (STATE OF GEORGIA) (Local Acts) of 1807 Vol. 4-page 391-Each Denomination allowed one acre of the State House Square for a Church Building. Town of Milledgeville, Georgia Commissioners Hall, August 1826 at 4:00 p.m. The Board of Commissioners met at the call of the Intendant, Present: William Y. Hansell, Intendant, Charles J. Paine, Commissioner, Samuel Boykin, Commissioner, Thomas W. Baxter, Commissioner, R. B. Washington, Secy. (The trustees of the Presbyterian Church VIZ: Orrin Shaw, Joseph Washburn, and Hugh Graft, having applied to the corporation in conformity to the law, for its assent to designate a lot of ground on the State House Square; be it therefore resolved that Thomas Baxter be, and is hereby appointed to see the same carried into effect. Rev. Jos. C. Stiles preached from June 11, 1826, the date of organization, to 1827. Rev. James C. Patterson preached part of 1827 and 1828. In 1828, the Presbyterian Church was incorporated, the incorporators were: James Camak, William Y. Hansell, Thomas W. Baxter, Hugh Craft, Richard J. Nichols, Richard K. Hines, Samuel Boykin, Peter J. Williams and Seaton Grantland. Rev. Lawson Clinton preached in 1829, Rev. Willet Preston preached in 1830 to 1832. Twenty-one new members were added from 1827 to 1831.

Rev. Benjamin Borroughs became pastor in 1832 to 1834. Rev. C. W. Howard was elected and installed in 1834 and after serving two years, resigned. Rev. John W. Baker served the church from 1836 to 1854. No report is given of the gr wth of the church from 1831 to 1848.

From the Southern Recorder, Tuesday March 28, 1837:

"The pews in the Presbyterian Church (on the west side) will be rented on Wednesday next at the hour of eleven o'clock. Persons not provided with seats will please attend either in person or by proxy.

By order of the Trustees, B. P. Stubbs, Secretary"

Total communicants given April 1828 were 109.

Rev. W. Flinn served the church from 1854 to 1869, and resigned. He served the church during the war between the States, as well as serving his country at the front, following the flag of his conviction.

In a report to Presbytery in 1862, total communicants were 129. In 1867 the Milledgeville Church was placed in the Augusta Presbytery.

In 1867, those paying pew rents for the support of the pastor were:

N. M. Cromwell, George Haugh.

On January 1, 1868 Rev. William Flinn from pew rent \$1179.25. On May 7, 1868 the Rev. Charles W. Lane from pew rents \$965.00. He resigned. After the War, the roll of membership being revised was reported to Presbytery as 67.

On June 6, 1870, a congregational meeting was called to elect seven trustees for a school to be located on the property known as Oglethorpe College. The following were elected to-wit: Wm. McKinley, Geo. D. Case, L. Carrington, W. H. Hall, John A. Orme, R. H. Ramsey, and Samuel G. White. The Board of Trustees elected Col. William McKinley as President and L. Carrington as secretary. The Trustees of the Church in 1870 were Dr. S. G. White, Dr. W. H. Hall, Col. William McKinley, R. H. Ramsey, T. T. Windsor, F. Skinner and Geo. D. Case.

On June 6, 1870 the trustees of the Church held a meeting to consider remodelling the church building. Present: Dr. S. G. White, Chairman, Dr. Geo.. D. Case, and Mr. F. Skinner. The object of the meeting was wxplained by Col. Miller Grieve, Jr. that a fund having been raised by the ladies of the congregation for the improvement of the church, plans and specifications were submitted and presented to the trustees for their approval. The Board authorized Col. Miller Grieve to receive estimates as to the cost of materials and labor to make said improvements. On June 20, 1870 estimates, plans, specifications were presented to the trustees for the improvement of the church building, which were adopted by said Board, Col. William McKinley dissenting and presenting the following reasons: to-wit, I do not think the proposed alterations desirable, and that the present building as it stands is much more preferable, Second, that the proposed improvement could not be done satisfactorily for the amount of money named, and that the present building would be left in an unfinished c ndition,

and that the congregation would be disrupted and inconvenienced for an indefinite period. Third, that the proposed short tower would be ridiculous and disfigure the church.

On December 18, 1872 at a congregational meeting, a resolution was offered changing the present system of renting the pews, adopting the envelope system and all the pews be free. A committee was appointed c nsisting of T. T. Windsor, G. D. Case, and W. H. Hall to investigate and see if the new system was practical, and to make a report at a later date. On Dec. 22, 1872, the committee reported as follows: That after a thorough investigation and convas of the congregation they advised against making any change in the present plan of renting the pews. At a congregational meeting July 6, 1873, the financial statement of the church was presented to the congregation, showing a deficit received from pew rents to meet current expenses of the church. At a meeting of the trustees of the church March 5, 1875, a resolution of thanks was extended to the ladies of the church for the sum of \$29.40 which was the proceeds of a dinner and supper. This went towards the deficiencies of the pastor(s salary for 1873-1874.

On december 29, 1872 the Rev. Geo. T. Goetchius was called for the supply, and was called as regular pastor March 2, 1873. He resigned May 18, 1879. In 1879 the total membership was given to Presbytery as 76.

In 1877, those renting pews were:

Hendrix, Mrs. Humphries, Mrs. Talmadge. Amount paid Geo. T. Goetchious from pew rent \$462.40. Balance due on salary for 1877 \$537.60.

March 5, 1875 a resolution was passed by the congregation that 5% be paid the church treasurer from the receipts of the pew rents as his compensation for collection of said rents.

On August 24, 1879, Mr. T. T. Windsor made a report to the church, and recommended extending a call to the Rev. Donald McQueen of Madison, Ga. offering him \$900. Rev. McQueen accepted. He was installed on Nov. 1879 and resigned in 1892. The membership increased during the pastorate of Mr. McQueen from 72 to 164.

March 22 at a call meeting of the Trustees, Present: T. T. Windsor, Dr. W. H. Hall, I. L. Harris, Geo. T. Whilden, and L. J. Lamar at the home of Dr. W. H. Hall plans and specifications were presented to the trustees for the repairing and remodelling of the church edifice, and the following committee was appointed with full power to have the work d ne: Mr. Geo. T. Whilden, L. J. Lamar, and Mr. John Orme.

The original church was of colonial style of architecture, with four large white columns in front with steps all the way across. The front entrance two doors one door in the rear. There were four wondows on each side of the church, and the choir in the lofe in the rear. The building was of frame construction with shingle roof. The foundation was stone and brick. This church was remodelled in 1882 by raising and allowing a basement for Sunday School room. After the church was remodelled the entire style of architecture was changed.

OBJECTIONS TO HOLDING SUNDAY SCHOOL IN CHURCH CHAPEL March 1885 -- Trustees met at the call of the Chairman. Present: T. T. Windsor, Dr. I. L. Harris, J. W. McMillan and E. P. Lane. Objections being made to the Sunday School holding their sessions in the Church chapel, it was on motion ordered that the Sunday School hold their sessions in the church basement. After the resignation of Rev. Donald McQueen in 1892, Rev. T. A. Gibson of the Methodist Church filled the pulpit until Rev. D. W. Brannen came in as a supply in May 1892. Rev. Denton W. Brannen came to the church as a supply on May 15, 1892, and was installed as minister Oct. 12, 1892. He resigned Feb. 11, 1920. OUR CHURCH June 1893 Membership 181- Pastor Rev. D. W. Wilson, E. L. Carrington, G. C. Smith-The Sunday School-Geo. C. Smith. Superintendent, L. C. Hall, Vice Superintendent, A. R. Miller, Secretary. Oct. 3, 1982 at a meeting of the Session. A letter of dismissal was given to J ck Hill, colored, to aid in the organization of a Presbyterian church for the colored people. Rev. D. W. Brannen came to this church after graduating from Columbia Seminary and Princeton Theological Seminary. This was his first charge. For twenty years, he was "Among us as one who serves". Under his leadership

the church grew rapidly, the beautiful building in which we now worship is a memorial to him.

Mrs. J. W. Mobley made a deposit in one of the banks as a nucleus on a new church fund. She was one of the members who were deeply interested in securing a new church building. During the year, many subscriptions were received. Mr. and Mrs. Geo. C. Smith subscribed \$5000.00 towards the new church building. A building committee was appointed as follows: L. H. Andrews, J. A. Brooks, Geo. D. Case, Warren Edwards, H. M. Lamar, H. E. McCombs, J. L. Sibley and Geo. Smith. Plans and specifications were secured and the building placed in the hands of J. W. McMilland Sons. The corner stone was donated by J. W. McMillan, and come from Haddington-Shire, Sctland. It was laid on Oct. 20, 1905 by the Grand Lodge of Georgia, F. A. M. Dr. T. M. Hall, Acting G. M. (A. NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH DEDICATED Sunday Oct. 20, 1906

Services marked with appropriate exercises, an eloquent sermon preached by Rev. Richard Orme Flinn of Atlanta.

The services were of the usual order observed by the Presbyterian congregation. After the rendering of a beautiful and appropriate song by the choir

Dr. Flinn read the 17th Chapter of St. John. Rev. Lamar Simms then invoked God's blessing upon the services. Rev. D. W. Brannen, pastor of the church then announced that by the kindness of God and the zeal of the people, the new church building had been completed, and that it would be dedicated to the service of God. He stated that the Rev. Richard Orme Flinn would preach the sermon. Rev. Flinn took for his text portions of the 17th chapter of St. John and preached an eloquent and earnest sermon which made a deep impression upon the minds and hearts of his hearers.

Immediately after the sermon Rev. Flinn said by the power vested in him, he would dedicate the church to the service of God. He referred to the fact that his father was at one time pastor of the church here.

Mr. J. W. McNillan, under whose supervision the church had been built, turned the key over to Mr. H. M. Lamar, treasurer of the building committee, expressing his appreciation of the uniform kindness which the building committee had shown him. Mr. Lamar in turn gave the key to Mr. E. P. Lame, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the church.

The handsome pipe organ is an exceedingly sweet toned instrument, and under the skilful touch of Miss Annie Case, Organist, the music was most beautiful and inspiring. The members of the choir were: Miss Annie Case, Organist, director, Mrs. Otelia Case, Soprano, Mrs. Geo. D. Case, Alto, Mr. L. H. Andrews, Tenor, and Mr. L. C. Hall, Bass.

The services were impressive and greatly enjoyed by the large congregation. All other churches of the city were closed and worshipped with the Presbyterians.

Rev. John W. Goode, of the United Presbyterians, came to this church as a supply in February 1920, and filled the pulpit until January 1921 when Rev. Thomas Gordon Watt was called and installed. He resigned in April 1926. He gave this church five years of useful service. Under his ministry, many were added to the church and his influence upon the church and community will long be felt and remembered. On June 11, 1926 this church is without a pastor.

During the years the four latter ministers served, the Church expanded greatly in number and efficiency.

The Men of the Church, the Woman's Auxiliary, the Y. P. L., and, in 1939, the new College Student Vesper Group, held regular meetings with inspiring programs, contributed to all the causes of the Church, and cooperated generously in community projects. The personel of the organization is of high type educationally and in Christian Fellowship.

George B. Thompson succeeded Rev. Thomas Gordon Watt and served 1926-1929. Albert Grady Harris succeeded Rev. Thompson and served 1929-1935. Rufus William Oakey succeeded Rev. Harris and served from November 1935-







YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

The Young People's work was first begun in the Milledgeville Presbyterian Church in 1861 by Mrs. Alfred Nesbit who had a singing class every Sunday afternoon at the church. Dr. William Flinn was pastor at the time.

In 1887 Rev. Donald McQueen org nized the young people. The same year Mrs. C. P. Crawford started a children's missionary society called "The Safford Reapers," named for Mrs. Anna Safford, a missionary to China from Greensboro.

Mr. and Mrs. George C. Smith and Miss Emma Haugh were elected delegates to attend the world's convention of Christian Endeavor in Montreal, Canada in July.

In 1902 a junior young people's society called "The Loving Service" was organized by Mrs. C. P. Crawford. It featured the work of educating a little Chinese girl, Quay Nur, in Miss Fleming's school in Soochow. Since graduating from college, she has rendered wonderful service to her people.

While the younger boys were members of The Loving Service with the little girls, the older boys Mr. Brannen organized into "Covenaters" which group lasted several years. The Loving Service lasted until 1924.

The Christian Endeavor flourished and peri hed periodically, depending on leadership and number of older young people.

In 1932, while president of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. J. O. Sallee organized a Girls Circle of which she was leader with girls as officers. Among the group were: Elizabeth King, Louise King, Florence Atkins, Barbara Ann Conn, Mary Ida Flemister, Ann Sallee, Mary Sallee, Lydia Patterson, Isabel Edwards, Nell Norwood, Jeanette Giles, Sara Alma Giles, Laurette Bone, Dorothy Fisher, Marie Fisher, Edith Vaughn, Rosemary Patterson, Lois Edwards.

In September, 1933, Rev. A. G. Harris and Mrs. J. O. Sallee organized the Y. P. L. on the Kingdom Highway plan. Louis Norwood was President and Jane Patterson was Secretary. Other Presidents which followed were Pearl Cannon, Searcy Slack, Frances Tabb, Billy McComb, Sibley Jemnings, Laurette Bone, Mary Ida Flemister, and Carl Fleming (1939).

The Y. P. L. has had very fine personel in the town girls and boys and G. M. C. barracks cadets.

In addition to Worship Programs Sunday evenings, based in general on the Program Builder, the Y. P. L. has had a Fellowship Hour of games and fun and light refreshment every Wednesday afternoon.

Large groups of young people have attended Agnes Scott Conference and the Augusta Presbytery Conferences and Annual Rallies.

On account of the large number of boys and girls here at college, a student worker was needed and employed as a half-time worker. Miss Margaret Hoyt served one year, Miss Louella Carvill one year, and Mrs. J. O. Sallee was appointed by Synods work Committee to complete Miss Carvil's term from February, 1939 to September, 1939, or till another advisor could be procured.

Each Sunday Afternoon at five o'clock the Presbyterian G. S. C. W. girls have vesper services at the church under the leadership of Mrs. J. O. Sallee and Mrs. H. B. Jennings.

HISTORY OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

Sometime during the sixties the women of the Presbyteriam Church of
Milledgeville, Georgia, organized a church society calling themselves "The
Ladies Aid Society," with Mrs. Iverson Harris as president; Mrs. R. M. Orme,

The purpose of this organization was to assist in the church work when needed. They agreed to pay the expenses of their Pastor, and Elder to Presbytery, "for money is never in the treasury when needed," said one of the new officers; also to meet the required quota on the church by Presbytery. The other activities are not known, but the society grew, for it is still alive though organized differently.

The women contemporary with the above officers named are some of the best and most prominent women in the state: Mrs. Alfred Nesbit, Mrs. William McKinley, Mrs. Richard Nichols, Mrs. William Rockwell, Mrs. Daniel Tucker, Mrs. Peter Williams, Mrs. Andrew Miller, Mrs. James Hall, Miss Lydia Hall, Mre. Robert Hunter, Mrs. Charles Andrews, Mrs. Barelder Stubbs, Mrs. Lafayette Carrington, Mrs. Joe Nesbit, and many others.

To this band of consecrated women we owe our birth. This society existed until 1887, when we were allowed by Presbytery to form a Foreign Missionary Society, with Mrs. James Wilson as president. The two societies met jointly, Mrs. T. T. Windsor acting as president for the Ladies Aid. Ten minutes of time was given to Mrs. Windsor for collecting the Ladies Aid dues. This was the extent of their meeting—as a society—at this time. Later on the Ladies Aid revived, took on new life, and surpassed their former efforts. Hundreds of dollars were made and paid into the church treasury. Perhaps the most fruitful source of revenue was making and selling wool comforts; several were sent as far as New York and New Orleans, and to other cities. The two societies were now separated, for they had grown stronger and had "a mind to work."

Crawford Milledgeville As we draw the curtain over the many years in which these women have planned, worked, sorrowed, and rejoiced together, there is but one question, "What of the future?" That question is answered by Mrs. W. C. Winsborough, Superintendent of the Woman's Work in our Southern Church, "Every woman in the church a member of the Woman's Auxiliary; Circles shifted each year; Secretaries of the Causes of the Church; District c nferences; regular Executive Committee Meetings to advance the work of the church."

AUXILIARY

This type of organization has proved through the years, very superior to former types. More women have been "enlisted for Christ" which signifies greater interest and information regarding the opportunity and responsibility of our church in the advancement of Christ's Kingdom.

It was April 25, 1921 that the local "Woman's Union" of the Presbyterian Church changed its name to Woman's Auxiliary.

On February 14, 1910 Mrs. C. P. Crawford introduced the time honored custom of an Auxiliary Valentine Party for Benevolences. Each woman in the church was requested to earn a dollar and tell in rhyme how it was acquired. Through the years the women have looked forward to this delightful party and hundreds of dollars have been pleasantly realized.

The Milledgeville Auxiliary has also had the custom of a big fall and spring social to make the boys of the Georgia Military College and the girls of the Georgia State College for Women who attend our church feel at home in the Church.

On September 30, 1930 the Milledgeville Auxiliary was awarded First Prize by our Home Mission Committee for editing the best news paper on Home Missions. The title of our original edition was "Neighborly News." The title was contributed by Mrs. L. C. Hall; the cartoons by Mrs. J. O. Sallee; editor-inchief, Mrs. T. H. Rentz.

A short time previous to this the Foreign Mission Committee had a poster contest throughout the sixteen Southern States on China. A member of the Milledgeville Auxiliary, Mrs. J. O. Sallee, won the \$50.00 First Prize which was forwarded to China, and Ann and Mary Sallee were awarded the \$30.00 Second Prize which was sent through the Sunday School to Thornwell.

The Milledgeville Auxiliary has supplied real pioneer leadership in the history of our Woman's Work. In the early days from 1902-1906, Mrs. C. P. Crawford served as the second Presbyterial President of the "Augusta Presbyterial Woman's Foreign Mission Union." In 1906 she became "General Secretary" which position she holds today, 1939, under the title "Field Secretary". But the greatest contribution of our Milledgeville representative was serving as the First president of the "Woman's Synodical Conference of Georgia". Our Synodical was organized January 24, 1910 at the North Avenue Presbyterian Church, Atlanta, under the direction of Dr. Richard Orme Flinn. Just preceding this state organization, Mrs. Crawford, by invitation, organized the Athens Presbyterial at Commerce, Georgia, and also made several trips to Atlanta Presbyterial. This gave the six Presbyterials the necessity of creating the Synodical.

The Milledgeville Auxiliary has supplied one other Synodical Officer, in the Secretary of Spiritual Life and many other efficient Augusta Presbyterial

Officers, Miss Bell McMillan, later Mrs. Bray, was for over 25 years the Treasurer and since her resignation, her sister-in-law, Mrs. K. G. McMillan has filled this position. Others have been: Mrs. J. L. Beeson, filling several offices; Mrs. George Carpenter; and Mrs. J. O. Sallee.

Our Auxiliary has made a great contribution to the Church and youth in the Bible Teachers of the Sunday School. Mrs. L. C. Hall served for many, many years as the Woman's Bible Class, followed by Mrs. Charles Conn and Mrs. J. L. Beeson. The Young Ladies Class, later by College Student Class, has had the wonderful leadership of Mrs. H. B. Jennings.

The Auxiliary Circles have served the suppers for the Men's Club of the Church, sent delegates each year to the Negro Woman's C nference and contributed generously toward the Young People's Conference expense. There has always prevailed a fine spirit of cooperation in Civic calls as well as Christian Service for the Church.

As we look forward to "the year that lies ahead," may we lift our hearts in gratitude for "the certainties of the Christian Faith" and together recount the outstanding activities of the year just past.

Last April our Women's Auxiliary sent three delegates and two
Presbyterial officers to Presbyterial in Washington, Ga.; in May, held
the Birthday Party; in June, sent a delegate to the Negro Women's Conference in Atlanta; filled Red Cross bags for service men; and our
church Young People's Adviser, Mrs. J. O. Sallee, attended the Conference at Montreat for Student Pastors and Workers. The Auxiliary
made a financial contribution to local Community Chest and Red Cross.

In July, the summer school students were given a party. The local YPL held a two-day conference at Lake Laurel under the direction of the Adult Adviser and Auxiliary Committee since the Presbytery and Synod's Conferences were called off. In August, the Auxiliary assisted with a Negro Vacation Bible School conducted by the delegate who attended the Negro Women's Conference. We cooperated with a white Vacation Bible School at the Methodist Church. In September, the Auxiliary and Men-of-the-Church and Young People's Choir conducted a joint Sunday evening service on the "Religious Education Advance." During the month, the Auxiliary was also hostess

to the Fourth Group Conference. In October, we observed the season of Study, Prayer, and Self-Denial for Home Missions; assisted with Sunday School Rally Day; assisted in the permanent establishment and operation of a weekend Service Center for the Soldiers; and entertained all of the GSCW and GMC students who worship with us, at a "Progressive Travel Party," Dr. John Melton being the guest of honor. In November, Dr. Joseph Garrison, Assembly's Director of Student Work, spoke at our church and to the Presbyterian Student Vesper Group. We were led in our five-day Bible Study on the Gospel of Luke by Mrs. Evans, a former teacher at Wheaton College.

In December, the Auxiliary cooperated with the YPL in presenting a Christmas Joy-Gift Pageant and sent special gifts to our shutins. In january, we observed our season of Prayer and Self-Denial for Foreign Missions. In March, we held a one-day conference for Negro Women.

This year, for the first time, Milledgeville has had a full-time student worker, Miss Billye Davis, of Brazil, \$300 of her salary being contributed through the influence of an Auxiliary member. In outpost Sunday School work, Miss Davis taught Bible at the Boys' Reformatory, and Mrs. H. B. Jennings taught each Sunday afternoon at the Inter-denominational North Side Sunday School.

Over 225 New Testaments and 100 Gospels have been distributed among the negro draftees leaving here and to the graduates of the Negro High School, as well as to our own boys leaving home. Money was sent to Rabun Nacoochee for Bibles for the graduates, and boxes of clothing, to Rabun and Thornwell.

REPORT

I am glad to report that the records have been kept
up to date. The Sunday Church Bulletins have been
kept for filing at Montreat, as requested.

During the past year our pastor Dr Rufus Oakey gelt it his duty to enlist in the Navy for Chaplain's service. His going was a great loss to the church. After a few months the church called Rev.John McMullen who accepted and is serving in a very fine way.

I regret that ill health has prevented my being more active in the work this year.

L. Order of Business

a. Executive Board meets on the first Monday of the month at the church with the president presiding. The chairmen of the committees and the circle chairmen report and discuss the business of the month.

b. Circle Meetings-The circles have their monthly meetings on the third Monday in the homes of the members. The chairman presides and presents any business which might have been discussed at the board meeting. Cards are always sent to the sick. The offering is taken and the monthly letter from the Spiritual Growth chairman is read. The co-chairman acts as the program chairman and is responsible for the Bible lesson; she may either present the lesson herself or call on a member ahead of time to give the lesson. The average attendance is usually more than half of the number on roll. c. The chairman of the Home Circle visits her members at regular intervals. Those who can be out are taken for rides. Each member is remembered with a card on her birthday, sent flowers during the year, and gimen a gift at Christmas. II. Annuties and Relief-The Women of the Church do not have a general meeting in December. Instead of this the Annuties and Relief chairman plans a Vesper Program. This program is given the Sunday night preceding Christmas. For this service all members of the church family are encouraged to be present. In 1958 the chairman planned a song service in which every child in the Sunday School was given a part. This was well attended and well received. The Joy Gift offering, taken at this time, amounted to \$162.00. The Women of the Church clothed one orphan at Thornwell Orphanage and sent her gifts on her birthday and at Christmas. A check for \$50.00 was also sent to Thornwell. The Presbyterian Home at Quitman was given \$100.00 III. Christian Education-A Vacation Bible School was held during the summer for ten days and was well attended. Eleven Pioneers were sent to Camp Stevens at Crawfordville and sixteen Seniors attended the Senior Conference at the same camp. Mrs. Edward Dawson, who is in charge of the nursery class on the Sunday School took a course in nursery work at the Area Laboratory School in Montreat. Mrs. Frank Minter, who teaches in the Junior Departemnt, attended Area Lab School in Decatur. \$50.00 was geven to the Blessing Box. Our women helped with the orientation of the new college students who attended Georgia State College for Women and Georgia Military College. IV. General Fund Agencies-Other than benevelonces \$5.00 was given to the American Bible Society, and \$5.00 was given to Stillman Institute. Spiritual Growth-Letters were sent to the circles each month from the chairman in which she suggested special thoughts to be mentioned in prayers and gave Bible references to be concetrated on during the month. Prayers groups were held. VI. Stewardship-Each member is given the opportunity to

VI. Stewardship-Each member is given the opportunity to pledge. A special program with the emphasis on stewardship was held during May in connection with the Birthday of the Women of the Church.

World Missions-A family night supper was given at the VII. church. Mr. & Mrs. Fancher from the First Presbyterian Church in Decatur gave a talk on missions and showed movies on this subject. An impressive program for White Cross was carried out at Christmas. A box was mailed to World Service. Christian Social Service- The County Welfare was given VIII. a check for \$15.00. The Red Cross received \$5.00 form our Church. Magazines are collected and distributed to the various buildings at the State Hospital. Our women put on an annual picnic for the Presbyterian patients at the hospital. We also are responsible for planning, buying of individual gifts, and carrying out of the Christmas party at the Milledgeville State Hospital. X. Treasurer's Report-A.a. c. Circle meetingsare held each third Monday and Tuesday either in the monrings, afternoons or nights. Some of the circles meet at the homes of the members while others meet at the church. The chairman presides and reports business brought up at the executive board. Offering is taken and a "piggy bank" is passed for contributions which may be used for a special project the circle has taken for the year. The lesson is usually in the form of a discussion guided by different volunteers each month. d. The Home circle consists of shut ins who are unable to attend meetings. They are visited by their chairman and sent rememberances at Easter and Christmas. We have eight members in this circle. II. Annuties and Relief- This chairman planned and executed the Annual Joy Gift program on December 20th as an evening service at the church. Carols were sung and a candlelight's service was held. The offering on this accasion was \$116.00. A contribution to the Quitman Home was made in the amount of \$50.00. Rabun Gap School was sent \$10.00. Ten pounds of clothes was mailed to War Relief. The Women of the Church adopted a girl at Thornwell Orphanage and have seen to her needs and clothes for many years. \$50.00 was also given to Thornwell. III. Christian Education- Mrs. George Carpenter and Mrs. D. Baker Smith attended Synodical Conference at Athens. Mrs. Robert E. Lee and Mrs. E. B. Ellison went to the Women's Conference in Montreat. \$50000 was given for the Blessing Box. Several negro women were sent to the Negro Women's Conference. A Vacation Bible school was held during the summer and was well attended. Our women also help with the orientation of the college students who attend Georgia State College for Women and Georgia Military College. Pioneers attended Camp Stevens at Crawfordville and Seniors represented our church at the same camp. IV. Spiritual Growth - The outstanding event of the year was the intensive study of the book of Revelation, condusted by Dr. Charles Gibbony from Augusta. This was a three hour class with approximately fifty wmman attending. This proved so inspirational that the Women's Bible Class under leadership guidance of Mrs. George Carpenter, Sr. and Mrs. Charles J. Conn voted to use Revelation for additional study at Sunday School during the winter quarter. Other routine duties such as suggested Bible readings during the month and special prayers for the circle use were carried out through the year. V. Stewardship - The stewardship chairman sponsored two general meetings, one in April and the other in October. The April meeting was the Birthday meeting and the subject was the "New Brazil". A luncheon was held at the church where the menu, table and room decorations carried out the Beazilian theme. Each woman was given a greeting card, leaflet on Brazil and an offering envelope. In October the subject was "God Dares You", the purpose being to open the eyes of the comfortable to the despair of the hungary and to share our own sense of values. Our speaker was Mr. Stixrud who had just returned from several years in the Congo. After an interesting talk

Mr. Stixrud and his wife exhibited various items which they had brought back with them. Two leaflets helpful in stewardship promotion "My Cup Overflows" and "Christian Discipleship" were made available to the women.

- VI. World Missions A world mission program was presented at one of the general meetings. Bessie Oliver, who had been in the mission field for a number of years spoke on the Near East. Thirty-six blankets were sent to Africa, two hundred ninety-five pieces of clothing were sent to Church World service for overseas relief, sheets and a nurses uniform were also given. Our women sponsor a missionary nurse in Korea, Sylvia Haley. \$172.00 was given for her support and \$55.00 above this was sent for missionary work.
- VII. Church Extension In March through April each circle used the study book "Living Epistles". In May a special program for Church Extension was given using the film "Chruch Extension on Tour". This film was purchased and is in our file. An offering was sent for Church Extension. In November we had a visit from the child whom the church Women support at Thornwell. She is thirteen years old and was adopted by us when she was five. During the year this chairman cooperated with the chairmen of Spiritual Growth and Christian Education by encouraging family visitation, enlisting new members, observing Week of Prayer in May, urging prayer for Home Missionaries through family use of Day by Day, urging families to especially listen to Presbyterian Hour, the quarterly Sunday broadcasts of Presbyterian Series of Protestant Hour, remembering people in local institutions (Milledgevible Hospital) at Christmas and Easter, and observing United Nations Day (World Community Sunday).

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, MILLEDGEVILLE, GEORGIA

A BIT OF HISTORY

This Church was organized June 11,1826, by Rev. Dr. Brown, Rev. Messrs Geldersleeve, Foot and Stiles being present. Six members entered into the organization, to whom Rev. Joseph Stiles occasionally preached, under whome supervision the Church was formed. Twenty members were added in 1826 & 27.

During part of 1827,28,29, Rev. James C.Patterson preached and was succeeded in Succeeded in Jan. 1829 by Rev. Lawson Clinton, who was secceeded by Rev. Willet Preston in 1830. Twenty new members were received between 1827 and 1832. In 1832 Rev. B.Burroughs became pastor, remaining in the relation until 1834. He was succeeded by Rev. J.W. Baker.

No report if given of the church during these years until April 1848. For a year ending April the report is total communicants 109, added by profession and letter 16, adults and infants baptized 9. Rev. Baker continued as pastor until 1854 and left the church whose membership numbered 122.

Rev. William Flynn served the church from 1854 to 1869. In report to Presbytery in 1962 the membership is given as 129. The roll having been revised, the report sent to Presbytery in 1969 gave as total membership 67.

Rev. C.W. Lane served from 1869 to 1872. Total membership being 66 when he left. The Rev. Goetchins was pastor from 1972 to middle 1879, the membership numbering 72 when he left. 32 removed and unavailable making a total of 104 members.

Dr. Donald McQueen served as pastor from 1879 to 1892. Membership noted as 164 in report to Presbytery but purging of the roll has reduced it by 15. Since then 8 members have been added.

After the resignation of Dr. McQueen in 1892 Rev. T.A. Gibson of the Methodist Church filled the pulpit until Rev. D. W. Brannen came as supply in May 1892, and was installed as pastor Oct. 12, 1892. He resigned Feb. 11, 1920. This was his first chrage. For 28 years he was "among us as one who serves" and under his leadership the beautiful brick building in which we now worship was built and dedicated in 1906. It was since been remodeled and a new Education Building added. The old Sunday School department now being incorporated in the new Sanctuary, giving much more seating space than in the original building.

In Sept. 25, 1892 minutes of the Session it was noted that "the colored people are about forming a church of their own for their race, and we are aiding in the project."

From 1921 to 1926 the Rev. Thomas Gordon Watts served as pastor. Rev. Geo. B. Thompson from 1926 to 1927. Dr. Albert Grady Harris served as pastor from 1930 to Oct. 1935 when Dr. Rufus Oakey came to the church as pastor. In 1943 Dr. Oakey resigned and joined the armed forces as a Chaplain.

Rev. John McMullen came in Oct.1943 and remained until June 1948. Remodeling plans with were begun during Mr. McMullen's stay. Dr. H. Kerr Taylor followed Nev. McMullen and was here until 1953. Remodeling of Sanctuary and building of Ed. Bldg. completed while Dr. Taylor was pastor.

Rev. John Frank Alexander followed Dr. Taylor April 1953. He resigned in 1956. After Mr. Alexander's resignation Dr. Cartledge of Columbis Seminary filled the pulpit for most of the following year until Dr. Wm. L. McLeod came March 1957. He was pastor until March 1,1966. Until Sept. 1966 the pulpit was filled by visiting ministers, then Rev. John David Campbell accepted the call, his service began in Nov. 1966, and he is the pastor at the present time. With the space available it is impossible to give more than a bare outline of the history of this church.
